## IN THE DISTRICT COURT.

Before Judge Roalp in the Second district court:

Mike McCormick was sentenced to eight years in the State penitentiary, George Powers and Fred Wilson were each given six years in the penitentiary, they were tried and found guilty last Friday. Sheriff Layne took the trio to Salt Lake.

The case of Hooper, Plain City and Wilson Irrigation companies vs the Davis and Weber County Canal companies was continued without date.

In the case of Metalo vs Hull, it was ordered that an injunction be issued against defendant as to water, and each party pay his own expenses.

In the matter of the estate of James Harrop, deceased; letters testamentary were issued to James Harrop.

Ben Terres was appointed administrator of the estate of George Marth with \$500 bonds.

## LICENSED TO WED.

Marriage licenses have been granted to T. W. Hunter, 23, of West Weber and Miss Elsie Stafer, 20, of Wilson, Weber Co.; Thorold L. Hammer, 26, of Salt Lake, and Miss Dolly Poulsen, 23, of Milton, Morgan Co.; Newman L. Blodgett, 21, and Miss Laura M. Marble, 18, both of North Ogden, Weber Co.

This makes a total Weber county levy under Ogden City of 6 mills. While last year, 1899, and in 1898, it was 5 1/2 mills, being a deduction of 1/2 mill over these years. The county levy on the property outside of Ogden City is 8 mills, being a deduction of 1/2 mill as compared with the amount of years above. The State board of equalization and the city council had fixed the levy for the State and city treasurer and the county assessor to meet the levy for Ogden City school purposes makes the following total levy on all property in Ogden City for 1900:

State, 5 mills.

Ogden City, 10 1/2 mills (increase 2% miles over 1899).

Ogden City schools, 7 1/2 mills.

Weber county, 6 mills (decrease 1/2 mill over 1899).

Making a total of 32 mills for 1900 as compared with a total of 30 mills for 1898 and 1899. The increase being accounted for because the city levy is 10 1/2 mills compared with 8 mills, and the board of county commissioners having made a reduction of 1/2 mill in the county levy, thus leaving a net increase of 2 mills or 20 cents on each \$100 of valuation.

The taxpayers owning property in Ogden City will this year pay \$32 per \$100 of valuation as compared with \$30 per \$100 in 1898.

As heretofore reported the total valuation in Weber county this year \$17,550, divided between the city and county outside of Ogden City, is follows: Ogden City, \$5,69,944; county, \$5,671,400; town, \$7,55,120; county, \$2,311,260, making a total of \$10,65,324.

## SALARY SCHEDULE.

The master of salaries for the county officials was taken up and fixed for the two years next succeeding, to-wit, 1901 and 1902, as follows:

County commissioners, \$600 each.

Court attorney, \$1,000, a decrease of \$200.

Court clerk and ex-officio county auditor, \$1,500, an increase of \$200.

County recorder, \$1,200.

Sheriff, \$1,300.

County surveyor, \$300; a decrease of \$200.

County treasurer, \$1,500; an increase of \$200.

County assessor, \$1,000; an increase of \$200.

Of the increases in treasurer's and assessors' salaries aggregating \$200, the State will pay one-half, therefore in the salaries as shown by the schedule, as far as Weber county is liable, there is a decrease of \$100 per annum.

The report of Commissioner Smith on the boundary survey between Cache and Weber counties was received and adopted.

Adams Nursery Co. asked permission to construct a telephone line from city limits along center of 24th Street to canning factory. The request was laid over for one week.

Mr. John Endland of Plain City was admitted to the county infirmary.
