ITEMS FROM THE CONVENTIONS!

Woodville, Mississippi, 16.—The Re-  
publican says there is neither meat, nor  
breadstuffs, in Wilkinson county, to  
feed the whites or blacks three months  
longer, nor money to buy more.

London, 16.—A man, believed to be  
Deasy, who was rescued at Manchester,  
has been captured in Ireland. The  
Government is very active in arresting  
Fenians.

Washington, 16.—Senate.—The Com-  
missioners of Internal Revenue are al-  
lowed the privilege of the floor, during  
the consideration of the measures affect-  
ing the revenue.

The House, not having concurred in  
the Senate amendments to the bill to re-  
peal the cotton tax, it came up and was  
laid over for the present. Sherman offered  
an amendment exempting raw cotton  
being imported from duty. The House  
deficiency bill, making appropriations  
for the execution of the reconstruction  
act, etc., was taken up by the  
Senate, and the Finance Committee  
offered sundry amendments, increasing  
the pay of the clerks of both houses,  
and inserting appropriations for news-  
papers, stationary, etc. The amend-  
ments were adopted. Other amend-  
ments were offered and the bill was  
debated at considerable length and  
finally passed.

The bill to repeal the cotton tax was  
discussed without action. The Senate  
went into executive session, and then ad-  
journed till Monday.

House.—The bill extending the time  
for the completion of the Dubuque and  
Sioux City Railroad was taken up, dis-  
cussed and finally passed.

The House resumed consideration of  
the reconstruction bill. Several speeches  
were made on both sides of the question,  
and the House finally took a recess till  
7 o'clock. For general debate the  
speeches were limited to half an hour.

Baltimore, 16.—The Legislature have  
had two ballots for Senator, without  
result.

Boston, 16.—The four hundred in-  
mates of Deer Island Institution have  
suddenly taken ill from the effects of  
poison, supposed to be arsenic, admin-  
istered by unknown parties in the food  
or water. It is believed that all will re-  
cover except one matron.

San Francisco, 16.—The trial of Cap-  
tain H. O. Windsor, of the ship Intrepid,  
for cruelty to and beating a seaman, and  
afterwards setting him afloat off Easter  
Island, creates much interest among all  
classes. The court room is thronged  
every day, and the appearance of the  
Captain is the signal for hisses, groans,  
and attempts at personal violence.

Arrangements are being made for a  
prize fight between Tommy Chandler  
and Billy Dwyer, for a purse of \$10,000,  
or forfeit the money up. Time and  
place not named.

Arrived: the Elvezia from Glasgow,  
via Falkland Islands.

Trieste, 16.—The remains of Maximil-  
lian were landed to-day with the most  
solemn ceremonies in the presence of  
an immense crowd. The public build-  
ings and private houses were every-

where draped in mourning. The almost  
entire population assembled.

Brussels.—Intelligence of the death  
of Maximilian was communicated for  
the first time to Carlotta four days ago.  
The effect of the announcement is not  
yet known.

New York, 16.—Deasy who escaped  
from Manchester and was reported cap-  
tured in Ireland, is in America, and has  
addressed several meetings of Fenians.

London, 16.—It is reported that Lord  
Clarendon and Lord Bloomfield have  
gone to Rome to induce the Pope to use  
his influence with the inhabitants of  
Ireland for the suppression of the Fen-  
ian agitation.

Later advices from Rio represent Lo-  
pez to be compelled to withdraw from  
Parana and fall back upon Ascension.  
The allied army has been heavily rein-  
forced.

The aggressive policy of Russia causes  
much alarm in Turkey. A writer in the  
Northern Post, of St. Petersburg, de-  
clares that Russia does not desire an  
extension of Territory; her only object  
is to secure the safety of the Christian  
subjects of the Porte.

London.—Farragut's fleet has arrived  
and received every attention from the  
city authorities.

Paris, 16.—It is reported that banker  
Decker intends to bring a suit against  
the French Government for thirteen  
million dollars due on Franco-Mexican  
bonds.

Washington, 17.— There are no new  
developments in the Stanton case.  
Stanton expresses a determination to  
hold on to the office. It is not believed  
that the President will resort to extreme  
measures.

Richmond.—In the Convention,  
Judge Underwood, leaving the chair  
for the purpose, offered a resolution in  
favor of giving the franchise and right  
to hold office to every male citizen. He  
made a long speech in favor of the res-  
olution.

Jackson.—A resolution was offered in  
the Convention that all persons are en-  
titled to equal civil and political rights,  
and forbidding the property qualifica-  
tion forever and debarring the duellist  
from the privilege of citizenship.

Montgomery.—A meeting of the Con-  
servative leading citizens of Alabama  
has been in session here two days.  
They have recommended the people to  
abstain from voting at the election of  
the 4th and 5th of February.

Havana.—Advices from St. Domingo  
state that after the bloody attack of  
Gen. Ovendo, Bassiel took the town of  
Oscua and established a provisional  
government. Ponto Plata is surren-  
dered to the revolutionists after a san-  
guinary combat. President Cabral and  
Cabinet skedaddled, leaving the Treas-  
ury empty. Baez is in the field in  
person and expects to take the capitol  
by fire and sword.

Santa Anna is very busily occupied.  
Some curious developments in regard  
to his intrigues are expected.

Philadelphia, 16.—The Grand Army  
of the republic are holding a national  
convention, and have elected General  
Logan commander in chief. They have  
passed resolutions in favor of Grant for  
President.

Washington, 17.—The McAdie case  
will come up before the Supreme Court  
to-day.

Atlanta, 17.—The comptroller has  
been removed for having refused to re-  
cognize General Meade or the authority  
of an army officer he appointed.

Chicago, 17.—The hardware house of  
Stevens Beatty, on Lake Street, was  
burned this morning. Loss \$50,000.

Memphis, 17.—The Republican Con-  
vention has instructed the delegates to  
the State Convention, to favor Grant  
and Brownlow.

Washington, 17.—A careful canvass  
of the Senate shows there is no doubt of  
the rejection of Cox, as minister to  
Austria.

Virginia City, M. T., 17.—Thermome-  
ter 36 above zero. Clear and pleasant.

Helena, 17.—Thermometer 10 above  
zero. Clear and pleasant.

The Tortola inhabitants, whom the  
flood and earthquake spared, are in a  
fair way to perish by starvation and  
plague. They are almost entirely with-  
out food, and many of the dead are yet  
unburied.
