## BRITAIN AS A DEBT COLLECTOR.

It is a question whether an ally Great Britain has received a gift which she must consider her right of being a collector for her conquerors, might of course be a small compensation. This may also include Germany, which is now liable to meet his financial obligations and consequently is to be an awkward customer.
