Think of a federation of fellows whose cardinal teaching is that all law, all rules, all regulations, are tyrannical and should be done away with! "Anarchism as an organized movement" sounds comical, of course, for the reason that anarchism signifies distinctly and directly a condition without organization, without government, without law, without the slightest vestige of authority. Nevertheless the inconsistent persons who term themselves anarchists are banded together wherever they are to be found, and last year there was in Amsterdam an interna-tional conference of anarchists! That's really funny.

Very recently thunders against an-rchy have been hurled down from archy several high places. President Roosevelt sent a message to congress declaring that the slimy serpent must be choked. Secretary Straus of the commerce and labor department, himself a foreign born citizen, has promulgated the doctrine that foreign born criminals must not be permitted to enter our gates, and the secretary has given rigid directions for the detection and exclusion of all suspected anarch-ists. Frank P. Sargent, commissioner general of immigration, is carrying on a campaign with that end in view. Congress has passed a law requiring the deportation of imported anarchists when caught with the goods on-if they can be caught.

Just then came the bomb, that horrid, hissing, sizzling rocket-like missile which inaugurated in the new world a new reign of terror. It was thrown

smack into the ranks of the police, exploding and killing eight of the officers outright and wounding many more. About sixty policemen were injured by the bomb and the pistol shots which followed. The eight men mentioned above were

arrested. It was not held that either of them threw the bomb or took a per-sonal part in the fight with the poilce. It was proved, however, that all of them had counseled violence, assassination, murder, in reforming society according to their individual theories.

> Their incendiary utterances were held directly responsible for the Haymarket assassinations.

Spies, Parsons, Fischer, Schwab, En-gel, Lingg and Fielden were sentenced to be hanged. Neebe was sentenced to fifteen years in the penitentiary. Lingg committed suicide in his cell by blow ing off half his head with a fulminate of mercury cap which he placed in his mouth two days prior to the date of execution. The sentences of Schwab and Fielden were commuted to life imprisonment. Spies, Parsons, Fischer and Engel were hanged from one scaffold and a single drop on the 11th of November, 1887.

All this simply goes toward proving what an enormous task it is going to what an enormous task it is going to be to wipe out anarchistic propagan-dists in this country. If you kill an an-archist you create a score of anarch-ists. It is true, no doubt, that the heroic measures taken in Chicago tended to restrain anarchists elsewhere from active violence. But there is about anarchy as known in this coun-try a peculiar quality which now and then gets into the noggin of an indi-vidual and makes him eager to become vidual and makes him eager to become a martyr in the cause. This was the case with Leon Czolgosz, the crack-brained fellow who assassinated Pres-ident McKinley. It is alleged that young Czolgosz was incited to this desperate crime by reading the writings of Emma Goldman who is the high priestess of anarchism in America This Goldman woman is one of a small list of female anarchists who seem to exercise a remarkable infa. ence over the male persons who affect the anarchy cult. It is a fact worth noting that nearly all the anarchical noting that nearly an the anarchical outbreaks in America are inspired by the fiery speeches or the incendiary writings of women. Not long ago in Philadelphia Miss Voltairine De Cleyra who teaches languages for a living harangued a crowd which had gathered apparently for a quiet conference. Aft. er hearing Miss De Cleyre's mouthing for a few minutes a large section of the gathering resolved itself into a mob and marched toward the city hall with various sorts of threats. anarchists. Voltairine De Cleyre is an anarchist propagandist of the most dangerous She is highly educated and ex. cessively individualistic. She wants to live her own life as she likes it, with out regard to the lives of others. She believes in free love, free speech, free anything that anybody wants.
