"That the militia shall consist of every ry able-bodied male citizen of the re-spective states and territories and the District of Columbia, and every able bodied male of foreign birth who has declared his intention to become a citi-zen, who is more than eighteen and less than forty dive years of any and shall zen, who is more than eighteen and leas than forty-five years of age, and shall be divided into two classes: The or-manized militia, to be known as the National Guard of the state, territory or District of Columbia, or by such other designations as may be given them by the laws of the respective states or territories; the remainder te be known as the respect militia be known as the reserve militia.

### REGULAR ARMY ENCAMPMENT.

That the regularly enlisted, organ ized and uniformed active militia in the several states and territories and the District of Columbia who have here tofore participated or shall hereafte participate in the apportionment of the annual appropriation provided by sec-tion 1661 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, as amended, whether known and designated as National Guard, militia, or otherwise, shall con-stitute the organized militia. On and after Jan. 21, 1910, the organization armament and discipline of the organ ized militia in the several states and territories and the District of Columbia territories and the District of Columbia shall be the same as that which is now or may hereafter be prescribed for the regular army of the Uinted States, sub-ject in time of peace to such general exceptions as may be authorized by the secretary of war. Provided, That in peace and war each organized divi-sion of militia may have one inspector of small arms practice with the rank of small arms practise with the rank of lieutenant-colonel; each organized brigade of militia one inspector of small arms practise with the rank of major; each regiment of infantry or cavalry of organized militia one assistant in-spector of small arms practise with the spector of small arms practise with the rank of captain, and each separte of unassigned battalion of infantry or en-gineers or squadron of cavalry of or-ganized militia one assistant inspector of small arms practise with the rank of first lleutenant. Provided also, That the president of the United States in time of peace may, by order, fix the minimum number of enlisted men in each company, troop, battery signal minimum number of enlisted men in each company, troop, battery, signal corps, engineer corps and hospital corps. And provided, further, That any corps of artillery, cavalry and infantry existing in any of the states at the passage of the act of May 8, 1792, which, by the laws, customs or usages of the said states have been in continuous ex-istence since the passage of said act said states have been in continuous ex-istence since the passage of said act, under its provisions and under the pro-visions of section 232 and sections 1625 to 1660, both inclusive, of Title xvi of the Revised Statutes of the United States, relating to the militia, shall be allowed to retain their accustomed pri-vileges, subject, nevertheless, to all other duties required by law, in like

#### EQUIPPED BY GOVERNMENT.

EQUIPPED BY GOVERNMENT. "That the secretary of war is herby authorized to procure, by purchase or manufacture, and issue from time to time to the organized militia, under such regulations as he may prescribe, such number of the United States ser-vice arms, together with all accessor-ies and such other accountements, equipments, uniforms, clothing, equip-age and military stores of all kinds required for the army of the United States as are necessary to arm, uni-form and equip all of the organized militia in the several states, territories and the District of Columbia, in ac-cordance with the requirements of this act, without charging the cost or value thereof, or any expense connected therewith, against the allotment of said state, territory or the District of Columbia, out of the annual appro-priation provided by section f661 of the Revised Statutes as amended, or re-quiring payment therefor, and to ex-change, without receiving any money credit therefor, ammunition or parts thereof suitable to the new arms round for round, for corresponding ammunition suitable to the old arms heretofore issued to said state, terri-tory or the District of Columbia by the United States; provided, that said property shall remain the property of the United States, except as herein-after provided, and be annually ac-counted for by the governors of the states and territories as required by law, and that each state, territory and the District of Columbia shall, on re-ceipt of new arms or equipments, turn in to the war department, or other-That the secretary of war is herby portioned to any particular state, ter-ritory or the District of Columbia; and a list of such expenses shall be sub-mitted to Congress annually by the secretary of war in connection with the annual report." ceipt of new arms or equipments, turn in to the war department, or other-wise dispose of in accordance with the directions of the secretary of war, without receiving any money credit the directions of the secretary of war, without receiving any money credit therefor and without expense for transportation, all United States pro-perty so replaced or condemned. #### CALLING OUT MILITIA.

"That whenever the United States is invaded or in danger of invasion from any foreign mation, or of rebellion against the authority of the govern-ment of the United States, or the presi-dent is unable with the regular forces at his command to execute the laws of the Union, it shall be lawful for the president to call forth such number of the unilitia of the states or of the states or territories or of the District of Co-lumbia as he may deem necessary to repel such invasion, suppress such re-bellion, or to enable him to execute such laws, and to issue his orders for that purpose, through the gover-nor of the respective states or terri-tories, or through the commanding gen-eral of the militia of the District of Columbia, from which state, territory or district, such troops may be called, to such officers of the militia as he may think proper. "That whenever the United States is may think proper.

#### SUPERSEDES VOLUNTEERS.

"That whenever the president calls forth the organized militia of any state, territory, or of the District of Colum-bla, to be employed in the service of the United States, he may specify in his call the period for which such service is required, and the militia so called shall continue to serve ducing the term of required, and the milita so called shall continue to serve during the term so specified, either within or without the territory of the United States, unless sooner relieved by order of the presi-dent: Provided, that no commissioned officer or enlisted man of the organized militia shall be held to service beyond the term of his existing commission or collisioned; provided further that show enlistment; provided further, that wher the military needs of the federal gov-ernment arising from the necessity to execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrection, or repel invasion cannot be met by the regular forces the organized militia shall be called in to the service of the United States 1 advance of any volunteer force which is may be determined to raise."

#### CONDITIONS OF SERVICE.

States. In such case the organized mil-itia so participating shall receive the same pay, subsistence and transporta-tion as is provided by law for the offi-cers and men of the regular army, and no part of the sums appropriated for the support of the regular army shall be used to pay any part of the expenses of the organized militia of any state, territory, or District of Columbia, while engaged in joint encampments, maneu-vers and field instruction of the regular army and militia, but all payments to the militia under the provision of this section and all allowances for mileage shall be made solely from the sums ap-propriated for such purposes; provided, that the command of such military post or camp and the officers and troops of the United States there stationed shall remain with the regular commander of the confided states there stationed shall remain with the regular commander of the post without regard to the rank of the commanding or other officers of the militia temporarily so encamped within its limits or in the vicinity; pro-"That every officer and enlisted man of the militia who shall be called forth in the manner hereinbefore prescribed shall be mustered for service without further enlistment, and without fur-

ber," better known as "elaterite," is to be used to encase the dead.' The merit of elaterite lies in its absolute indestructibility, except by fire. There was a time when an attempt was made to manufacture coffins of reinforced concrete, but this was abandoned on account of the action of water which will pass through concrete, and on account of the weight, making the carrying or shipping of concrete encased bodies almost impos-

sible. Elaterite weighs very little more than wood. For the past year a series of tests have been made with elaterate. As it comes from the ground it returns as a natural element absolutely impervious to the action of the earth or the vari-ous chemical influences to be found ous chemical influences to be found

ous chemical influences to be found under ground. Even nitric acid fails to affect it in the slightest. Wood must eventually rot away, concrete is too weighty steel will rust out and a person's na-tural aversion to cremation has held back this manner of disposing of bod-les. It is claimed for elaterite that it is not only indestructible, but that it will be airtight when moulded into caskets.

Is not only indestructible, but that it will be airtight when moulded into caskets. Heat alone affects it. When sub-jected to intense heat it will burn like cellulcid or may be melted like glue. In this form it will be moulded into caskets of which Mr. Sherman has al-ready had several made. When the cover is, for the last time, placed on the casket, it is sealed with a red hot iron and rendered water and airtight. A patent arrangement will draw through a small hole at the foot of the casket all the air within and seal the hole. The process, it is said, will practically mummify the body. In its natural or in its remoulded state the mineral resembles ebony, but its molecular structure does not per-wit of any clearage. It has the next

state the mineral resembles ebony, but its molecular structure does not per-mit of any cleavage. It has the elas-ticity of rubber. For the past year the owners of the claims have been experimenting with elaterite with the result that they have found no reason to doubt the efficiency of their theor-les.

to doubt the efficiency of their theor-ies. The mineral occurs in veins for six inches to several feet wide, and not in blanket form. It is not found in many states, but where it is found it is easily mined. Up to this time it has been used largely for buttons, which turn on and off electric lights, as it is non-conducive of electricity. On account of the constantly in-creasing value of lumber and espe-cially of cedar, elaterite coffins will be made at half the cost of the others and will, in addition, offer every ad-vantage lacking in wood. Being en-tirely airtight its sanitary properties will be brought to the attention of the national, state and civic health boards and medical associations and clinics will be invited to look into the merits it claims to possess beyond any known means of burial at the present time,
