power and glory in doing the will of the Father. So the Apostles who succeeded Obrist were to tarry at Jerusalem until they should be endowed with the power of the Holy Ghost, which should lead them into the obedient course that Jesus followed. faithful ones of this dispensation, who stood unmoved in the midst of persecution and apostasy, had merited and received recognition as the worthy representatives of God to men. Such individuals stood firm and steadfast upon the perfect foundation laid by the Prophet Joseph Smith.

Elder Taylor recommended that the young people who were under the in-fidelic tendencies of modern scientific teaching, should be patiently instructed in the harmony of true science with the Gospel of Christ, that all harm be kept from them. He also suggested that all amutements be engaged in under the proper (influence, and wherever possible under the direct control of the Priestbood, The circular promulgated by President Taylor during his life withfreference to dancing was referred to as still in force, and, if conformed to, it would be much to counteract the insidious influences new tending to the destruction of the virtue of young, They who preserved and sine would find their reward in the con-stant and increasing power of God resting upon them.

The tendency toward litigation between brethren was deprecated, and the advice given that, where-ever possible, the courts of the Church be appealed to for the settlethe ment of difficulties before thev should grow to be too serious for easy adjudication. Dependence upon the ministration of the Prienthood in cases of sickness, and the gaining of power over the spirits of evil, by fasting and prayer, were strongly i commended The speaker closed with an earnest ap.

peal for harmony and unity.

Elder C. W. Penrose testified to the truth of the instructions given during conference, and expressed his regret that they had not been heard by a greater number of people. He spoke of the work of the evil one and his associate spirits, as producing doubt, infidelity, and rebellion in the minds of men. While tendency of modern thought seemed to be in the direction of unbelief in the reality of the existence of spirits and of God, the speaker testified of the reality of these existences, and the creation of men in the image of God. The reality and the power of Salan in the earth were referred to, and the Saints warned against giving way to the influence exerted by the spirits of evil. Submission to the direction of Gou and His servants and proper respect for the Priesthood would keep men in the path of right, and shield them from the insidious temptations which would seek to everthrow them. The order of the Priesthood was shown and the benefite derived from conformity to that order were portrayed. In conclusion, the speaker testified to the ultimate triumph of God's work and the establishment of His kingdom.
