

NYE THINKS HE WAS LIBELLED

Therefore He Wants Cottrell and Fernstrom Punished.

WARRANTS FOR ARREST.

City Attorney Alleges That He Was Maliciously Slandered and Damaged By These Council Members.

It seems that the city council is never without its sensation. By far the most sensational matter concerning its members, since the Robertson defection, came to light at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon when City Attorney Nye filed a complaint in Judge Diehl's court charging President Charles Cottrell, Jr., and Councilman F. S. Fernstrom, with criminal libel. The complaint alleges that the two councilmen submitted a report to the council containing the false, malicious and libelous statement that the city attorney's office was being investigated by the grand jury.

WARRANTS FOR ARREST.

Upon the filing of the complaint Judge Diehl issued warrants for the arrest of the councilmen and placed them in the hands of Sheriff Emery for service. The charges preferred by Mr. Nye are the outgrowth of A. J. Davis' resolution, introduced at the council several weeks ago, providing for the employment of two expert accountants to audit the books of the city officials and heads of departments who handle any of the city's funds. The resolution was submitted to the committee for consideration and a week ago last Monday night an unfavorable report upon the same was submitted to the council, signed by Cottrell, Fernstrom and Robinson, who constitute a majority of the finance committee. A. J. Davis, who is a member of that committee, refused to sign the report, and the chairman of the committee was not present so his signature was not attached.

THE OBJECTIONABLE MATTER.

The last paragraph of the report, which contains the objectionable matter, is as follows: "As there is no charge of any wrongdoing or any irregularities in any of the departments, with one or two exceptions, and as one of these, the cemetery department, is being investigated by the city attorney, the committee for that department and the other, the attorney's department, is under investigation by the grand jury, and inasmuch as the city attorney's office has been keeping more or less of a check upon the various departments in the past, and the auditor has informed the council that he will audit all department accounts not already inspected as fast as time will permit, we see no need of incurring such an enormous expense for no apparent purpose."

GRAND JURY REFERENCE.

The reference to the grand jury investigation created considerable discussion in the council and several members insisted that the grand jury had not investigated the city attorney's office. Fernstrom and Cottrell stated that the new charges were their authority for making the statement. They were informed that an attorney of Mr. Nye's office had been called before the grand jury but that it was finally decided by the council to eliminate the following paragraph from the report and it was then passed:

"While one or two exceptions, and as one of these, the cemetery department, is being investigated by the committee for that department and the other, the attorney's department, is under investigation by the grand jury, and inasmuch as the city attorney's office has been keeping more or less of a check upon the various departments in the past, and the auditor has informed the council that he will audit all department accounts not already inspected as fast as time will permit, we see no need of incurring such an enormous expense for no apparent purpose."

A PRISONER FOR NEXT TWO YEARS

Is What Frank Hayden Got For Being Too Handy With Razor.

PORTION METED OUT TODAY

Housebreaker Will Have to Serve One Year—The Case of McCarthy Was Indefinitely Postponed.

Frank Hayden, who yesterday morning entered a plea of guilty to assault with a deadly weapon, was sentenced to two years in the state prison in the criminal division of the district court. On Feb. 12, 1902, Hayden made an assault upon William Reed in a saloon at Murray and inflicted serious wounds upon him with a razor. Reed was seriously cut about the throat and it was thought for a time that he could not live. The assault was charged with assault with intent to commit murder, but he was allowed to plead guilty to assault with a deadly weapon yesterday.

CRIMINAL OFFENDERS.

John Hill, who was found guilty of housebreaking by a jury on Monday, was sentenced by the court to one year in the state prison. Hill and Dan McCarthy broke into the furniture store of J. C. Arnold on May 20 and stole a lot of merchandise. The case against McCarthy was today indefinitely postponed by the court, upon motion of the district attorney, E. H. Wagoner, and it is very probable that it will be dismissed later on.

HUSBAND IS CRUEL.

So Says Emma Arnold Who Asks For a Divorce.

Emma Arnold today filed suit for divorce in the district court against John C. Arnold on the ground of cruelty. The complaint alleges that they were married in this city on April 18, 1898, and that on June 23, 1898, defendant struck, choked and beat his wife in a cruel manner and threatened to kill her with a stove poker. She alleges that he has, about 25 times since Jan. 1, 1903, beaten and maltreated her, called her vile names and accused her of infidelity.

She alleges that he owns several horses and a number of horses all of the value of about \$3,000 from which he receives an income of about \$300 per month, and that he has \$1,000 on deposit in the bank. She asks to be awarded the custody of their two minor children, that her husband be compelled to pay her \$75 per month temporary alimony, which shall be made permanent at the final hearing of the case, and that her attorneys be paid \$300 as fees in the case. Upon an affidavit sworn to by Mrs. Arnold, Judge Hall this morning issued a temporary restraining order to prevent defendant from disposing of or encumbering any of his property.

MISSOURI PACIFIC IS HIT.

Agency Here to Close Doors and Consolidate With B. & N. and Rio Grande.

THE OPENING OF THE FISCAL YEAR OF THE DENVER & RIO GRANDE, WHICH COMMENCES JULY 1, THERE ARE A NUMBER OF CHANGES SLATED IN THE OPERATION OF THE GOULD SYSTEM. FROM A RELIABLE SOURCE IT IS LEARNED THAT TRAFFIC DIRECTOR BIRD HAS PRACTICALLY OUTLINED HIS POLICY FOR RETRENCHMENT AND THAT SALT LAKE WILL NOT BE OVERLOOKED IN THE PROCESS. FOLLOWING HIS RECENT TRIP TO THE COAST AND THIS CITY THERE WILL BE A WHOLESALE CLOSING DOWN OF GOULD AGENCIES AND AN ATTENDANT LOPPING OFF OF HEAVY SALARIES. IN THIS CONNECTION EVERY AGENCY WEST OF DENVER WILL COME UNDER THE JURISDICTION OF THE RIO GRANDE SYSTEM AND THE VARIOUS AGENTS FOR THE RIO GRANDE WILL REPORT DIRECT TO TRAFFIC MANAGER HUGHES.

The San Francisco and Salt Lake agencies of the Missouri Pacific will be abolished and consolidated with the Rio Grande. It is also stated that the Utah and California agencies of the Washah will be included in the merger.

In the east the reverse will be effective. The Rio Grande agencies will be abolished and consolidated with the Missouri Pacific and Washah according to the territory in which they are located.

This move, which has been anticipated for some weeks, will effect considerable changes in the personnel of the street railway company, involving the "recent" purchase of a tract of 85 acres over Jordan for new car barns and a town for the residence of "2,000" employees. The account also states that the land has been purchased by "President" A. J. McCune and this was a fairly story clear through—not hot air, in fact.
