## HOT MEETING AGAIN

Councilmen Exchange Warm Words over the Stanton Investigation.

## PROTEST AGAINST OUTSIDE LABOR

Electric Wire Poles to be Placed Inside the Circle Line.—A Confidential Communication.

For the first time in many months President Goethals was present at the opening of the City Council meeting last night. He assumed the chair shortly after it opened and drapped his gavel sharply on the table and ordered Deputy Recorder Dennis to call the roll which that official promptly did. The following members were present: Rich, Foland, Hoady, Knicker, Horn, Bell, Evans, Simons, Beardsley, Lawrence, Kelly, Moran.

**WANTLAND WITHDRAWN.**

Before the minutes were read Councilman Wantland excused himself to attend the meeting in the chamber of commerce to discuss the Deep Creek railway proposition.

## THE PROCEEDINGS.

The Pacific Pavement company asked to lease the Warm Springs graded rods in order to hasten the work of paving. Committee on public grounds.

M. Collins and others asked for an extension of water main on Third south street. Committee on Waterworks.

John L. Gengenbacher acted to be allowed to purchase a certain piece of ground owned by the city. Committee on public grounds.

L. S. Shantz, of the American Liability Insurance company, sent in a communication relating to the insurance of city employees and asked that it be considered confidential.

Moore—Well, let us have it read.

Evans—I don't think it fair to treat the postman in that manner.

The President—The city has no power to enter into secret bargains and the communication will be filed.

G. C. Crow and others laid a detective's sidewalk in front of his premises. Board of public works.

Isaac and William Jennings asked to be allowed to lay their own sidewalk in front of No. 35 and 37 South street. Board of public works.

William Budgen and others asked that South Temple street be graded in

the western part of the city at the expense of the Saltair railway. Land to the tune to come up later.

Brattin and others asked permission to run their express and omnibus to the city market.

J. H. Benneke asked for an extension of watermain from present terminus near the Ward brothers up the west side of 20th street, between First and Second south streets and asked that they be referred to the West Ward street Committee on Waterworks.

E. B. Simpson called attention to the impossible condition of Second South street between First and Second East streets and Third and Fourth West streets and asked that they be referred. Committee on Streets.

The Builders and Traders Exchange asked that two more men be added to the committee to be located Lake world mess. Committee on Streets.

H. W. Lawrence and others asked that they be not compelled to lay a sidewalk in front of the property known as the Kimball block on First south street, between First and Second south streets and asked that they be referred. Committee on Streets.

The Salt Lake Soda Water company sent in a sealed bid for permission to extend water main on First south street from the northwest corner of 17th and 18th streets.

H. W. Lawrence and others asked that they be not compelled to lay a sidewalk in front of the property known as the Kimball block on First south street from 17th to 18th streets.

James H. Linck asked for a sewer extension on Third South street between Second and Third East streets.

C. L. Hamilton and others asked that a ditch be constructed either on Ninth West street to the Jordan River or on First South street to the canal or river. Jordan canal and Irrigation committee.

AGAINST DIRECTED LAWS.

The Combined Federation of Labor sent in a communication protesting against the appointment by the City and County Engineers of private contractors to lay out sidewalks from outside of the territory. They also submitted a copy of a telegram sent to the company by the N. L. Employers Association asking that the city be prohibited from awarding contracts to the two additional firms and could send all that were needed.

The matter was referred to a special committee of three, with instructions to look into the matter at once.

PENITENTIARY REAPPOINTED.

The mayor sent in a communication announcing the appointment of A. J. Pennington as land and water commissioner at a salary of \$100 per month. Certified.

AFTER THE STREET RAILWAYS.

The committee composed of the city engineer and the street railway companies do not comply with the request of the board in putting down their respective pavements, as this duty by the contractors, that the city should do the paving and laying the strip of stone base and laying the strip of asphaltic paving and into which the asphaltic paving

is keyed, and that the companies is charged for the same. Referred to the city engineer and city attorney.

STRUCTURE APPRAISAL.

The board of public works reported that they had sent out to S. H. Carrington, H. H. Large, T. F. Griffith and D. G. Davis to inspect the structures near the Ward brothers up the west side of 20th street, between First and Second south streets and these were to be sold.

Committee on Waterworks.

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AT THE PENITENTIARY.

The city engineer reported that in order to meet the cost which was assigned to him he had employed eight additional men at a cost of \$100 per month who were now engaged in taking levels for the extension of grades in plot D, and for the houses. Adopted.

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
