

## BIKE RACES AT THE SAUCER LAST NIGHT

Three Records Were Smashed by  
The Speedy Amateurs  
And "Pros."

### SAMUELSON AND LAWSON.

Again Displayed Good Head Work in  
The Three Mile Professional Event  
And Champion Won.

That the bike races at the saucer last evening were about the fastest witnessed by the local saucer this season, is evidenced by the fact that three records were smashed. It seemed that each and every rider was determined to get first money, and in each event there was a hearty fight for first place.

In the second heat of the quarter-mile amateur, Fred West broke the record formerly made by Hume. In the next heat Hume made the same time as West, but the former is entitled to the record because he established it.

In the two-mile lap amateur event, Wilcox proceeded to smash things, and clinched off two seconds of the record made by E. B. Heagren. In the three-mile professional event, Billy Samelson's record of 6:09.42, was broken by Iver Lawson, who wheeled over the distance in 5:59.42.

In this race there was the same effort to shut out Samelson and Samelson, and while the latter did not succeed in getting the Provo boy to take four places, Lawson and Samelson had a combination that landed the champion first with a record of 5:59.42.
