GENERAL.

San Francisco, 25.—A fire at the cor-
ner of Sixth and Brannan streets, to-
day, destroyed property valued at ten
thousand dollars.The San Francisco Fire Insurance
Company has resolved to disincorporate
and retire; the low rates ruling, is given
as the principal reason.The town of Reno, on the Central Pa-
cific Railroad, near Virginia, Nevada,
was only laid out this month, and al-
ready contains 100 houses and 500 peo-
ple.San Francisco, 26.—The *Bulletin* and
Alta, of this city, pronounce the Galla-
han Quicksilver land claim, now be-
fore Congress a fraud, and show by re-
cords that it has been so declared by the
United States Courts in California. The
claim has been, moreover, floated from
its original location to cover the new
Idria Quicksilver mines. The plea for
the bill, on the ground of preventing the
quicksilver monopoly by the New Al-
maden Company, is met by stating that
three or four other mines in California
are now producing quicksilver, and it is
estimated that ten different furnaces
will be in operation before the close of
the present year.Republican ratification meetings are
being held throughout the State.San Francisco, 27.—An official report
from Captain Munson announces the
result of a conflict with a party of thirty
or forty Indians in the vicinity of
Paradise Valley, in north eastern Cali-
fornia, on May 7. Munson's force con-
sisted of fifty men, belonging to the
Ninth Infantry and Eighth Cavalry.
The Indians occupied a strong position
in the mountains, and were driven from
it after four hours fighting, with the
loss of several killed. The troops lost
one killed and two wounded. The In-
dians were nearly all armed with rifles.The grade of the Western Pacific
railroad, between Sacramento and San
Francisco is advancing rapidly.PEANUTS.—The cultivation of pea-
nuts has received some attention in
California, and, we believe, has been
generally attended with favorable re-
sults. A correspondent of the *Country
Gentleman*, who is engaged in their cul-
tivation, in one of the Atlantic States,
in speaking of the economical uses of
the peanut, says it will yield an abun-
dant quantity of oil, excellent, limpid,
clear and inodorous—in quality equal
to the best French olive oil, and not
liable to become rancid. It is much
used for making a dry and inodorous
soap; and a large soap manufacturing
company in Bordeaux, France, is now
engaged in cultivating peanuts on an
extensive tract of sandy land in the
Landes, for the purposes of supplying
themselves with the oil. The nuts yield
from one and a half to two gallons of
oil to the bushel; and the oil-cake is
found to be good food for cattle, or ma-
nure for the land. Certainly if the cul-
tivation of castor beans is profitable,
simply for the oil they yield, the culti-
vation of peanuts must be still more so,
considering the greater variety of their
uses. Besides being eaten as nuts, they
are ground and mixed with flour or
meal, so as to make excellent bread and
cake; they are also mixed with cocoa to
make an improved chocolate. An em-
ulsion of a peculiar aroma can be made
of them; also a very palatable, refresh-
ing liquor.The peanut is as easy to raise as the
garden bean. A good, warm, rich, light
soil, under a hot sun, brings it to the
greatest perfection. On the west coast
of Africa it is cultivated exclusively as
an oil seed. In Brazil, Spain, Algeria,
West Indies and the Southern States, it
is extensively cultivated as an edible
nut. France imports from her colonies
an average of 80,000 to 90,000 tons annu-
ally. The product and consumption of
this article is extending very rapidly
among all civilized nations, and it pro-
mises to become one of the most impor-
tant and valuable crops for future culti-
vation in warm latitudes. It is believed
that it will flourish in California quite
as well as in any of the Southern States,
and we would recommend our farmers
to give it a share of their attention.—
Ex.The above is worthy the attention of
the people of our Southern settlements.
