This will be one of the most isteresting of the sessions, for Mr. Newell will tell of the greatest engin-cering work ever undertaken by any government in the world, and will show in picture how this work is be-ing carried on. Hon, Morris Bieu, nead of the legal department of the U. S. reclamation service, will speak at the same time on the subject of the com-munity idea in the reclamation act.

U. S. Senator Reed Smoot of Utah will deliver an address on "Irrigation by 'Private Enterprise." There will also be an address on "Irrigation Un-der the Carey Act." and one on the "National Irrigation Methods." Practic-al irrigation methods will be discuss-ed by Dr. Elwood Mead, chief of irri-agtion and drainage investigations, U. S. department of agriculture, and Prof. Samuel Fortier, irrigation engineer, University of California.

HUNTED FOR THREE YEARS. Chief Source of Annoyance to President Diaz and His Administration Believed At An End.

Los Angeles, Aug. 23 .- With the arrest of four Mexicans here this afternoon the revolutionary movement which under the name of La Junta has for three years past been a source of endless trouble and annoyance to the administration of President Diaz is conceded to have been stamped out. The men in custody have been hunted through the western half of the United States, into Casada, along the United States, into Carada, along the Mexican border, until the pursuit grew so hot that they were unable to vent-ure out of doors in the day time.. When finally overpowered in an ob-scure section of the city late today, the cries for assistance induced a crowd of several hundred people to pursue the carriage in which the three were being transported. Excited countrymen threatened to mob the of-ficers, calling them kidnapp?rs and as-szesins. sassins.

Mr. Cook maintains that his inven-Ar, Cook maintains that his invel-tion will revolutionize railroading to the extent of greatly decreasing the time required by a run, thus saving the passengers a large amount of time. For instance, by this plan the time for the run between Chicago and New York would be shortened by three or four heurs. Railroads have long lonkfour hours. Hailroads have long look-ed for some method by which the fre-quent stops, causing great loss of time and much wear on machinery and rolling stock, could be eliminated, and Mr. Cook now claims that his inven-tion will do this.

The inventor would not announce the details of his plan for the reason that he intends having it patented in foreign countries. However, he says it is simple and practical, and he ca-tertains absolutely no doubt as to its immediate success and its adoption by the railroads.

In speaking of his invention Mr. Cook stated:

Cook stated: "My application for a patent was filed with the patent office on July 26 and it was officially allowed on Aug. 14, breaking the record for quick work in the patent office inasmuch as the time usually required is from six to nine months. I believe the patent was rushed through the office at the request of the postal authorities at Washington, which has authority to rush any invention that will facilitate or improve the carrying of the United mails
