United States of America: PROCLAMATION.

Whereas, Public policy demands that the domain shall be reserved for the occupancy of actual settlers in good faith, and that our people who seek homes upon such domain shall in no wise be prevented, by any unlawful interference, from sate and free entry thereon, to which they may be entitled;

and, Whereas, To secure and maintain this beneficent policy a statute was passed by the Congress of the United States, a the 25th day of February, in the car 1885, which declared it to be unlawful to make any enclosures of any public lands in any State or Territory, public lands in any State or Territory, any or which lead included within said inclosure the person, party, asso-

MADRID, 10. - There were reported sufferings of General Grant, and said on Sunday 4,171 new cases of cholera that he was undoubtedly raised up by and 1,511 deaths throughout Spain. Toulon, 10.—The sanitary condition of this city is excellent, and it is not lieved that the cholera will prevail. Gibraltar, 10.-A person having died here to-day from a malady, apparently cholera, the Spanish authorities promptly instituted a land cordon bar-ring Gibraltar from communication with the contagious Spanish territory. Marseilles, 10.—There were 300 deaths from cholera in this city during the past week.
