FIRST OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT.

Western Pacific is to Be Part of
The Denver & Rio Grande
System.

SPLENDID ANNUAL REPORT.

Total Earnings for Fiscal Year Show
Gould Road Made \$17,031,507—In-
crease of \$585,073

Denver, Sept. 8.—The nineteenth annual report of the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad company shows the total earnings for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1905, to have been \$17,031,507, an increase of \$585,073 over last year. The expenses for the year amounted to \$10,168,900, making the net earnings \$6,862,607. In the report of the president, E. T. Jeffery, it is officially announced that the control of the new Western Pacific has been placed in the hands of the Denver & Rio Grande, and that the new road will be part of the system, which has its general offices in Denver. It has been generally known for some time that the Western Pacific was owned by the Gould interests, but the fact is the first official announcement of the fact.

Aside from the good financial showing made in the report, the announcement that the Western Pacific is to be part of the Rio Grande system will be received with considerable interest here. There have been rumors for some time that the chief engineer E. J. Yard of the D. & R. G. will have considerable work on his hands with the new road and that when the line is finished, General Superintendent A. E. Welby of the R. G. W. will figure prominently upon the official roster of the Western Pacific.

BORAX ROAD.

Millionaire Smith Now Building to Connect With Santa Fe.

Nothing daunted by the refusal of the Salt Lake Route to put in a special rate on steel, ties and material for the Tonopah & Tidewater road, Bora Smith is now said to be grading his railroad from Ludlow, on the Santa Fe, northward to Lila C. mine via Soda Lake route. The line will be 120 miles long.

OPENS TOMORROW.

Minidoka Branch to Be Turned Over to
Operating Department.

The Minidoka branch of the Oregon Short line will be taken over by the operating department tomorrow with a daily passenger train service and a freight train daily except Sunday. The train will make connections with east and west bound through mail trains and will leave Minidoka at 9:15, arriving at the Salt Lake at 11:30 a. m. and returning leave Twin Falls at 4:30 p. m., arriving at Minidoka at 6:45 p. m. The length of the new branch is an even 50 miles, the stations along the line being Minidoka, Arapahua, Rupert, Heyburn, Burley, Starke, Ferry, Milner, Dry Creek, Piler's, Kimberly and Twin Falls.

Milwaukee Annual Report.

Chicago, Sept. 8.—The forty-first annual report of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railway company for the fiscal year ended June 30 last, was issued yesterday. As compared with the previous year there was an increase in gross earnings of \$1,553,779, an increase of \$417,451 in operating expenses and an increase of \$1,136,328 in net earnings.

The earnings from passenger traffic during the year were \$10,216,957—20.30 per cent of total earnings—an increase of \$465,324 over the previous year, or 4.82 per cent.

To Enlarge U. P. Shops.

Omaha, Sept. 8.—It was officially announced at the headquarters of the Union Pacific Railway company today that the company would begin the construction at once of additional shops in Omaha at a cost of \$1,000,000, the new buildings to be completed within a year. The largest of these new shops will be a locomotive construction building, which will cost nearly half a million dollars. The company has already spent \$1,000,000 in half dollars in new shops and equipment in this city.

SPIKE AND RAIL.

General Superintendent E. Buckingham of the Short Line has returned from a trip to Tonopah.

Nearly six miles of grading on the Pacific & Idaho Northern extension have been cleaned up ready for track laying.

Since the first of the month, when the official time was advanced one hour by order of General Manager W. H. Baneroff of the Short Line there has been all kinds of confusion at Goldfield.

During August the Baldwin Works turned out 22 locomotives, making a total of 1,400 for this year. The concern has orders booked for another 1,000 and 17,000 men are now on its payroll.

J. W. Ellingson, chief clerk at the local headquarters of the Salt Lake Route, has returned from his mission to his home at Phoenix. Mr. Ellingson Sr., died the night he arrived at the bedside.

A. D. Thurston, the founder of the Oneida and Teanawahs has been retired by the order, with a handsome life annuity and a gift of a beautiful \$4,000 residence at Glendale Park, Kirkwood, Mo.

At East Buffalo the Erie has completed a concrete cinder pit which enables engines to dump ashes and take salt and water all in one operation. Another improvement completed at the same point is a 1,500-foot coal trestle.

The visiting California traveling passenger agents, due to arrive over the Salt Lake Route tomorrow morning, will be tendered a complimentary ride on the Seaside Salt Lake road, a trip to Saltair and an organ recital at the Tabernacle.

S. B. Hovey, vice president and general superintendent of the Chicago, Rock Island and Gulf at Ft. Worth, Tex., arrived in Salt Lake this morning in his private car accompanied by Mrs. Hovey and a party of friends. They are on their way to the Portland exposition.

Georgia's railroad commission, has given the roads that refused to put in its stove rates 30 days within which to make "ample and full recompense" to the shippers interested, in default of which suit will be entered against each of them for the \$5,000 penalty prescribed under the law.

GOVERNOR'S DAY CROWDS MANTI.

Visitors Throng the Temple City
To Witness Official Review
Of Troops.

EXCURSION FROM SALT LAKE.

Reached Depot This Afternoon and Im-
mediately There Was a Big Demon-
stration—At Camp Taft

Manti, Sept. 8.—Everything opened auspiciously for Governor's day at Manti today. The occasion has brought one of the greatest crowds of people ever gathered here.

Camp Taft has been the center of attraction since daylight. Vehicles of all descriptions crowded the roads both to Manti, and then on to Camp Taft. Hayrack parties are the vogue. The excursion from Salt Lake to which Governor Cutler's special car was attached, arrived at 1 p. m. after a pleasant trip without incident.

At the depot, it was met by Captain Ely of the Twenty-ninth infantry, U. S. A., Colonel Geoghegan, and troop A. W. of the Colorado cavalry. The first battery field artillery, with all guns in action, boomed a welcoming salute to the party at Camp Taft. The cavalry escort halted in front of regimental headquarters, where a repeat saluting for the governor and his guests.

After dinner, the maneuvers of Governor's day began, and will continue until "Retreat" this evening. After that the citizens of Manti will give the governor a rousing reception and grand ball tonight.

City Committee Resolve Against Fusion
And Urge Straight Ticket.

The Republican city committee met last night at the Young Men's Republican club rooms in the Atlas block, those present being Frederick C. Loofbourrow, chairman; J. P. White, secretary; C. A. Buckwalter, first president; J. J. Meyers, second president, proxy for E. Ripley; T. L. Irvine and Harry Anderson, third president; A. B. Irvine and Fred Butler, fourth president, and C. H. Black of the fifth precinct.

The names of E. J. Eardley and A. S. Reimer were placed in nomination to fill the vacancy occasioned by the resignation of Henry Heath, now an "American," but the vote was a tie and the matter was laid over till the next meeting. A. B. Irvine presented a resolution against fusion and urging a straight ticket for the city election. This was adopted unanimously. The questions as to the time, place and apportionment of the coming city campaign were then taken up and discussed at length, but no final conclusion was reached. This question will be settled at the meeting of the committee to be held next Monday evening at 8 o'clock.
