Opposition to Barton Revoked.—The "Lost Spaniard" Line.

Replies Correspondence.

Provo, March 27.—The Provo Bar association held a session on Saturday night. It being represented that James B. Barton was a resident of Utah Territory, and that he was entitled for the position by the Ogden bar, the following resolutions were introduced, discussed, adopted and the secretary instructed to certify a copy to the attorney general:

Whereas, The Provo Bar association at a special session held on the 15th day of March, 1905, passed a resolution protesting against the appointment of James B. Barton to the office of chief justice of Utah Territory, and

Whereas, The said resolution was passed solely upon the representation that Mr. Barton was not a resident of this Territory, and

Whereas, We are now convinced that Mr. Barton is a resident of Utah Territory, and that he is merely lawfully admitted to practice,

Resolved, First, that we revoke the resolution protesting against the appointment of James B. Barton to the chief justiceship of Utah, and

Second, that the secretary be instructed to send a copy of these resolutions to the attorney general of the United States.

Committees were appointed to confer with Salt Lake and Ogden attorneys in relation to the removal of Judge Blackburn from the bench. All of the Provo attorneys, with but two exceptions, have signed the resolution praying for his removal.

The report that there was a mining claim in the vicinity of Provo, with quartz assaying \$240 to the ton is founded on the fact that a few pieces of float have assayed that sum. The alleged low hydraulic claim was a weed and a few years ago by the Emersons, and was inserted because the ore was not rich enough to pay for mining. There is no reason to suppose that the mine has improved.

President Smith has sufficiently recovered from his recent accident to be around again.

A house to marry has been leased to William F. Smith and Mary Jensen, both of this city.

Prof. Gile has received word from the First Presidency granting the use of the Salt Lake Tabernacle to the B. Y. A. Choral society on Friday evening, April 14th. The society will work assiduously until that date in preparing to give a first class program.

Provo, March 27.—The Brigham Young Academy Choral Society has arranged to give a grand festival in the Tabernacle on the evening of April 14th, and a choice program has been arranged for the occasion. Some of the best talent of Utah will appear.

W. C. Cline, our own Utah violinist, will make his debut in the Tabernacle with the choral society on this date. Miss Roberts, the first soprano of Utah, will be heard for the second time in Salt Lake on this occasion.

The Fourth year girls club of Provo, the Mendenhall and Payne brothers' prize quartette, Mr. John Buckley, bass, Mr. W. D. Roberts, Jr., baritone, and other favorites have been engaged making a fine representation of musical talent.

"The Gypsy Life," by Schumann, will be one of the features of the concert. This selection has never been heard in Utah except at the festival by the B. Y. A. choral society. Their last rendition of it is said to have been very fine. Dr. G. C. Phillips is the accompanist and Prof. H. E. Olsen, conductor.

OGDEN.

Another Fire Alarm.—Repairing the Trust Building.—Loss of Bonds.—Railway Notes.—Base Ball and Other Notes.

Manager Treadwell of the Ogden baseball club went to Salt Lake this morning in the interest of the proposed Utah baseball league. Before returning he will also visit Ogden and Park City and make an effort to interest the clubs of those two cities in the organization. From present indications Ogden will have a remarkably strong team. An organization has already been perfected, some new material has been infused into the nine and the success of last season will undoubtedly be greatly outdone. The following players will carry Ogden's season during the season of 1905: Treadwell, Taylor, English, Barnes, Greenwell, Franklin, Maguire, Ferguson, Root, Harkness and Thompson. The boys practiced for several hours yesterday and were off some of the rough edges. It is proposed to open the season with a game on April 10th.

Last night's session of the council was an eventful one and means a great deal to the development of the city. The issue of \$100,000 improvement bonds was authorized, but not until President Bessell had entered a vigorous protest in the shape of a resolution providing that the proposition be submitted to the taxpayers. It is almost needless to say the council voted him out. In fact his amendment was not even considered on the ground that he was out of order. Under the provisions of the new ordinance passed Ogden will have a sewer and plumbing inspection. Further time was granted the committee, which occupies two days and part of one night investigating the public character of the improvement made against Chief Bessell.

The recent snow slide in Weber canyon near Devil's gate did more damage than at first estimated. It is reason of the slide, communication by team has been cut off between Weber, Morgan and Summit counties. For a distance of between 30 and 40 miles has been cut off by a deposit from twenty-five to fifty feet of snow, trees and great boulders. Thus far nothing has been done by Morgan county to clear the slide, the electrician and the only mode the people now have of getting in and out of the two counties by the Weber river route is on the railroad.

At a general meeting of the Latter-day Saints held in the Tabernacle Sunday afternoon, a resolution was adopted appointing L. W. Shortt, C. F. Middleton, N. C. Fryer, Samuel P. Brown, K. M. McQuinn, Harman White, Edwin Stoddard and T. J. Stevens and James Taylor as a committee to visit the afflicted communities and secure from them, if possible, a special rate for the people of Weber county who propose to visit Salt Lake City and attend the Temple dedicatory services.

The board of directors of the Reform school held a monthly meeting yesterday afternoon. There were present Kimball, Woolsey, Rogers, Adams and Secretary Holman. After a thorough investigation, Contractor Hill was allowed \$1000 because of the extra work. Wm. Heald, of Salt Lake, and Jerome Smith, of Tooele, were discharged from the institution. Mr. Rogers reported that he had secured \$10,000 better school insurance.

Several cases of glanders among the horses of Ogden and Weber county have been reported and the board of health evidently have some work before them to keep the disease down. It is dangerous alike to horses and humans to have glanders, and various ways. Under the former administration all diseased animals were promptly condemned, killed and cremated.

The special conveying the Japanese exhibit and colony to the World's Fair reached Ogden today and went out on the Ogden Pacific. It has been engaged to thirty cars and a double header. Several engineers were sent to Ogden to view the train and to load, a description of which appeared in the News yesterday.

The fire department made a run last night in response to an alarm from a box which called it to the corner of Wall and Twenty-first where fire was discovered in a residence. Neighbors with a bucket, brigade extinguished the flames before any damage was done and the aid of the department was not needed.

The United States marshal yesterday sent at public auction about thirty boxes of dry goods, books and shoes, attached some time ago at the suit of M. Meyer & Co., of Portland, to the property of the bankrupt firm. The merchandise was sent to Ogden consigned to M. Kohn.

Percy Moffett has been granted a decree of divorce from Letta Moffett by Judge Mitchell. The wife, in which he alleged that his wife refused to live with him, but was instead leading a dissolute life for another man. Moffett was given the custody of the only child.

Thirty mechanics were put to work on the Utah Loan and Trust building and the damaged structure, remained a great bit of industry. The work of the necessary repairs will occupy between thirty and sixty days.

Deputy Marshal Bletcher yesterday attached eighteen gasoline engines stored with Ogden. Several of the property of the E. C. Ogden Hardware company, of Salt Lake.

Work on the excavations for the foundation of the buildings of the new plant is progressing rapidly and laying the stone walls will soon begin.

The little son of F. W. Velt, who was smothered about five weeks ago, died yesterday from the injuries received at that time.
