TURVILLE BREAKS WORLD'S RECORD

Rides a Mile in 1:31 2-5 Behind His First Motor Cycle.

MADE TWO TRIALS FOR IT.

Eddie Smith Has Little Trouble in Defeating the Taudem Team in Mile Race.

The money chasers on the saucer furnished a pretty good program for over 2,000 spectators at the Salt Palace last evening and the people left the track with the knowledge that the management is doing its utmost to give them the worth of their money. Everybody was enthusiastic and did not allow a point to escape unnoticed. Anether world's record went on the long list to make the track famous, and the aesthetic easterner is beginning to realize by this time that something is doing out here in the far west,

After last evening's performance it is new up to Johnnie Nelson of Chicago, an acknowledged world beater, to make another fight to win back the world's championship for one mile motor paced, At Los Angeles last season he broke the record and established a new one of 131 4-5, but last evening, after one attempt, Charley Turville brought it down to 1:31 2-5 amid cheers and howls of delight. THE FAMOUS SALT LAKE ELK TO BE CHRISTENED SEPT. 21.

The difference between an elk of t he primeval type, on which budding nimrods are wont to throw away ammunition, and a B. P. O. Elk, with an eleven o'clock time plece in his immaculate waistcoat, is that the former is a rapidly disappearing race of beautiful animals, while the latter is a steadily growing organization of jolly good fellows. The specimen half-toned above is more favored than his race, for he is not only an elk, but an ELK-note the distinction. He has got them coming and going.

For this is the pet of lodge No. 8s, the local branch of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks-or, as some please, the "Best People on Earth." With his large antiers and goodly size, this el's is in every way a fine specimen of a race of wild, tender-eyed animals that is dying out all too rapidly. There are not many elks now, and orly in the willest parts of the northern states can they be found. And yet it wasn't so very long ago since they were everywhere in this great, boundless western country, including numerous sections of Utah,

Wild and untamable is the elk by nature, but this one never knew the joy of leaping lightly over fallen logs, and tearing gloriously through tangled brush, up to that peak, where with strained ears, he could hear the waters singing far down the canyon. Ever since this one was a mere child of an elk, it has known man's caressing touch and his kindly care. For Chris Woodall of Soda Springs, Idaho, reared the animal from babyhood. It is now eight years old, and a finer eight-year-old esk never was pictured in the natural history books."

When Chris Woodall was initiated into the local lodge of "Best People," he made the boys a present of the animal, and for nearly a year it has been domiciled at Liberty Park. It was the intertion of the boys to take it to the grand lodge at Milwaukee, but satisfactory arrangements for transportation could not be made, and the elk is still here. It has participated in every Elk parade since it was inflated into the order. And it is a good Irish elk, too.
