A Heavy Bereavement—As will be seen by a notice published elsewhere, three children of Brother Nathaniel and Sister Emmeline Woodman, of Minersville, have died within fifteen days, from the effects of that dread scourge, the diphtheria, which broke out in Minersville in the early part of this month in a very malignant form.

Mrs. Jensen entered suit in the Probate Court for divorce, and was consented to the granting of the decree, on the payment by Mrs. Jensen, out of the money she had taken, of Jensen's due and all the costs in the case, such as to take what they were to the household goods. Last evening the parties went to the house in South Cottonwood where they had been living, and made a division of the goods, Jensen taking his portion away to commence life anew. It has transpired in connection with the case that the trouble has been brought about through the efforts of Mrs. Jensen's son, who is addicted to drink, and who tried to frighten the testifier who handed Jensen's things away by threatening to have him prosecuted for stealing.

TERRITORIAL BOARD OF CAN-
VASSERS APPOINTED.ORDERS OF THE COMMISSION ADOP-
TED JULY 20, 1885.

(No. 1.)

In pursuance of the provisions of Section 9 of an act entitled "An Act to amend Section 902 of the Revised Statutes of the United States, in reference to bribery and for other purposes," the following named persons, viz: Arthur L. Thomas, W. W. Riker, P. H. Lannan and John M. Young, of Salt Lake County, and James T. Hammond, of Cache County, are hereby appointed a board to canvass the returns of the general election to be held in this Territory of Utah on the third day of August, 1885, for Commissioners to locate University Lands, and for county and precinct officers; said board will convene at the rooms of the Utah Commission, at the Walker Opera House, in Salt Lake City, Utah, on Tuesday the eighteenth of August, 1885, at 10 a.m., when the election returns will be opened in the presence of this Commission, and said board will proceed to ascertain the number of votes cast for each person and a majority of the board will determine all questions coming before them, including the awarding of certificates of election and shall certify the result of the canvass to this Commission, and the same shall be entered of record.

2. The Commission will fill by ap-
pointment all vacancies in said Board of Canvassers that may occur by failure to accept or from other causes.

The Utah Commission, at the call of its members of the Legislative Assembly will be made by this Commission, and the persons who, being eligible for such offices, shall appear to be elected.

TERRITORIAL ITEMS.

CULLED FROM LATEST EXCHANGES.

"Optim Jim," the Chinaman who was stabbed last week by a crowd of roughs in an opium joint at Butte, Montana, died of his injuries on Tuesday.

At about 9 o'clock on Wednesday evening, July 20th, two masked men robbed the store of Judges and Gallacher at Provo, about six miles from Blackfoot, Idaho, and then lying in wait for a stage, shot and killed L. H. Washburne, six times and robbed the treasure box. Only one passenger escaped the coach, and he was uninjured.

On the 24th of July, a young man named Peter Olson, a resident of Clarkston, Cache County, was riding a horse in a race at that place, when the horse jumped and threw him off. He was picked up insensible and carried home in a quilt, after a short time. He still remained unconscious, and up to last evening he was still delirious and out of his head, having never regained his senses. It was thought that no bones were broken, but a severe bruise was found on the back of his head.

On Tuesday, July 21st, Thos. Smith, of Cottonwood, Wyoming, went into the timber to cut poles near where John King, an old prospector, lived. Smith was engaged in cutting him for breakfast, when he was shot through the body from left to right. It was not known at the time from whence the shot came, and as Smith fell he was caught by Anderson and taken into the tent. Another shot struck Smith in the back, when he told Anderson to flee for his life. The last shot, after passing through Smith, inflicted a severe wound in Anderson's hip. Anderson then walked four miles to Ben Van Deusen's and gave the alarm, and a party went at once to the place and the tragedy. John King, who did the shooting, was gone leaving evidence of five shots having been fired. Five small children, the wife of the deceased, and a party of friends, who were in the party there were eight or ten Indians and fifteen or twenty men. The murder was entirely unprovoked, there being no trouble between the men.

Fruit Supply.—Do not neglect the fruit supplied by the residents of Salt Lake City is being raised here this year; in fact, owing to the ravages of the caterpillars, codling moth and other insect pests, the fruit raised in this city has not only diminished in quantity, but has also deteriorated in quality, and outside sources have to be depended upon for a great deal of what is consumed. All parts of the Territory are not so unfortunate in this respect, however, for in many sections in north and south an abundance has been raised this year and of an excellent quality too. In this connection we may remark that we have noticed with regret all through this season that a considerable proportion of the fruit in the market has been shipped from California, and we cannot help thinking that a little more enterprise on the part of "our country cousins" and living along the line of railway north and south would enable them to stock the market in this city to the exclusion of such kinds of California fruit as are raised in this Territory at least.

We are pleased to see by an advertisement published elsewhere in this issue, that the Berste Creek Co-operative Store is taking hold in this matter. Pleasant Grove abounds with fine orchards and gardens, and now that the stores have taken to filling orders for fresh fruit, parties in this city can get it there by rail from this point, and when it is picked from the trees or vines, and in good condition, so that it will be preferable to that shipped from a longer distance, and in purchasing it we are supporting our own community.

Dismissed.—The suit against Chas. Wright, of Huntsville, Weber County, for illegal voting, was dismissed in the First District Court, yesterday. It appears that some years ago Mr. Wright was duly naturalized in the District Court at Provo, and had exercised his privilege as an elector. By some means his papers were lost, and he inquired of Judge Emerson, who he should do, and the Judge officially advised him to take out others, which he did subsequent to casting his vote in 1883. This was the ground of which an indictment was found, and on Mr. Wright furnishing evidence that the record of his first naturalization had been found at Provo, and Judge Emerson testifying to having given the advice, the case was promptly dismissed.

Trip to the North.—An excursion to Cache and Bear Lake valleys is announced to take place next month—the most attractive season of the year for trips into that part of the country.

Logan, Utah; Franklin, Soda Springs and Montpelier, Idaho, are the objective stations, and the excursion will leave this city on Thursday, August 13th, over the Utah Central Railway, then by the Utah and Northern to McCammon, and along the Oregon Short Line to Montpelier, Bear Lake County, Idaho, and return, a distance of about 200 miles. The tickets to points in Bear Lake Valley are good for thirty days, until September 10, with the privilege of stopping over at any station along the route either going or coming. Tickets for Cache Valley are good for five days. The fares are from this city to Logan, \$4; Franklin, \$4.50; Soda Springs and Montpelier, \$11.50; Ogden to the places named, \$1.00 less than from Salt Lake, and from Logan to Soda Springs and Montpelier, \$5. The train, which leaves this city in the morning, will reach Montpelier at night, making the through trip in one day.

OBITUARY.

LOADER.—Died, at Pleasant Grove, Utah County, at ten minutes past 11 o'clock, on Friday, July 24th, from the faith of the gospel of Jesus Christ, Amy Loader.

Sister Loader was the daughter of John Bettell and Sarah (Whitford) Bettell, and was born at Kingston, Ontario, Canada, on April 22nd, 1822, and resided in the latter part of her life at the village of Aston Rowant, in the same county.

Sister Loader was married to James Loader, who was born in another neighboring village July 10, 1798, and died on the 28th of December, 1870, on the north side of the Platte River, near Ast. Hollow. During most of her husband's residence in England, she was head gardener to Sir Henry Lambert, of Aston Rowant.

Sister Loader was a faithful wife, having had thirteen children, and, at the time of her death, so far as known to her children in Utah, had seven grandchildren and thirty-four great grandchildren, making a total of one hundred and twenty-five descendants. Of these, four children, seventeen grandchildren, and nine great grandchildren, making a total of thirty are dead. Much the larger number of those who are living reside in Utah and Idaho, the others in England. The names of the thirteen children are: Elizabeth, Anna, Emma, Maria, Mary, Jane, Sarah and Robert. John and John died in England, and Emma died in England. Of the living children, Eliza and Marshall reside in England; Elizabeth, Emma and Sarah in Idaho; Ann, Patience, Eliza, Maria and Robert in Utah.

Sister Loader was baptized into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints by Elder Alonzo Le Baron, just before Christmas, 1868, the day having been broken for the purpose.

Brother and Sister Loader, with six children, left Liverpool on the John J. Lloyd, which cleared Dec. 10, 1855, for Salt Lake City, and on arrival at the emigrant company, which arrived at New York, Feb. 15, 1856, after a long voyage.

With her husband and several of her family, Sister Loader left New York for Salt Lake City, and crossed the plains in Captain Edward Martin's hand-cart company, starting from Iowa City, July 25, and arriving at Salt Lake City, Nov. 29 of that year, excepting that her husband died on the way.

During her residence in Utah, with the exception of about two years at Springfield, Utah Co., Sister Loader resided at Pleasant Grove, and the last twenty-four years her home was on the same lot with her daughter Patience.

The funeral services were held at the residence of the deceased on Sunday afternoon, July 25th, and consisted of opening prayer by Elder Benson Walker, addresses by Bishops George Halliday and John Brown, benediction by Elder Lewis Harvey. The choir, led by Elder Wm. Frampton, sang the following:

"I am not the dead who peaceful lay,
These weary bodies down
Weep not for me
We shall know each other there"

Dedicated prayer at the grave by Bishop John Brown.
