

GEN. SCHEFKET MAN OF THE HOUR

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Order and Civil Branches of
Government in Turkey.

IS MAKING HIMSELF KNOWN.

He Has Called Upon Every Ambassa-
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stantinople.

Constantinople, May 16.—Mahmond Schefket Pasha, commander of the Turkish Constitutional forces, both land and sea, is the man most frequently in the thoughts of those observing or dealing with the confused politics of the day in Turkey. He is the one quiet figure upon whom rests the preservation of order and the civil branches of the government look to him to impose their liberal rule upon the empire and to deal promptly with persons and factions dangerous to it. The skill and celerity with which Gen. Schefket brought the Third army corps and part of the Second army corps before Constantinople and occupied the capital has amazed the foreign military men here. Besides those attached to the embassies, seven officers came from Germany and five British officers from Egypt to observe the development of the campaign. They have not only discussed the details of the Constitutional commander's arrangement.

Gen. Schefket has been something of a man of mystery, which impression he has been taking trouble to remove in recent days to remove. He has called in succession during the past week upon every ambassador and upon

those Turkish subjects holding high positions, such as Greek patriarch and the Armenian bishop, representing the vacant patriarchate. He has talked modestly upon political affairs and the relations of the army to the government, possibly with the idea of checking the spreading notion that he is a virtual dictator and that he and parliament are near to a rupture.

VIEW OF THE ARMY.

Speaking on this subject today, Gen. Schefket said: "The army is merely an instrument of civil power. The army and I as an officer in it derive our authority to establish order from the national assembly. The army is a finger of parliament only, and works under the will of the cabinet."

The general had an hour's talk with the Turkish press, the grand vizier, at the conclusion of which he said: "The grand vizier and I are in perfect accord. We have obstacles to overcome in our progress toward free and stable institutions. I have hope we will rise above them."

The disorders in Adana province, Gen. Schefket said, were in process of solution. "The court-martial there could be trusted to make a thorough investigation and provide adequate punishment for the guilty. The situation in the Fourth army corps at the headquarters in Erzurum has ceased, most of the mutineers and deserters having been arrested."

In conclusion Gen. Schefket said: "We desire very much to have the good will, sympathy and moral support of the Americans in the present movement toward better government."

Gen. Schefket's whole day after 9 o'clock in the morning is allotted to military business.

Some of the members of the committee, said Baur Bey, one of three who represented the Young Turks committee in Constantinople, doubted whether Gen. Schefket was the man for the work ahead. He was so still, so tranquil, so silent; but what a man he is: what energy, what intellect, what disinterested motives. To him the cause is everything; he thinks nothing of himself."

Ambassador Leishman had made representations to Ferid Pasha, the minister of the interior, on the importance of restoring order in the interior of Adana province, so that the refugees crowded in the towns may return to their farms. Ferid Pasha replied to-day, expressing his thanks for suggestions and saying he would take additional steps to restore the confidence of the Armenians and give them protection in the country where needed.

FROM ABDUL'S HAREM.

Constantinople, May 16.—Eighty women from Abdul Hamid's harem, richly dressed and veiled, were driven in carriages today under escort of four eunuchs and a troop of cavalry from the Yildiz to the ancient Seraglio palace, which has been unoccupied since about 1824. Curious bystanders were driven from the exit of the Yildiz by a guard of soldiers. Following the carriages was a train of wagons with baggage.

The Yildiz is being made ready for the admitting of the public. Most of the former sultan's slaves have been freed.

The arrest of Prince Burhan Eddin, fourth son of the deposed sultan, is confirmed. He will be interned in one of the palaces. Nothing is known of the precise charge against him, but he was suspected of being implicated in the mutiny of April 13.

BRINGING BODIES FROM THE PHILIPPINES

Manila, May 17.—The United States army transport, Klipatrick, sailed for New York, via the Suez canal, on Sunday with the Tenth cavalry regiment aboard. The regiment constituted itself a special guard of honor for the bodies of Col. Jacob August, who commanded the regiment at the time of his death, and Capt. Eugene P. Jurvey, Jr., a former troop commander of the Tenth, who died a few days ago.

Besides the bodies of the officers mentioned, the Klipatrick carries those of Maj. Shiner of the army medical staff and Thomas Kinney, a prominent attorney of Manila.

WEIRD TALE OF ANIMAL THAT SCREAMS LIKE WOMAN

Atlantic City, N. J., May 17.—A weird tale of some animal that screams like a woman and carries off watchdogs, has reached this city and has aroused sportsmen who will search the woods back of Pleasantville, where the animal has its present habitation. Charles Erwin, a farmer, reported the presence of the beast after his wife had become hysterical from fear. According to Erwin the animal leaves tracks like an immense cat, and the belief is that it is a panther escaped from a circus menagerie.

Erwin declares that his bulldog was set to catch the prowler Friday night, but disappeared and left only a few pieces of hair and a trail of blood on the edge of the woods near the big swamp. Men armed with shotguns and rifles will scour the woods in search of the creature tomorrow.

UTAH POSTAL APPOINTMENTS.

Washington, May 16.—The following postmasters have just been appointed: Hon. Clarence C. Jones, Cache county; Thomas McKee, Dragon, Uintah county; John Hollist, Avon, Cache county; Mrs. Nannie Alexander has been appointed postmaster at the newly established office to be called Alexander, in Wasatch county. Mrs. Amanda Miller of Ogden has been granted a pension at the rate of \$8 per month from April 19, 1909.

MOSLEMS FIRE ON ARMENIANS.

Adana, Asiatic Turkey, May 16.—Two hundred Armenians who started away from here yesterday were fired on soon after their departure by a band of Moslems. The Armenians reached here panic-stricken.

The military commissioners, however, gave assurances that the Armenians would be safeguarded and sent out patrols throughout the country. The police are taking active measures to restore to the Armenians their unburned houses.

STABBED HIS WIFE.

Los Angeles, Cal., May 17.—Angered because his wife, from whom he had separated, was about to begin divorce proceedings, A. Gerson, who is employed at the Southern California exposition building, attacked her and stabbed her five times with a pocket knife. He then held her a prisoner. Gerson was arrested. He refuses to talk except to say that his wife stabbed herself with a pair of scissors. Mrs. Gerson is in a critical condition.

LOOKS LIKE CASE OF ATTEMPTED SUICIDE

New York, May 17.—Arthur Schoen, a Brooklyn artist, who was reported as mysteriously missing to the police on May 15, was found late yesterday in the woods near Richmond Hill, L. I., with a bullet hole through his head, which has destroyed the sight in both eyes. He was conscious and at the hospital where he was sent, it was said that he might recover.

Schoen said that he had been wounded in the woods and helpless for 36 hours. Denying that he had tried suicide, he declared that he had been cleaning his revolver and that after firing one shot at a tree to see how it worked, he lost consciousness and did not revive for several hours.

Neighbors of Schoen, who designed a number of art works for the Columbian exposition at Chicago and who was well known in art circles, declared that at about the time he disappeared they received letters from him announcing his intention to kill himself.

HAD GIVEN UP ALL HOPE OF SEEING LAND AGAIN

New York, May 17.—After having given up all hope of ever seeing land again, Capt. Aronson and his crew of five of the British schooner Roanoke, which went 25 miles off the Azores on March 28, arrived here today on the Fabre line Gallia.

Loaded down with a cargo of salt from Santa Paolo, Spain, for St. John, N. B., the Roanoke ran into a hurricane when 150 miles off Fayal which cut her canvas into shreds. A jury sail was rigged and the crew managed to get the sinking vessel to a port 25 miles from the Azores, when the seas carried away the deckhouse. The only lifeboat on the Roanoke had been so damaged by the storm that it was necessary to repair it with canvas. As the Roanoke settled Capt. Aronson and his men got under way in a small boat. They rowed the 25 miles into Fayal through raging seas, the work requiring three nights and three days.

In that time they passed two steamers which did not reply to their flaring torches. At Fayal they were so exhausted that they were kept in the hospital until the Gallia touched there and brought them to New York.

STEAMER VOLTURNO'S EXPERIENCE WITH ICEBERGS

New York, May 17.—The British steamship Volturmo, which arrived here yesterday, had a remarkable experience with icebergs in mid-Atlantic. On Saturday afternoon, May 10, the captain found that his vessel which carried a large consignment of freight and passengers from England, was completely surrounded by icebergs and ice floes. The engine was slowed down and at daylight the ship was so completely hemmed in that the engine was stopped and all day the vessel drifted as a prisoner in the ice.

At times there was great danger of the giant icebergs crushing the ship between them but Capt. Harrison found himself unable to do anything because the ice completely surrounded him. A wind sprang up early Monday morning, making a channel through the giant circle of ice and the Volturmo quickly sped out of this and liberated itself.

A SUICIDE COMPACT.

Man Was Joking; Woman in Earnest
And Shot Herself.
Seattle, Wash., May 17.—H. O.

Eames the Tacoma hardware dealer, who was Mrs. Grace Burge's companion when she shot and killed herself in the Hotel Cecil Saturday, said today that although he had entered into a suicide compact with the woman he was not in earnest and did not know she was until he saw the blood streaming from the bullet wound in her breast. Eames is held for investigation but no charge has been entered against him.
