

# 10 DEMONSTRATION IN FRANCE'S FAVOR

Made in Rome by Sympathizers  
Who Are Hostile to the  
Vatican.

## TROOPS DISPERSED THEM.

Demonstrators Roared, Shouted,  
Marched and Sang the "Mar-  
seillaise" Hymn.

Rome, Dec. 16.—Thousands of demon-  
strators friendly to France and of anti-  
vatican tendencies, gathered tonight in  
the piazza adjoining the Farnese pal-  
ace, the seat of the French embassy, in  
an endeavor to express their pleasure  
at France's action toward the church.

The whole garrison of Rome was em-  
ployed to disperse the demonstrators  
and protect the vatican, which is sur-  
rounded by cavalry, and the bridges to  
the apostolic palace are barricaded by  
troops. All the streets leading to the  
Palace Farnese are protected by sol-  
diers with fixed bayonets.

The demonstrators, led by a dozen  
radical Socialists and Republican mem-  
bers of the chamber of deputies, includ-  
ing Prince Borghese, after vainly at-  
tempting to break the cordons, provided  
themselves with candles and formed  
into a mock procession, intoning the  
Miserere as an indication of the death  
of clericalism, amidst cries of "Long  
live France," "Long live Clemenceau,"  
and "Down with the vatican."

Deputies Costa and De Felice tried to  
harangue the people, but the police in-  
terfered.

The demonstration occurred near the  
monument to Giordano Bruno, the  
monk philosopher, who was burned  
alive, a victim of religious intolerance.  
Deputy Costa finally made himself  
heard. He said:

"Before this monument to Bruno, of  
free thought, let us send our thanks  
to France for this great people contin-  
uing the traditional obstinate struggle  
against the moth-eaten clericalism."

Fresh attempts were made to break  
back the cordons and the cavalry  
charged the demonstrators, a few of  
whom were slightly injured and several  
arrested. Amid roars and shouts  
and the singing of the "Marseillaise,"  
the foment continued until late in the  
evening. A committee of the demon-  
strators was headed by M. Barrer, the  
French ambassador, who expressed his  
appreciation and sympathy for the Ro-  
man people. The stand that the gov-  
ernment is taking is that, although  
Italy is friendly to France, she does not  
wish to take sides in the dispute, and  
especially when her relations with the  
church are better now than they have  
been since 1870.

## BREAK OF PRISONERS.

Negro Convicts Make a Desperate At-  
tempt to Escape.

Jackson, Miss., Dec. 15.—As a result  
of a free-for-all fight, covering a de-  
spairing attempt on the part of the negro  
convicts to escape from the Oakley  
convict farm, about 20 miles southwest  
of this city, today, Capt. J. N. Buckley,  
in charge of the camp, maintained a sev-  
erely gash across the chest and  
Sergeant John Dodd's left arm was  
broken.

The fight began in the hospital. Ben  
Cooper, a long term negro convict, at-  
tacked another negro, Charles Prince,  
with a razor. The attack on Prince was  
the signal for a general fight, and when  
Sergeant Dodd entered the room he  
was beaten with clubs, iron bars and  
other weapons.

Capt. Buckley attempted to quell the  
disturbance and was attacked by  
Cooper who attempted to cut his throat,  
and was only prevented by Heskiah  
Pluney, another convict, knocking the  
weapon down. Pluney then grappled  
with Cooper and disarmed him.

When the other negroes saw Pluney  
take the razor from Cooper they quieted  
down.  
Gov. Vardaman hastened to Oakley  
on a special train, accompanied by  
members of the board of control. When  
they reached Oakley quiet had been  
restored. Gov. Vardaman brought  
Pluney back to Jackson and will par-  
don him for disarming Cooper.

## SENATOR BAILEY CONFIDENT.

Gainesville, Tex., Dec. 16.—Senator  
Bailey today issued a statement, in  
which he says:  
"I count positively 23 members of the  
senate and 82 members of the house  
who are pledged to vote for me. Be-  
sides these voluntary pledges, I hear  
from reliable friends that 12 other  
members have declared they will vote  
for me, as instructed by minorities. This  
makes a total vote of 116 on joint bal-  
lot. I am perfectly satisfied as I de-  
clared several days ago that not 13  
votes will be cast against me."  
Eighty-six votes are necessary to elect.

## NO DISTURBANCES IN PARIS YESTERDAY.

Paris, Dec. 16.—The serious distur-  
bances that it was thought would ensue  
on this, the first Sunday under the new  
presiding church and state, were not  
realized. The services in this city in  
particular passed off quietly. There was  
a notable increase in the size of the  
gatherings and in them were large bodies  
of men who were determined forcibly  
to prevent the intrusion of women by

rowdies. There were only a few cases  
where rowdies entered the churches wear-  
ing their hats, and they were promptly  
ejected and arrested.  
Reports from the provinces show that  
there was great excitement at many  
places. Large processions, chanting  
psalms, accompanied the clergy to and  
from the churches. Counter demonstra-  
tions took place in several cities. Notably  
Perpignan and Amiens, where the Catho-  
lics and free thinkers came into col-  
lision, necessitating interference by the  
police who quickly dispersed the crowds.  
Several of the demonstrators were in-  
jured. Bishop De Bry, while reading  
the official notice to leave the bishopric  
of Moux this morning, suffered a violent  
nervous attack and fell unconscious. Later,  
however, he recovered.

## BURNED TO DEATH.

Burlington, Vt., Dec. 16.—Mrs. Frank  
Conrad is believed to have been killed  
and property valued at \$30,000 destroyed  
in a fire which consumed the American  
House block and badly damaged two  
adjoining blocks today.

## REBELS ROUTED.

Guayaquil, Dec. 16.—Col. Cortano has  
informed the government that he at-  
tacked the Pajale rebels and won a  
splendid victory. After the fighting at  
Pajale the government forces marched to  
attack the rebels at Santa Rosa. No de-  
tails of a fight at the latter place have  
been received.

## LONGWORTH'S NOT INJURED.

Washington, Dec. 16.—Representative  
and Mrs. Nicholas Longworth were occu-  
pants of an automobile which crashed  
into the station platform at Chevy Chase,  
a suburb, today. Beyond a severe shak-  
ing up, the occupants were uninjured.  
The machine was slightly damaged.

## OJEDA PERSONA NON GRATA.

Rome, Dec. 16.—According to reports  
received here the Spanish government has  
signified its displeasure to Marquis Ojeda,  
the Spanish ambassador accredited to the  
vatican, for his action in communicating  
with the Spanish ambassador at Paris  
concerning the archives in the vatican  
there, which is considered as violating  
the neutrality that Madrid desires to  
maintain in the conflict between France  
and the vatican. It is expected here  
that Marquis Ojeda will be recalled.

Boaton, Dec. 16.—The body of Margery  
Clark, 19 years old, was found in and in  
a lodginghouse in Dover street today  
with a revolver clutched in her right  
hand, a bullet hole behind her ear, while  
beside her lay a man known by the name  
of Atwood, 40 years old, said to have been  
her husband, dying from a bullet wound  
in the forehead. Atwood died at a hos-  
pital without recovering consciousness.  
The Clark woman told some of the  
lodgers that she had sent for Atwood, who  
was in Denver. He arrived a week ago  
and the two had been living together  
ever since.
