LIVELY SCRAP FOR SALOON LICENSE

Colored Man Determined to Have Share of Confrere's Patronage.

FIREWORKS AT FAIR GROUNDS

Ogden, Oct. 15.—It was stated yesterday afternoon at the city recorder's office that Mayor Brewer had returned the application for a liquor license of Ed Viaton, a negro, without his approval. This down the colored man's application for the present or until the council takes further action upon it. Back of the story of the refusal to grant the colored man a license to sell liquor in a saloon which he recently purchased, it is stated that it is a result of an attempt on the part of one negro by name of Viaton, who owns the Assembly Club saloon on lower Twenty-fifth street, to block the attempt of another colored man to go into business in Ogden and get any of the colored trade.

About two weeks ago Viaton purchased the Lincoln Avenue saloon from Nels Peterson. He then sent in an application to the city council for a renewal of the license. The influence of Viaton and his associates in controlling a vote in that district was probably accountable for the opposition. Anyhow the license was held up and referred to the police committee after the chief of police had made an adverse report upon the same. Last week the license was again taken up and passed by the city council, and before it was granted it was necessary for the mayor to approve it.

The end in this case is not yet, as it is stated that Viaton will make a fight and will institute mandamus proceedings against the mayor and the city council compelling them to grant the permit.

FIREWORKS AT FAIR GROUNDS.

At the fair grounds Saturday evening, the management of the International Fair association, has arranged for one of the largest fireworks displays ever held in this city. There are more than a thousand pieces of fireworks which were to have been used at the recent four-county fair, but could not on account of the heavy rains. The management has also several hundred dollars worth of merchandise prizes which will be given away.

This action is taken by the Fair association to dispose of the goods left on hand and devise a way which will bring in a little revenue on account of the last two days of the fair being ruined by the storm. As the association went to great expense in putting up the buildings, etc., it is thought there will be an unusually large crowd at the grounds Saturday night.

CONDEMNATION SUIT.

The Salt Lake & Ogden Railway company has brought suit in the district court against Mary C. Donnell, seeking to condemn a certain piece of property owned by the defendant and over which the plaintiffs want to construct a railroad, which they allege a reasonable value of \$125.

Judgment in favor of the Salt Lake & Ogden road against the Ogden Milling & Elevator company was entered in the district court yesterday afternoon, the plaintiff being awarded the right of way as prayed for, the stipulation being \$225.

ROBBED BY DISHWASHER.

"Buck" Robins, a cow-puncher, dishwasher and all-around laborer, is wanted by the proprietor of the City Lunch Counter, which is located at 214 Twen-

ty-fifth street, in this city, from which place it is alleged that he took \$120 and a revolver early yesterday morning when he suddenly left the city.

According to Thero Gefas, proprietor of the place, "Buck" appeared at his place about a week ago and asked for work. He was employed and paid in charge of the dishwashing crew. Tuesday Buck told the proprietor that he had secured a position with the Pacific Express company in Wyoming and was going to take a train to Cheyenne. As Gefas was very busy on Tuesday he neglected going to the bank to make a deposit and left \$120 in the till over night. Yesterday when he came to the money, a revolver and Buck were missing. After doing a little detective work upon his own hook, Gefas reported the matter to the police.

BODY SENT HOME FOR BURIAL.

The body of Mrs. Melissa Montgomery, wife of Charles Montgomery of Idaho, was shipped to that town last evening by Undertaker C. J. Lindquist. The deceased died at North Ogden in this county, Tuesday morning, after an illness of six weeks of blood poisoning. SUGAR COMPANY PAY DAY.

Today is pay day at the Amalgamated Sugar company's factory in this city, and about \$50,000 will be paid out to the farmers who furnished the first crop of sugar beets. This payment represents about a half a month's supply and fully 75 per cent of the campaign for sugar making is to come yet. So far about 2,000 tons of beets have been used and the pay for them will go to about 500 farmers who reside in Weber, Davis and Boxelder counties.

BISSELL-GILL WEDDING.

Vincent G. Gill, circulator of the Salt Lake Tribune at Ogden, left for the east this afternoon on a special train. He goes directly to Independence, Ia., where he will be married to Miss Beulah Bissell, one of the charming belles of that town and who made a number of friends in Ogden a year ago when she was a teacher in the public schools. Before returning to Ogden, Mr. and Mrs. Gill will visit Mr. Gill's former home in Madison, Wis.

PASSED WORTHLESS CHECK.

H. O. Kelly was arrested yesterday upon the charge of forgery and is held in the city jail awaiting the results of an investigation that is being conducted further by the officers. It appears that Tuesday evening Kelly purchased a meal ticket at the Healy cafe which is owned by J. C. Jensen, tendering a check for \$10 bearing the signature of "John Douglas," and after eating a meal took his departure.

A short time later Kelly appeared and asked the restaurant man to cash another check for \$10. The cashier at this time being \$20, Kelly's actions aroused the suspicions of Jensen, who refused the request and started an investigation. He found that the check he had was worthless and reported the matter to the police. The arrest of Kelly was made yesterday by Officer Hadlock.

On the way to the battle ground, the testimony showed, Jones called McCandlass vile names, whereupon McCandlass struck Jones over the head with a beer bottle from the effects of which Jones, after lying in a semiconscious condition for a number of days died.
