PARLOR IN RESIDENCE OF COLONEL NEPHI W. CLAYTON.

The above cut shows a portion of the interior of the residence of Col. N. W. Clayton on Second street. The front door on the north opens into a tiled vestibule, and this into a preity hall done in oak with a finely carved staircase leading from it, and a handsome stained glass window lighting it from the first landing. The floor is carpeted with a Navajo rug, and a superb silver-tip bear skin, the latter occupying an alcove in which the fireplace and carved hall-seat are features of a cosy retreat partially closed in from the rest of the hall. On the stair frame overlooking this nook is a superb stag's head splendidly mountedthis, together with the bear skin being a relic of a hunting trip of ex-Senator Frank J. Cannon. The parfor opens from the hall on the west and is a spacious room length ad by a deep window-alcove in tower effect, and effectively lighted by this and another large window crowned with art glass in transom effect. The library connects on the south with the parlor and with its well-filled rows of book shelves and lounging chairs is a tempting room. Perhaps the most artistic room in the house is the dining room. The woodwork of this room is in malachite effect, the natural poplar, of which almost the entire woodwork in the house consists, being highly polished and stained with the rich malachite tinge, which with the peculiar red of the walls makes a most artistic combination. A grill arch of iron with double columns supporting it separates the room from the library, and a Persian portiere aids in the striking effect. A china shelf extends around the walls of the room, and a handsome sideboard and mantel are other pretty features of the room. The sleeping apartments are on the second floor, the entire house being most conveniently arranged.
