## ODIES OCCURRANCES.

The Coming California Congress—The Story of "The Land" Check—Over Head.

Among the instruments returned by the present grand jury was one against Fred Youngling, the armed militiaman who fired shot after the horses. His trial for treason on the continent, while in California nothing was too good for the defense.
