SEVENTIES QUARTERLY CONFERENCE AT PAROWAN.

The Seventies residing in Iron county held a Quarterly Conference at Parowan, on Saturday and Sunday the 7th and 8th days of February. Elder William C. McGregor officiated as President, and Elder John Perkins as Clerk.

The Conference on Saturday was opened by singing the hymn "Come all ye sons of God," and by prayer by Elder Abraham Smith, and was addressed during the session on that day, by the President and by Elders William Holyoke, William E. Banks, William Tate, William Rowe, Jorgen Hanson, Thomas Durham, Jens Neilson, H. J. Mortensen, A. J. Mortensen, John McFarlane and Joseph P. Smith. Benediction by Elder George Eyre.

The meeting on Sunday was commenced by singing, "The morning breaks the shadows flee" and prayer by Elder William E. Banks, after which the choir sang, "Mortals awake with angels join." The conference was addressed in the course of the day, by Elders John Chatterly, William Tate, John McFarlane, Thomas Gower, Benjamin Smith, Joseph P. Smith, Bishop Henry Lunt, of Cedar City, President W. H. Dame, of Parowan and by the President of the Conference. The choir then sang, "Hail to the brightness of Zion's glad morning," and the assemblage was dismissed by benediction, Elder J. P. Smith officiating.

The addresses are said to have been very interesting, as were all the proceedings of the Conference, which were too lengthy for publication entire, hence this brief summary which we close by noting that, according to representations, there are at present forty-one members belonging to those Quorums in Cedar City, and eighty in Parowan.

BATTALION FESTIVAL AT PAYSON.—The members of the Mormon Battalion residing in Utah and Juab counties held a festival in Union Hall, Payson, on the 6th inst. Thirty of the "boys" were present, together with a number of other invited guests. A sumptuous repast was served up at 7 p.m. After supper the dance was resumed till 11 p.m., when Bishop J. B. Fairbanks, D. P. Curtis and others addressed the assembly. Songs, recitations and toasts followed. Refreshments were then served, and the dance being continued till early in the morning caused the "wee short hours" to glide away merrily.

COUNTY AND PROBATE COURTS.—The March session of the County Court for Great Salt Lake county will be held on Monday next, March 2d, and will probably adjourn on or before Tuesday evening, as so far as known, there will not be much business for the consideration and action of the court. The Probate Court for this county will also commence its March session on the same day, and all matters pending therein not disposed of during the week will be deferred till after the adjournment of the District Court, the regular term of which will commence on the 9th of March.

RELATIVE VALUE OF GOLD AND GREENBACKS.—By recent advices from the East there appears to be much fever prevailing in the money market—as, according to the latest reports, gold has advanced to the fabulous premium of sixty-four and three-quarters per cent.—amounting in reality to a reduction of the true value of "greenbacks" to about sixty cents on the dollar. The value of gold is daily increasing, and we see it stated as the prevailing opinion eastward, that gold will soon be up to one hundred per cent., or, in other words, "greenbacks" become depreciated to fifty cents on the dollar.

CONTINUATION OF WINTER.—The weather continues to be cold and stormy, snow having fallen on the mountains in greater or less quantities nearly every day during the week, and occasionally in the valleys. There was a big storm on Thursday night, the 19th, the snow falling to the depth of five or six inches in and about the city, to the great inconvenience of pedestrians in particular, and to those moving about in vehicles generally.

FAIR PROSPECTS FOR HIGH WATER.—The amount of snow which has accumulated on the mountains surrounding this valley within the last few weeks insures to agriculturists an abundant supply of water for irrigating purposes the coming summer, and should the stormy season continue much longer, another season of high water may be expected on the return of spring.

THEATRE.—The theatre has been closed till Wednesday evening next the 4th of March.

POOR WOOTTON.—It is reported that Frank H. Wootton, late Secretary of this Territory, died recently at Richmond, Va., of a wound received at the battle of Fredericksburg, where he was acting as a volunteer Aide to the Confederate General Archer.
