

WANTS HANNA FOR CHAIRMAN. President Will Ask Ohio Senator To Take Charge of Republican Party's Fortunes. DEFINITE CONCLUSION.

The Buckeye Statesman Has Let it Be Known That He Will Not Be a Candidate.

Washington, Nov. 9.-President Roosevelt will ask Senator Hanna to consent to become chairman of the Republican national committee for a third time. Mr. Roosevelt has the highest appreciation of Chairman Hanna's executive ability and believes that there is no one in the Republican party who would make a better campaign manager

The request by President Roosevelt will be in effect a suggestion to form an alliance and will an that Senator Hanna is to assuth in the Roosevelt administration a position of influence and as an adviser, very similar to the relation which existed between Presi-dent McKinley and Mr. Hanna. It is probable that accompanying this

tender of the chairmanship will be tender of the chairmanship will be the suggestion that Sonator Hanna take former Gov. Crane of Massachusetts as his vice chairman. The president re-gards Gov. Crane as one of the best po-litical managers in the country and, should Senator Hanna decline the chairmanship, Crane would be the pres-ident's obsize ident's choice.

It may seem a little early for the question of the national chairmanship to be settled, but it must be remem-bered that it is important for the presi-dent to know whether Mr. Hanna will be willing to accept, that he may, if accessed accession of the network o necessary, arrange for some other na-tional chairman. The fact that President Roosevelt

earnestly hopes that Senator Hanna will become chairman again is one of the most significant indications of the president's confidence in the Ohio man, as well as of the harmony that prevails

in the Republican ranks. The president and Senator Hanna re-mained in conference for a considera-ble time, notwithstanding the fact that ble time, notwithstanding the fact that several callers of note were waiting to see the president. The president urged the senator to retain the chairmanship of the national committee in order that the Republican party might on the ap-proaching campaign have the benefit of his services at the head of the na-tional organization. Senator Hanna, is understood, indicated his desire to retire from the work of active political management. The president, however, urged him in strong terms to continue urged him in strong terms to continue in the political harness, pointing out to him that as the head of the organization he would inspire great confidence throughout the country.

No definite conclusion was reached, the understanding being that a further and more extended conference would be held in the near future.
