AUTO TOUR FOR ORPHAN CHILDREN

Youngsters of St. Ann's and State Street Homes to Go Sight Seeing.

SALT LAKE AUTOMOBILE CLUB

Its Members Decide to Give Up Thursday Evening Next to the Benefit of Little Homeless Tots.

The children of Salt Lake who know its various orphanages as their homes, are to be made merry Thursday evening in a long automobile ride. It will be in the nature of a tour of Salt Lake, and there will be about 40 cars in line, carrying as passenger nearly 200 small children.

The outing is planned by the Salt Lake Automobile club to give the children an evening aboard the cars which are daily passing their State street and Twelfth South street homes. Three years ago the little tots were taken out and enjoyed the trip so much that it was decided to make it an annual affair.

Yesterday morning officers of the automobile club took the matter up with Bishop Scanlan, in charge of St. Ann's orphanage, and with directors of the State street orphanage. The result was a decision that Thursday evening would be the time for the drive, and that as many cars as their owners cared to have used for the purpose would be supplied. Needless to say no child will be left home.

The machines for the tour will assemble in front of the Bell Telephone building at 7 p. m. and will then be loaded with the candy from the J. G. McDonald factory. After that they will proceed to the two orphanages, take aboard the children, and then head for Liberty park and the South Temple street. The spin will be two hours in length, and will be maintained at a conservative rate of speed, each car remaining half a block behind that immediately ahead of it.

TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION.

Some Things to Be Considered at Coming Annual Session.

From Aug. 10 to 15, the international Typographical union will hold its fourth session at Boston, and some of the things to be considered at this session, illustrate the marked trend of organized labor towards creating a community interest in each other engaged in the business the union happens to represent.

This particular session will consider at length the matter of old age pensions, the securing of more sanitary working rooms for members, and the maintenance of a home for aged union printers. All three are in sympathy with Roosevelt's "employer's liability" bill, which throws upon each industry the task of caring for the aged of its members who are worn out in service or are crippled through accident.

The reports of officers which are to form the basis for action at the Boston convention have been received in Salt Lake and they fill a book of 171 pages. In his report President Lynch takes up the matter of relations and cooperation with the Treasurer J. W. Bramwood shows that \$774,953.24 was taken in during the year, and \$83,799.36 was paid out. The membership is given at 43,000.

Showers or thunderstorms are reported in portions of Utah, New Mexico, Oregon, the Dakotas, Missouri, Oklahoma, Gulf and Atlantic states, Ohio valley, Tennessee and Lake region, with heavy rainfall at Pittsburgh and New Orleans, 1.65 and 1.15 inches, respectively. The temperature changes are unimportant as a rule.

SHERIFF DISARMS WARRING ALIENS

County Authorities Search Foreigners Employed at Garfield Smelters.

FIND DYNAMITE IN A TRUNK

Officers Believe It Was Concealed There By Man Who Intended to Use It Unlawfully.

The religious warfare between foreigners at Garfield and Bingham has assumed such serious proportions that Sheriff Emery decided upon drastic measures late Saturday afternoon. Fearing another series of brutal murders, he concluded that the best thing to do would be to disarm those who were engaged in the fight, and arming his deputies with search warrants, he sent them to Garfield with orders to seize all deadly weapons they could find in the possession of the warring factions.

Deputy Sheriffs Sharp, Emery, Steele, Smith and Reed went to the camp in time to meet the 3 o'clock shift coming and going from work. Every man was searched and their cabins and tents were also visited by the officers of the law. Thirty or 40 members of the two factions were armed of rifles, revolvers, shotguns and knives.

FIND DYNAMITE IN TRUNK.

In a tent of one of the alleged ringleaders, the officers found concealed in a trunk, a quantity of dynamite. It is the belief of the authorities that the man had the dynamite for the purpose of blowing up some of his religious enemies. The officers found a wagon load of firearms and knives. They were brought into Salt Lake and confiscated. The 11 o'clock shift was also searched, but only a few weapons were discovered. What was going on and had secreted their weapons before the officers could get to them. It is not likely that complaints will be made against those who carried deadly weapons, but it is the purpose of the officers to keep a close watch on the men and take away their firearms to prevent any more fatalities if possible.
