Word reaches here that the Utes are word reaches here that the Cles are now moving and are headed northwest toward the Northern Cheyennes, whose reservation Hes about 50 miles east of Fort Custer, Mont. It is said that their purpose is to induce the Northern Cheyennes to join them in some kind of a raid. of a raid.

Last night 12,000 rounds of ammuni-tion were shipped from Fort McKenzie to Maj. Grierson, who is in command of the Tenth cavalry. He is now at Gillette, whence he is expected today to go by rail over the Burlington to Ar-vada, which will bring him within 50 miles of the Utes. To reach them he will move down the Little Powder river

river. Col. Rodgers, in command of the Sixth cavalry, from Fort Moade, has not been heard from since leaving the post, but it is expected that as early as Sunday afternoon the two commands will reach the Indians, where a co-operation is expected between the two regiments of cavalry. In the two commands there are 10 troops of cavalry, about 500 men, be-sides the officers and teamsters. Additional supplies have been for-warded to both commands.

HIGHER PAY FOR LETTER-CARRIERS.

ROBERT LANSDON

Washington, Oct. 27.--Fourth Assistant Postmaster-General Degraw will recom-mend to Postmaster-General Cortelyon a substantial increase in the maximum sal-gree delivery service. Estimates recently submitted by the postmaster-keneral to the secretary of the treasury for the pos-tal service for the coming fiscal year, including an increase of \$1.475.00 for the appropriation necessary to provide for an increase in the salaries of the rural car-fiers. The item referred to is merely to cover the normal addition to the cost of service for establishing of additional ural service. Estimates for the appro-tion necessary to provide for an in-rease in salaries of rural carriers. If de-termined upon, will have to be submitted. There are now in the rural delivery ser-tor 28.487 carriers employed in all parts of the country.

New York, Oct. 27 .- A police order al-New York, Oct. 27.—A police order al-most if not quite as sweeping as that of Wednesday, which directed the transfer of every captain in the greator city with one exception, was issued by Police Commissioner Bingham yester-day. Under the new order every plain clothes man in the city will don a uni-form at 6 o'clock tonight and in the future the power of capitalins in assign-ing any man to plain clothes duty will be limited. The order threatens to do away with the plain clothes men, other-wise known as "wardmen." Such ap-pointments as are made must be through inspectors.
