Poor Mr. Service was badgered and baited, and obliged to spend so many anxious hours, and so much time and strength in explaining exactly his views of the consistence of God's degrees with human ability, and in defining the exact state of the heathen in the future world, that the heathen in Smithville were left to go their own way. In a short time, Mr. Service was dismissed, the church hired ministers at ten dollars a Sabbath to supply the pulpit—and said this was economy. Grog shops grew up in the village, the poor-house increased its inmates, boys grew up godless, dissipated young men broke their fathers' and mothers' hearts and Johnny Pettisol was the first and foremost.

There were days, long and bitter, when Mr. Pettisol, old and trembling with paralysis, and his wife, sad and broken hearted wept over their spendthrift, undutiful sons, and wondered why they should have turned out so bad in spite of such excellent instruction.

The dockweed and caterpillars could not be got out of Jedediah's field with all his energy; and in his own secret soul while trembling on the verge of eternity, and reviewing the use he had made of his life, he sometimes remembered Mr. Service and wished he had given more thought to the great doctrine, "Look not every man on his own things, but every man also on the things of others."

WOOLING THE MINISTER.

George Wakefield—we should have prefixed Rev. to his name, but at the period of which we are writing, he had so recently come into possession of the clerical title, that neither he nor others had become fully accustomed to its use—had just been installed as pastor of a well-to-do congregation in the flourishing village of Sober-side.

He was a young man of pleasing manners, of prepossessing appearance, and more than ordinary talent, with quite as much genuine piety in his heart as he ever took pains to exhibit in his looks. Whether he had seen too little of the world to thoroughly understand its wickedness, or had too little experience of mankind to form an adequate conception of their debasement, it is certain that his views on the subject of total depravity fell considerably short of the orthodox standard. He was disposed to make a sort of average estimate of human nature, and to hold that if the best are seldom as good as they appear the worst are rarely as bad. Although he might have differed from Pope in regard to the utter worthlessness of "forms and creeds, and perhaps would have rejected the conclusion, "His can't be wrong whose life is in the right," it must be conceded that he chiefly measured the value of articles of faith, by their tendency to influence their daily conduct. His Master, he remembered, had never delivered a doctrinal discourse; the present generation of men stand in greater need of instruction? For himself he had resolved to try the experiment of following the example of Him, the sum of whose teaching was love toward God and our neighbor.

Such was the young minister, and such was the spirit in which he had entered on the discharge of his pastoral duties. His flock was so much like other flocks as to render a particular description unnecessary. For a few Sundays most of them would probably pay strict attention to his sermons, till assured there was no danger of advantage being taken of their slumbers for the propagation of error, after which they would comfortably go to sleep, as they had been accustomed to do under the ministrations of his worthy predecessor.
