Miss Juanita Harper, a St. Luke's (Denver) hospital graduate is the new operating room nurse at St. Mark's hospital in this city.

The Milkmaid's entertainment at the First Presbyterian church last evening, was a pronounced success, and was given before a crowded and appreciative house.

There will be a meeting Monday morning, of the directors of the Hook Mountain Bell Telephone company, when General Manager Murray will refer to them for consideration, the request of the business men's meeting that the rentals on the 300 phones be reduced to \$48. It is not believed that the request will be granted. The independent telephone management is asked to install party lines, but it is doubtful if this either will be granted, as the independent management is most averse to them. There is to be a meeting Monday evening, in the Commercial club parlors of the Business Men's association to consider the report of its investigating committee.

Chaplain Axton of the Eighteenth infantry lectured last night, to a large house in the Westminster Presbyterian church, on Life in the Philippines, his lecture being illustrated by colored stereoscopic views. The speaker described the customs, industries and resources of the country in a very interesting way, and every one present felt well repaid for coming out. The lecturer said that inside of 25 years, at the present rate of progress, any one of five products would annually pay the \$20,000,000 paid to Spain for the archipelago. STANDARD OIL'S DIVIDEND

Pays 7 Per Cent for Fourth Quarter, Compared With 12 Per Cent in 1903.

Directors of the Standard Oil company at a meeting yesterday declared a much smaller dividend than is usual for the fourth quarter of the year. A distribution of 7 per cent or \$7 a share, was decided upon, which compares with \$12 a share at this period a year ago. The aggregate of the quarterly dividends for 1904 of the Standard Oil company totals 36 per cent, which compares with 44 per cent in 1903, 45 in 1902, 48 in 1901, 48 in 1900 and 33 in 1899. It is seen, therefore, that the 1904 dividends are the smallest since 1899. As the capital stock of the company is \$100,000,000, the dividend of 36 per cent declared this year entitles a distribution of \$36,000,000 to Standard Oil stockholders. The Steel Trust will have paid out on Nov. 30 next dividends aggregating \$25,000,000 to its stockholders. The 7 per cent dividend declared yesterday is payable Dec. 15 next—New York Herald.
