PAINFUL

Filipino Assembly Before Final Adjournment Passed Resolution Declaring for It.

PROCEEDINGS HARMONIOUS.

Delegates to Congress Instructed to Present Question to That Body When Opportunity Presented.

Manila, May 20 .- With but slight variation from its action on final adjournment of the session of 1908, the Philippine general assembly in the closing hour of its session today passed a second resolution declaring in favor of the independence of the islands. The last formalities with the Philippine commission had been exchanged, and the statutory hour of adjournment had passed, when the question was presented by Speaker Osmena. He said the policy of the assembly was to work in harmony with and support the government in all measures calculated to advance the interests of the Filipinos. Nevertheless, the members had not abandoned their original aspiration for independence, and, therefore, he moved that the Filipino delegates to the Con--ss of the United. States be instructed to present the question to that body whenever an opportunity was of-

fered. The members of the Progressist, or minority party, asked permission to abstain from voting, which was granted. All the Nationalists then voted in favor of the resolution.

The closing days of the session were marked by great harmony between the assembly and the commission, and practically all the important legislation desired by the government was enacted. Among the most important measures passed were the rallway guarantee bill, which intures the construction of a railway to Baguio and the extension of the lines in central Luzon to the exertme southern part of the Island, practically making a through trunk line across Luzon from north to south, and a bankruptcy act of general application. It was decided to change the date of the meeting of the legislature from the hot spring season to October, and, therefore, there will be no further session until the fall of 1910. The total amount of the bud-get passed is 16,500,000 pesos.

Federal Official Circles in San Francisco Wrought Up Over Landing of Admiral Uriu.

NAVAL AIDES IN GREAT HURRY

Brought Distinguished Japanese and His Wife to Shore Without Consent of Collector of the Port.

San Francisco, May 22 .- Were the iaval aides appointed to meet Admiral Jriu guilty of smuggling the famous Japanese sea-fighter, the baroness, his wife, their baggage and their valet into this country? This is the momentous question which has been agitating federal official circles ever since Capt. Edward W. Eberle, commandant of the Yerba Buena training station, in his eagerness to welcome the distinguished visitors on behalf of the army and navy took them from the Nippon Maru yesterday without the formality of first

securing the consent of Boarding Officer Charles Stephens, the personal representative of Collector of the Port. Frederick Stratton, who in the present case also claimed to be the personal representative of the president of the United States. Now Stratton claims that the rules of the United States treasury department have been violat-ed by Eberle and that the latter has haid himself liable to a fine of \$2,000, \$1,000 each for landing the noted ad-miral and his charming wife before the miral and his charming wife before the formalities of the custom service had been complied with.

Early yesterday morning the navy of-ficials sailed forth in the tug Vigilant to meet the visitors and at the same time as is his custom when a liner appears in port Chief Boarding Officer Stophens started out in the revenue tug Golden Gate. But unlike ordinary trips he went armed with instructions to pass the admiral and his party into this port free of duty and the petty annoyances which less distinguished travelers must endure. CENSOR CONDEMNS SHAW'S LATEST PLAY

London, May 21.—The censor has prohibited the production of George Bernard Shaw's new play, "The Show-ing Up of Blanca Posnol." The play was on a theological subject, and was in advanced rehearsal for an early production." production.

Mr. Shaw, in a characteristic inter-view in the Daily Chronicle, says: "The censor objects to the play, not "The censor objects to the play, hot because it is irreligious, but because it is religious and because it suggests be-lief in God by picturing a set of un-godly people who wake up to the per-ception that God is real, vital and ac-tive existence. The remarkable thing is that while it is permissible to repre-sent God as a quaintly costumed figure, as in 'Everyman,' any verbal allusion to him is immediately tabooed." Mr. Shaw concluded by saying he was-willing to cut out or reasonably change willing to cut out or reasonably change any offending passages, "but the cen-sor demands practically that I should cut out the whole play; therefore, there was no alternative but to abandon the

production."

It will be known as a celebration of Mrs. Howe's birthday.
