Boise, Idn., Feb. 3 .- Political Boise is very much astir over the sensation created in the hous of representatives last week by 17 Republicans entering into a combine with the Democrats and carrying through the house the anti-pass

The Republican members of the house wert about equally divided on the question; so nearly was this the case that the anti-pass bill in its present form would have passed the house by a majority of but one vote. This would be scaling the brink of the precipice too close for the supporters of the measure. When both houses met in joint caucus on Monday to discuss this bill and de-cide upon what action should be taken upon it, and thus abide by the decision of the joint Republican caucus, Mc-Cracken from Bingham sprang up and declared that he refused to be bound by any agreement, others seemed to coin-cide with his views and the caucus broke up in some little confusion. Before the next morning dawned Mc-Cracken and 15 other Republicans had signed themselves over in an alliance with the 12 Democratic members, thus giving them a majority of seven votes jority of but one vote. This would be

signed themselves over it all all alloces with the 12 Democratic members, thus pledged to carry through the anti-pass measure in its then present form, which, they claimed, was as desired by the governor. The consideration, it is stat-ed, offered the Democratis for this aid, is the promise from the "insurgents" that their pet test oath measure shall be borne upon the shoulders of at least 29 strong men, instead of 12, when it en-ters upon its passage through the house. This practically puts the whip into the hands of the 12 Democrats. But another question must be taken into account. The "innovable" senate must be brought into subjection before "any of their fusion dope can be smeared upon the statute books." It is a fact that certain of the senators have a fact that certain of the senators have been approached by the "Insurgents" and in very threatening terms com-manded to pass their measures; but the lion grinned at the mouse. The Re-publicans of the senate are practically as one man, united, firm and deter-mined, and so long as such unity and strength exists nothing can be accom-plished until the "insurgents" come back to the ranks. Or course, under this combine the anti-pass bill was put through the house Tuesday and other measures hurried on; but there stands the inmovable senate!
