FLOATING FRAGMENTS.

Justice Tyler is still improving. High Council meeting on Tuesday evening. Priesthood meeting next Saturday at 11 a.m. Linen dusters are again placed on the upper shelf. Meeting of the Home Missionaries on Wednesday evening. William Hopwood died last night at his residence in the 17th Ward. The petit jury now serving in the Third District Court will be discharged on Saturday next. The funeral services of Mrs. Mary Turnbull took place today at the Eleventh Ward school house. We have concluded to wait till next summer arrives before we again assert that spring has come. Mr. J. D. Farmer arrived in the city last night from the east, where he has been making extensive purchases. A private letter from Mrs. Dr. Ferguson states that she expected to leave New York for home to-day and arrive.

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Priesthood Meeting.—The regular Priesthood meeting of the Salt Lake Stake of 20 on will be held on Saturday, April 1st, at 11 a.m., at the Salt Lake Assembly Hall. W. W. Taylor, Clerk of Stake.

Home Mission.—The regular monthly meeting of the Home Missionaries of Salt Lake Stake will be held at the Council House, on Wednesday evening, at 7 o'clock. All the brethren are expected to report whether they have filled their appointments.

Home Again.—S. P. Teasdel, Esq., returned last evening from the business trip to the East, accompanied by his two daughters, who have been absent several months pursuing a course of studies in music and drawing. All three reached home in good health.

Missionary News.—A private letter, dated March 8th, from Elder John C. Cannon, states that he purposed leaving England for Germany on the 15th inst. He had made arrangements to baptize, before his departure, two men and a young lady. Elder O. F. Whitney would shortly baptize a whole family of believers in the Gospel.

Concert.—The Fifteenth Ward Relief Club, assisted by the chorale and select orchestra, under the direction of Miss C. Griggs and H. K. Gies, purpose giving a vocal and instrumental entertainment, in the Ward room meeting house, on Wednesday evening next, to commence at 7:30 sharp. The well-known musical ability of those connected therewith, and the choice selections on the programme, ensure to all who may attend an evening of pleasurable enjoyment.

An Ungallant Trio.—Parties named respectively Jensen, Smith and Jorgenson, called last night at the house of Mr. Winters in the 17th Ward, where, being under the influence of bad whiskey, they so far forgot their manhood as to assault the servant girl, whose parol they lighted lamp and threw it out of the door and over an adjoining fence. They were arrested and, this morning, were taken before Justice B. H. Smith. Jensen was fined \$10, and Jorgenson \$5.

Death of Brother Hopwood.—The many friends of Brother Wm. Hopwood, of the 17th Ward, will be pained to hear of his death, which occurred last night, after a very brief illness. The event will cause no small degree of surprise also, as his prostration was known only to a comparatively few. He was well known and esteemed in the community as a kind-hearted, honest, unassuming and industrious man. Deceased was one of the proprietors of the restaurant of Hill & Hopwood on East Temple Street. He had been for a long time connected with the Church, to which he had adhered faithfully to the last.

The Horn Silver Matter.—Some person has sent over the wires from this city a dispatch to the effect that the Horn Silver smelting works were in a state of siege, owing to the belligerent attitude of strikers. This statement is totally false, and must have been made from mercenary or malicious motives. The fact is, that so far as the necessary labor is concerned, ten more furnaces than those now existing at the works could be run. Major Hill is honest with applications for employment. There is no disturbing element either at or in the vicinity of the works.

THE REASON.—The Carbon County (Wyoming) Journal has this to say about the cause of the recent wholesale and summary discharge of U. P. conductors. The conspiracy involved is so disgracefully dishonest and sweeping as to appear almost incredible.

"A gentleman, recently from the East, informed us a few days ago that the reason for the wholesale and summary discharge of the Union Pacific was caused by the company learning of an organization among the knights of the Klu Klux Klan, who were running quite an opposition to the general passenger department. From the story given us it seems the conductors had an organization by which they were selling through tickets from Omaha to Salt Lake, Ogden and points in Montana, and from these places east to Omaha, in fact, conducting a general passenger department on their own hook. The tickets sold to have been used by them were a yellow piece of cardboard, in size 3 1/2 by 13 inches. This piece of cardboard being recognized by the conductors the same as the regular ticket sold by the company; also that they had agents at various points who sold these tickets, and an office at Omaha which made disbursements. They apparently did not believe in any mail arrangement, but took in the whole field, also that when a passenger was brought into a terminal station, if the conductor who took out the train did not belong to the initiated, the passenger was informed that he would have to take a lay over ticket and wait for the next train. The company in some way getting an inkling of how things were going, a corps of detectives were employed, upon whose report the general change has been made. Conductor Snow was the only passenger conductor on the main line who escaped."

Geistinger Opera Company.—Next Thursday evening, the world-renowned artist Marie Geistinger, supported by the full opera company from the Theatre, New York, will make her first appearance in this city. The company is under the management of Anheuser and Hiermann. The opening play will be *Boccaccio*, as played only by this company, with Marie Geistinger in the title role. Friday evening, Offenbach's opera of *La Belle Helene*, in which the author says that "Geistinger is far superior to Schneider in this character." At the matinee, *Boccaccio* will be repeated, and in the evening the farewell performance will be Johann Strauss's comic opera of "The Bat or Contempt of Court." The engagement is necessarily short, as the company is to appear in Chicago on Easter Monday.

Marie Geistinger has just closed the most successful engagement ever played in San Francisco, where she appeared at the Grand Opera House, one of the largest theatres in the United States, to crowded houses nightly. The tour of Geistinger and her company across the United States has been the largest and most successful of any company for years, the lady receiving an ovation in every city. A grand chorus and enlarged orchestra are under the conductorship of A. Novak, and the stage management in the hands of the well known artist, Max Luke.

Personal.—Mr. H. S. Perkins, of Chicago, the well known musical composer, is at present in this city. Our musical readers will remember him as the editor of *The Advance* choral book, some of the anthems in which are sung by our Tabernacle Choir. Yesterday he attended the services at the Assembly Hall, and in conversation afterwards, said that he was prepared by reports he had received, to hear good music from the Tabernacle Choir, but must say that their exercises very satisfactorily realized his expectation. He is a pleasant and affable gentleman and of course quite enthusiastic on musical matters, and is en route to California, holding musical conventions wherever he can make the necessary arrangements, on purpose to awaken an interest in musical matters.

Not Suitable.—L. Rasmussen, of Salem, Utah County, sends us a communication in which he complains about certain parties living in different parts of Utah who, he says, are indebted to him, but who fail to come forward with the pay. He wishes us to publish his letter in full, which contains reflections on different persons. If parties are indebted to him he ought to be paid, but it is somewhat singular that he cannot see the absurdity of asking us to publish a one-sided story of the character he relates, however true it may be. It is but one illustration among many of the far-fetched ideas of some people as to the purposes for which a public journal ought to be used.

Seriously Hurt.—Our readers will remember that a few days since Mr. Parley P. P. Prophet, of South Weber, met with a serious accident, the result of a runaway of his team. We regret to learn from a person who has paid a visit to him that Mr. Prophet is still confined to his bed and lies in a sad, sad and precarious condition. He is confined to lie in one position on his back. He suffers a great deal. His head is much bruised, as are some of his other parts of his person.—*Ogden Herald.*

Habeas Corpus.—In the case of the child Louis Mortimer Travis, aged one year and nine months, who was brought into court this morning by his mother, on a writ of *Habeas Corpus*, by Mr. Sharp, His Honor Judge Hunter, after hearing short arguments by Messrs. Sharp and Travis, ordered the child into the custody of Father Reardon, who promised to provide a home for it. The child has been in the hands of the ex parte authorities for some time.

Sentenced.—Joseph Biddlecome, convicted of the murder of Charles Jensen, on the 28th of May, 1879, was brought into court this morning and sentenced to imprisonment in the Penitentiary for the rest of his natural life. In the verdict of the jury he was recommended to the mercy of the court, hence the imprisonment for life instead of the death penalty.
