

THANKSGIVING PROCLAMATION.

BY THE GOVERNOR.

UTAH TERRITORY,
EXECUTIVE OFFICE.

Having been abundantly blessed and favored by Divine Providence during the vicissitudes of another year, and realizing our accountability to God, who has preserved our lives, who has given us seed time and a bountiful harvest, who has prospered our mining industries and yielded to us rich treasures from the earth, let us keep in mind our obligations to him for his mercies, and in grateful recognition observe a day of thanksgiving and praise—an honored custom tending to keep alive in our hearts remembrances of God's great goodness towards us, his creatures.

To this end, therefore, and in accordance with the recommendation of the President of the United States, I do hereby designate Thursday, the 30th day of November next, as a day of thank-giving and praise to Almighty God.

I recommend that the people of this Territory abstain from secular pursuits on that day, and assemble in their respective places of worship, and there with devout hearts join in such devotions as shall be pleasing and acceptable to our heavenly Father. I also recommend those more especially favored with the comforts of life and the riches of this world, to remember the unfortunate and poor, that charity and deeds of love may attest the sincerity of our devotions.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the Territory to be affixed.

Done at Salt Lake City, this 30th day of October, A.D. 1876, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and first.

Ratification Meeting.

ST. GEORGE, Oct. 27, 1876.

A meeting of the citizens of St. George was held in the Court House in St. George, October 24th, 1876, at 7 p. m., to ratify the nomination of the Hon. George Q. Cannon as Delegate to Congress, M. P. Romney, chairman of the Washington County Central Committee, presiding.

Prayer by Elder D. H. Cannon. The chairman stated the object of the meeting to be to take action in relation to ratifying the nomination of the Hon. George Q. Cannon as Delegate to Congress.

Moved and seconded that the action of the Territorial Convention in nominating Hon. George Q. Cannon as Delegate to Congress, be and is hereby ratified and approved of by the citizens of St. George, and that they agree to vote for said candidate at the coming November election.

Stirring and patriotic addresses were delivered by Judge William

Snow and Jno. D. T. McAllister, Ute Perkins, James Harvey and A. F. Macdonald, Esqs., after which the motion was unanimously sustained.

The laws on voting were then read by the Secretary.

Moved, seconded, and carried that the resolutions of the Territorial Convention, instructing the Delegate to Congress, be sustained by the meeting.

A vote of thanks was voted to the martial band.

Moved, seconded, and carried that copies of the proceedings of this meeting be forwarded to the DESERET NEWS and Salt Lake Herald.

Still Passing Away.

BEAVER, Oct. 30, 1876.

Editor Deseret News:

On the 26th day of last July, Sister Doreus, wife of Brother Simeon Andrews, of this city, passed behind the veil like a child falling asleep, without a struggle or a groan.

On the 26th of the present month, Father Andrews passed in a similar manner. The former died of asthma, and the latter of pneumonia.

Sister Andrews was born in Sacco, York County, Maine, 26th May, 1801.

Brother Simeon Andrews was born in York County, Maine, 16th September, 1798.

Sister Doreus Milliken (afterwards Andrews) was baptised into the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints by John F. Boyington, in her native town, in 1834, and Brother Andrews by the Prophet Joseph Smith, in Kirtland, Geauga (now Lake) County, Ohio, in the year 1835. They were married in 1836. Since then their lives have been so identical that the life of one may almost be said to be that of the other. They remained in Kirtland until after the Saints were driven from Missouri in 1839, when they moved to near Davenport in the then Territory of Iowa, and subsequently to Nauvoo, Ill., thence to Salt Lake Valley in 1848, to San Bernardino in 1851, and to Beaver in 1857, where they remained until their death.

Father Andrews held several important positions in the Church, in all of which he gave the fullest satisfaction. Both were full of integrity, never wavered in their faith, were liberal in their tithes and offerings, benevolent to the poor, and, in short, full of good works; dying, as they had lived, in the full assurance of a glorious resurrection.
