

STRIKING MINERS BECOME RIOTOUS

At Collieries of Dominion Coal Co.
General Manager Had
Serious Time.

HE AND POLICE CHARGE THEM

Appeals to Nearby Towns for Help
Granted—Troops Ready to Leave
At Moment's Notice.

Glance Bay, C. B., July 7.—Riotous scenes at the collieries, an assault on General Manager Duggan, the reading of the riot act, the injury of several workmen, 12 arrests, and the refusal of Mayor Douglas of Glance Bay to call out the troops at the request of the company, were the special features that marked the second day of the strike of the United Mine Workers of America in the employ of the Dominion Coal company.

The strike assumed a violent form at No. 2 and No. 3 mines early in the day. An enormous crowd composed of strikers, their friends, women and children, assembled at the collieries waiting for the men who were expected to go to work. Nearly all carried sticks, stones and eggs, and when the first man appeared they bore down on him, surrounding him, and a riot started. General Manager Duggan and a posse of police charged the crowd, to open a way for the workmen to escape. Mr. Duggan was struck and slightly wounded on the side of the head and several women and children were knocked down and a number were injured.

The entrance to the colliery was finally closed, and the rest of the workmen loyal to the company were allowed to go into the mine without further interference.

At Colliery No. 3 tonight the strikers are in charge of the situation. There, a mob, assisted by women and children, attacked the men who wanted to work and prevented all but a few from entering the mine.

The police were forced to draw revolvers to defend themselves.

At the Caledonia colliery about 500 strikers assembled in front of the main gate and all who came through the crowd to go to work were jeered, stoned and chased. Several had to run

for the gates under the protection of special constables. Others turned back. A number of men at the Caledonia mine were injured, but none seriously.

During the day 2,000 strikers surrounded the jail in which the prisoners arrested this morning are confined, and it was thought an attempt would be made to storm the place and release the men. This, however, did not occur. The police are practically powerless to control the disorderly element. Yesterday the saloons were closed, but today they were wide open again.

A coal train from Dominion No. 3 mine was held up on its way from the pit to the depot by the strikers.

General Manager Duggan has appealed to the towns of Glance Bay and Dominion and the municipality of Cape Breton for protection for his men and property, and each of these towns has sworn in special constables. The Royal Canadian mounted stationed at Halifax is ready to leave for Glance Bay at a moment's notice. Mayor Douglas of Glance Bay has refused to sign a requisition calling out troops.

TEACHERS MUST NOT BE BELITTLED

National Suicide Lies in That
Direction, Declares President
Of McDonald College.

SOME HOT SHOTS WERE FIRED

National Educational Association Has
A Very Lively Session and Hears
Something Unconventional.

Denver, July 7.—"National suicide lies in the direction of belittling the teachers."

"If the future is to be satisfying as a nation, the teacher must be regarded as a leader, and not a teacher of letters."

"Starve the colleges, starve the people."

This advice from James W. Robertson, president of McDonald college, Ste. Ann de Bellevue, Quebec.

And also—

"What's use—

"The rural teacher who hasn't even the A. B. C. of education is called a 'professor,' and so is the corn doctor, the dog trainer and clown."

"It doesn't make any difference whether it's a university, a college or a normal school, it is what is taught that does the business."

This last from Henry G. Williams, dean of the state normal school of Alabama.

These were some of the hot shots thrown at the members of the National Educational association today by two leaders in the work.

Mr. Robertson strove to tell the educators what they are thought of in Canada. Mr. Williams told what he thought of the fine line drawn by some educators between the university and the normal school as a place to make teachers.

Mr. Robertson spoke this afternoon before a general session of the association in the auditorium. He said in effect that the agricultural schools must be more closely allied with the rural schools in general to bring about the desired end of keeping the boys on the farm.

Mr. Robertson also spoke in the morning before the department of rural and agricultural education, and he voiced much the same sentiment there. He declared that to make the boys stay on the farm the farm must be made fit to stay upon. And there must be as much education for the girl as for the boy.

Mr. Williams wrought himself up to an enthusiastic pitch when he spoke of the normal school as a place of training for teachers, and the outcome of his address was the declaration that the name doesn't make much of a place for the training of teachers any more than the term "professor" makes an educator. He summed up his argument in the second finding of the report of the committee on normal schools, which holds that "the normal schools prepare teachers for the entire public service—elementary and secondary."

Allegations of allegiance to the "book trust" cropped up this afternoon in the campaign for president of the association, when it became known that J. Y. Joyner, superintendent of the South Carolina schools, would be a candidate. Some of Dr. Joyner's friends announced that their fight would be against the book trust, and their efforts would be to defeat Ben Brewster, superintendent of schools of St. Louis, and J. H. Phillips, superintendent of the schools of Birmingham, Ala.

There are still one or two candidates to be heard from, though they have thus far declined to permit their names to be discussed. The failure of the project to place Elmer E. Brown, United States commissioner of education, in the presidency, is said to be due to the "book trouble."

Mr. Brown declines the honor rather than become identified in a fight with the so-called "octopus."

SERIOUS DISTURBANCE
IN ITALIAN DEPUTIES

Rome, July 7.—A serious disturbance occurred in the chamber of deputies tonight during the discussion of the subvention which the government proposes to give the Italian Lloyd Steamship company for 25 years, for transportation of the mails.

The vote was about to be taken, the Republican deputy, Signor Callini, said he regretted the condemnation of Prime Minister Stacchi, for "stealing bric-a-brac" when there were some of the present deputies and senators who might be impeached. This declaration caused a great tumult. Signor Schanzer, minister of posts and telegraphs, to whom the deputy had previously referred, rose from his chair and rushed at Signor Callini. A personal encounter was prevented by the intervention of the other deputies, but inkstands and books were thrown. The sitting was suspended.

New York, July 7.—A hurdy hurdy and tambourines were used by two militant suffragettes today whose English tactics, adopted for the first time in New York, met with such a boisterous reception in City Hall park that a riot nearly ensued. A meek looking man pulled a hurdy hurdy while Mrs. Sophia Loeblinger and Miss Helen Murphy, the suffragettes who wore badges

and streamers lettered "Vote for Women," and carried copies of the Suffragette, jangled tambourines. Within five minutes they were the center of such a crush that they had to shrink for the police. Not a copy of the official publication was sold and there were no speeches. A squad of police made a lane for the two women to the nearest subway station and they hurried home.
