## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Locates at Murray.**—Dr. E. G. Hughes has located at Murray. Two years ago the doctor was at a smaller town for a short time, and will now be there permanently.

**New Engines Ordered.**—The mechanical department of the San Pedro has ordered 25 locomotives from the trust. The engines will be built at the Schenectady shops.

**"Americans" at Lagoona.**—The "Americans" club, quotation marks not to be omitted, will have an outing at Lagoona Aug. 1, according to plans discussed by the patriots (?) at a meeting held last night.

**New Supply Received.**—There has been a shortage of computers tickets on the street railway, owing to delays in freight, but a consignment has arrived from Omaha and books of tickets can now be secured as of old.

**Old Conductor Dies.**—Clement G. Wolcott, a conductor on the Union Pacific, one of the oldest in the country, died Sunday night, at Cheyenne. He had been in the employ of the Union Pacific for nearly 30 years.

**Complaints Against Reservoir.**—The Rocky Ford Reservoir company, and the towns of Sigurd and Brigham have appointed a committee to confer with the state board of health relative to the complaint that the reservoir is a nuisance and a typhoid fever breeder.

**Soldiers Discharged.**—All non-commissioned officers at Fort Douglas who, on the 15th inst., will have less than 30 days to serve before the expiration of their term of enlistment, will be discharged from the army on that date. This will let out over 100 men.

**Weather Still Warm.**—More warm weather, as the cold spell has given the country the good by, and almost the entire United States is under a high barometer. Practically no rain fell anywhere yesterday. This weather has made delightful bathing in the lake, and more people are going into the water every day.

**Strikers Go Back to Work.**—The Salt Lake office of the Western Union received notice last evening, from the San Francisco management, that 10 out of 13 officers there had been released, and nine striking operators reinstated at their own application. This statement was denied later from strikers' headquarters in the bay city.

**Christian Endeavor Social.**—The Third Presbyterian Christian Endeavor society, held a social at the residence of the pastor, Rev. H. E. Hayes. Refreshments were served, and there was a musical program, one of the songs being "Miss Edna's Song," one of the best vocalists on the Pacific coast.

**State Societies Organize.**—Former residents of Wisconsin are requested to meet in Judge Armstrong's court room, Friday evening, to organize a Wisconsin society. A similar effort is being made to organize a Western New York association in this city, and C. O. Harris has the names of about 30 western New Yorkers who will meet shortly.

**Gas Holmes Returns.**—Landlord G. S. Holmes of the Knutsford has returned from a mining trip to Goldfield, where he reports more development in prospect than at any other time in local history. He says many fine buildings are being erected, the general public has greater faith than ever in the future permanency of the camp.

**Fourth for Hatch Boys.**—Mr. and Mrs. Charles Francis Adams, the Sweet Candy company, and the United Grocery company have contributed fireworks and other patriotic material with which the Hatch boys and girls may celebrate suitably the glorious Fourth. Mr. Adams is the great grandson of the first vice president of the United States, John Adams.

**Juvenile Court at Richfield.**—Judge Clementer closed the juvenile court June 29 and investigated the charges against a number of boys and girls accused of throwing stones. One of the girls was acquitted but all of the others confessed. The girls were declared delinquent and placed in the custody of the probation officer. The judge gave the young people quite a moral lecture.

**TROOPS PACKING UP.**

**WAS COLD IN JUNE.**  
Record of 60 Degrees Mean Temperature Lowest in Local History.

The month of June just past was a record-breaker in the way of cold weather. The mean thermometer, 60 degrees, was the lowest on record since the establishment of the weather bureau in this city, in 1874, though the mean of June, 1906, was 62 degrees. The lowest thermometer was 37 degrees on the 12th, and the highest was 86 degrees on the 25th. The lowest June thermometer on record was 33 degrees on June 12, 1899. The lowest thermometer was 101 degrees June 23, 1900. The precipitation was 1.9 inches, the same as in June, 1906.
