

PARTY LINES WILL BE IGNORED

With Few Exceptions Each Member Will Fight for His Home District.

WILL BE NO MINORITY BILL.

Unless "Gag" Rule on Amendments is Adopted—Not Likely Will Be Any Lengthy Debate.

Washington, March 18.—That party lines will be eliminated during the consideration in the house of the Payne bill today was indicated by the action of Representative Broussard of Louisiana, in withdrawing today from the meeting of the minority members of the committee because he differed from their views on the tariff.

With few exceptions, each member will fight for the interests of his home district. There is little prospect of a lengthy general debate, and the consideration of the measure under the five-minute rule for amendment will be proceeded with as soon as possible, probably by the end of this week.

Unless a "gag" rule for the prevention of unlimited amendments under the five-minute rule is brought in, the minority members of the way and means committee will not report a separate bill. Their report will be drafted by minority leader Clark and will severely criticize the wool schedule. It is contended by the Democrats that it has not been sufficiently placed to place it on a revenue basis. Numerous amendments will be offered and heated discussions are anticipated.

The inheritance tax, Philippine free trade, internal revenue and maximum and minimum features of the bill are endorsed by the minority leaders, and there has been much favorable comment upon the measure by Democratic congressmen. Chairman Clark today declared that he had not sufficient time to look into its provisions to enable him to comment upon them.

It is understood that the minority leaders favor the removal of the restrictions on the quantity of sugar and tobacco that can be admitted from the Philippine islands free of duty. On the other hand, several southern Democrats are endeavoring to have the free trade provision amended so as to exclude rice, their contention being that rice could be sent from the Philippine islands to the United States markets and sold for 2 cents a pound it admitted free from the islands. This they say, would ruin the rice industry in this country.

A number of Democrats will join with some Republicans in an effort to keep the duty assessed by the Dingley bill upon lumber. The fight for free lumber will be headed by Champ Clark, it is understood. He has frequently expressed himself in bitter terms regarding the lumber situation in this country. During the tariff hearings he arraigned the lumber magnates and delved deep into the intricacies of the stumpage and railroad land grants.

It is thought there will be no serious opposition to the tariff on tea. The ways and means committee estimates that the tariff on tea sent from the government for the fiscal year 1910, provided the Payne bill is in operation, will be \$362,065,885. As the amount for which revenue will be required for 1910 is estimated at \$572,221,701, it is claimed the deficit for 1910 will be about \$10,000,000.

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BURNED BY MOLTEN BRASS.

New York, March 18.—Three men were seriously injured late last night by the explosion of several hundred pounds of molten brass in a crucible in a foundry in the East River district. One of the men was killed and two others are in a critical condition.

BE WAS HANGED THREE TIMES.

Chicago, March 18.—Neil Coulton, of Chicago, was hanged three times by a mob of about 50 men in a barn in the city. The man was hanged by a rope around his neck and was then cut down and hanged again. He was cut down a third time and then hanged a fourth time. The man was finally cut down and his body was thrown into a river.

INDIANS NEARLY STARVING.

San Francisco, Cal., March 18.—Word was received here today from the Indian agent at Fort Bidwell, Ariz., that the Indians in that section are nearly starving. The agent reports that the Indians have been driven from their homes by the army and are now wandering about in search of food. The agent has requested that the government supply the Indians with food.

WORLD AMEND CONSTITUTION.

Washington, March 18.—Believing the Constitution of the United States should be amended so as to give the people the right to elect the president and vice president, Representative Broussard of Louisiana has introduced a resolution providing for an amendment to that effect.

RECOGNITION FOR WESTERN SENATORS

Filling Republican Vacancies on Senate Committees Gives Them Greater Representation.

SMOOT AND SUTHERLAND.

They Are Given Places on the Finance and Judiciary Committees.

Washington, March 18.—The work by the committee on committees of filling Republican vacancies on senate committees was concluded today, resulting in giving to western senators very much greater representation on important committees.

This is regarded as the direct result of the campaign that has been carried on for a long time by the "insurgents." It is asserted that never before in the history of the senate have the western states been so fully represented on the important committees. There had been suggestions of a refusal on the part of some western senators to go into Republican caucuses Monday to confirm the assignments unless the distribution was satisfactory. The Democratic steering committee is still at work endeavoring to make a disposition of Democratic vacancies. The Republican committee on committees will accept without question the Democratic recommendation.

The work of distributing the Republican assignments has been a complex concession to the younger and western members.

Most of the vacancies have gone to the far west.

One new committee, that on conservation of natural resources, has been created.

The committee on finance, as reorganized, contains one more senator from the west and two from west of the Missouri river. Vacancies were caused by the death of Senator Allison and by the retirement of Senators Platt, Hanchborough and Hopkins. Those vacancies have been filled by the appointment of Senators Lodge of Massachusetts, Flint of California, Smoot of Utah and Culberson of Illinois. The latter over Republicans are Aldrich of Rhode Island, Burton of Michigan, Penrose of Pennsylvania and Hale of Maine.

Senator Culberson gives up his membership on the committee on appropriations to take the place formerly held by his colleague, Mr. Hopkins, who had not yet been re-elected by the Illinois legislature.

The Democrats will designate Mr. Simmons of North Carolina to take the place formerly held by Senator Teller, the other Democratic members of the finance committee being Senators Daniel of Virginia, Money of Mississippi, Bailey of Texas and Tallaferro of Florida.

The three vacancies on the committee on appropriations will be filled by the appointment of Senators Curtis of Kansas, Burkett of Nebraska and Keam of New Jersey.

The one Republican vacancy on the committee of foreign relations has been given to Senator Root, former secretary of state, who takes the place of Mr. Foraker.

Senators Sutherland and Borah will go on Judiciary, and Senators Dixon of Montana and Brown of Nebraska will

go on military affairs. Senator Crane will become chairman of the committee on rules and Senator Perkins will become chairman of the committee on naval affairs.

Senator Flint of California will become chairman of the committee on intercommerce and Senator La Follette will go to the head of the census committee. These are both important committees. Mr. Flint being sixth member of intercommerce committee while Senator La Follette occupied the same position on the census committee.

Senator Borah of New Hampshire will become chairman of the committee on claims, while Senator Borah will go to the head of the committee on education and labor. Mr. Carter of Montana becomes chairman of the committee on irrigation and arid lands, while Mr. Smoot of Utah becomes head of the printing committee.

Senator Daniel succeeds Senator Teller as chairman of the committee on private land claims.

APARTMENT HOUSE FIRE IN NEW YORK

New York, March 18.—The fire which swept through the seven-story apartment house in west Fifty-ninth street near the Hotel Plaza last night was not under control until 1 o'clock this morning and at that hour 100 persons were missing. They are Prof. Penrose Simpson, said to have been connected with Marietta college, Ohio, and Margaret Hithouse, a 31-year-old girl, who lived on the fifth floor with her parents. There is hope that both escaped and were lost in the crowd. The fire was extinguished and reports with sensational rescue. A great crowd blocked the streets below and

cheered the firemen in their work. Ten persons including three firemen were injured. Seven tenants were carried down extension ladders from the burning building after sustaining burns which were painful but not necessarily fatal. The building was practically destroyed. Those who were not taken to the hospital were cared for by physicians from the Plaza, which became a place of refuge.
