SALT Lake's building record, for the year 1901, is one of which the city as well as every resident thereof may well feel proud. Permits have been issued representing the erection, according to official figures, of buildings costing the substantial sum of \$1,426,360. Every dollar of this—and, in fact, very much more—stands for the betterment of the city in the way of giving it more new business blocks and private residences.

More, as will be readily seen from the citation of three or four notable instances. To illustrate that fact: During the present year the Deseret News building, the finest business block between Denver and San Francisco, has been reared from the foundation to the sixth story. Yet there is nothing to show in the records of Building Inspector Ulmer, that this is so. Within the same period a vast amount of work has been done on the Catholic cathedral. There is nothing in the tabulation that follows to indicate that truth. A very snug fortune has been spent on the Kearns' mansion within the past twelve months. Here the record is again silent. The reason for this is not hard to find. Permission for all of these improvements was granted last year. Yet not less than \$300,000 was expended on these three structures alone. These are, of course, the most conspicuous cases; but there are many others which it may be conservatively estimated will swell the sum total another \$100,000. So all in all the showing is exceedingly good.

SCARCITY OF BRICK.

Building operations were more or less hindered during the entire season on account of the scarcity of brick and other material. The demand upon all of the brick manufacturing plants was altogether in excess of their capacity, a fact that led to the organization a few weeks ago of the largest brick making company in the State. This is now preparing for the big rush that is certain to come next year. Several new smaller concerns are also in the field for business in 1902; and the prospects are that all wants will be easily supplied during the new year.

SOME OF THE LARGER PERMITS.

Some of the permits for the most expensive buildings were issued to the following persons: A. W. McCune, \$30,000 for superstructure to residences for which a permit for a \$20,000 foundation was issued last year; University of Utah buildings, \$55,000; Elks' club house, \$30,000; L. D. S. University building, \$25,000; Z. C. M. L., repairs, \$20,000; Stephen Hays, double house, \$17,000; Henry Phipps, flat near bank of trade building, \$17,000; Spencer Clawson, business block on First South street, \$15,000; F. D. Clift, business block, on Main near Third South street, \$15,000; J. B. Congriff, residence on South Temple, \$15,000. The expenditures of \$10,000 and upwards are numerous. The private residences that have been built during the year belonging to this class are sufficient to prove that the city is fast becoming the permanent abode of men of wealth—that it is sustaining the reputation that it has so long had, of being "a city of homes." The new residences that have gone up in 1901 that have cost from \$2,500 to \$100,000, are numbered by the score. They are of a character, too, that tell eloquently of the good taste of their owners and builders. Sanitary appointments and other modern necessities and conveniences have entered freely into their construction and arrangement. How well Mr. Ulmer, the city's building inspector, is pleased with the results of the year following is shown in the annexed statement:

BUILDING INSPECTOR'S REPORT.

"I am extremely pleased with the results of this year's building," writes Inspector Ulmer, for the Christmas "News." "In comparison with last year, the improvement is very perceptible. Notwithstanding some of the finest buildings of which our city can boast were reported last year, notably the Deseret News building and the Kearns' residence, either of which would be equal to a multitude of ordinary buildings, the improvements for the year aggregate many thousands of dollars more than last year. The most gratifying feature for this year is the quality of the improvements.

"Investors are realizing that our city is destined to be of importance sufficient to warrant a better class of buildings, and they are supplying them as rapidly as building material can be furnished, and still the demand is far in excess of the supply. Over five hundred building permits have been issued this year, and many plans have been prepared for buildings in line for their completion before the winter season. The year commenced early in the spring, and I predict that the building improvements for next year will be far greater than they have been this. I understand that the brick makers will manufacture brick during the winter months and be able to supply the demand for next year, so that improvements will not be delayed as in the past. Another very pleasing feature for the city is the tendency to fire proof construction for our business houses. It will soon demonstrate to our business men that they cannot afford to occupy the antiquated structures with their valuable stocks of merchandise and will demand modern buildings. When this demand is once put into force and it is sure to be, in the near future, our city will take on an air of importance sufficient to cause the old business center to be demolished.

"This may appear to be a dream, or a very speculative proposition, but it has been the history of every city that

has ever survived the crushing effects of a business boom, and it is not until a reasonable footing, as our city surely has. Prospects for genuine improvements could not be better than at this time if we had the ordering, or the making of them ourselves. Building operations for the year 1901 will aggregate at least 20 per cent in advance of what the actual figures show, as persons who take out permit are always desirous of undervaluing their improvements so as to escape as much of the burden of taxing as possible.

NEW BUILDING OF "THE DESERET NEWS," AND FUTURE HOME OF THE OREGON SHORT LINE RAILROAD.

The beautiful building shown above is now nearing completion at the head of Main (East Temple) street, Salt Lake City, and is easily the handsomest business edifice in the intermountain region. It is six stories in height, is entirely fireproof, being constructed throughout of stone, brick, iron, steel and cement. The Deseret News will occupy the entire first floor with its book department and business office, the basement with its presses, and a suite of rooms on the third floor for its editorial quarters. All the remainder of the plant, job, bindery, linotypes, etc., will be located in the "Annex," a new building to be erected on the west of the corner edifice. The removal to the new quarters will be made early in the year 1902, and the next edition of the "Christmas News" will be issued from the paper's new home.

The Oregon Short Line Railroad company has leased the three upper stories of the main building, and one floor of the "Annex" for a term of ten years, all the general offices of the great system being located there.
