The top of the tooth is crossed with long elliptical rings or cups, as in the human tooth, only there are several instead of one, proving the giant to have been a herbivorous animal. The enamel of the tooth is well premerved. The tusks are in a more decayed con-dition, but have the appearance of burnt bene. They are very porous in the center. From appearances the tusks must have been several feet long. two ploces being taken out of the same tusk about two feet long and 11% inchas in circumference at the upper end.
