

SAMUEL GOMPERS ENDORSES MORGAN

Says When Financier Says He Didn't Say a Thing That He Did Not.

INTERVIEW ATTRIBUTED HIM

Banker Was Made to Say That Labor Must Learn it Could Not Control Industry.

Washington, Feb. 10.—Seventy-five delegates met here today to inaugurate a movement for the organization of a department of building trades of the American Federation of Labor...

"Yesterday there appeared in the newspapers an interview with J. Pierpont Morgan, the greatest financier of our country. The interview was published in two newspapers. One of them sent me a telegram asking for an answer to Mr. Morgan's statements. I shall read the telegram and give the substance of the interview—and I shall want to say a word or two in regard to it."

"In an interview published today, J. Pierpont Morgan declares labor must learn that it cannot control industry. Renewals of employment are not wanted now. He declares the federation will be powerless to prevent wage reduction, because it is not a union. Workmen cannot strike because they have no jobs now. There are no stocks on hand, you know, says Morgan, and we do not want to take up work now to what can they do? They will have to submit or they will starve. The question is to be settled. They are to learn that they cannot control industry."

"This morning I saw published Mr. Morgan's statement that interview. I am not a multi-millionaire and I am not, but notwithstanding the opposite positions occupied by him and myself, I am free to say that when Mr. Morgan says he did not give utterance to that statement, I believe him."

"But it is the thought itself to which I want to call attention—that notwithstanding Mr. Morgan may not have said what is attributed to him, I know that that thought has been in the minds of a large number of employers for a considerable time. And that is the thing."

"In the same paper in which that interview is published is a statement that in New York city thousands of every-day workers are being laid off as a result, are not only incapable of learning the lessons satisfactorily, but that they cry for food and sometimes faint at their benches because of hunger."

"The newspapers in a statement of an interview with a gentleman who has made a study of conditions of New York city, three men in New York city is the whole for what? The material is there, the machinery is there, the brain is there, the brawn is there, and the hands of the people are there, and yet men are idle and children in the schools cry for food. It is not only inhuman and brutal, but it is treason to our country and to the human race, for anyone to think such less give expression to the idea, that the working people must submit further or starve."

"The American workmen have come to the conclusion, if I have any opinion of their thoughts, their hopes and their expressions, that the condition that obtains in other countries, where there are large armies of unemployed, will not obtain in the United States; it will be tolerated, if we permit it. It will be our own fault, and we will have failed in our fight to each other, to our fellow citizens of today and the days to come. But we are true to each other; we are intelligent and we are sympathetic. We are earnest and honest, loyal citizens of the United States and true to the needs of our country, true to the needs of labor, true to you and to all labor as we build up our unions to build up a sentiment of fraternity and

Washington, Feb. 10.—In the face of strong opposition by John Sharp Williams of Mississippi, leader of the minority in the house of representatives, James L. Lloyd, representative from the First district of Missouri, was today elected chairman of the Democratic congressional campaign committee, defeating his rival and Mr. Williams' candidate, Representative William H. Ryan of the Thirty-fifth district of New York, by a vote of 23 to 14.

Only one ballot was cast, and after its announcement the election of Mr. Lloyd was made unanimous on motion of Representative Fitzgerald of New York, who had the proxy for Mr. Ryan.

Representative Frank Clark of the Second district of Florida was unanimously elected secretary of the committee. The appointment of chairman and assistant secretary was left, respectively, to Chairman Lloyd and Secy. Clark. A treasurer will be elected later.

Washington, Feb. 10.—Debate on the Indian appropriation bill under the five-minute rule was resumed in the house today. At the very outset politics was injected into the proceedings when Mr. Leake (Dem., N. Y.) denounced W. J. Bryan and his methods.

"Several Republicans and Democrats objected because he was not speaking to the bill. By unanimous consent, however, he was allowed to proceed. Mr. Leake said he had been surprised at the usurpation of the prerogatives of the delegates to the Denver convention next July. There were some men, he charged, who believed that this was the time and the house the place to nominate a candidate on the Democratic ticket, and, he said, "lest my silence might be construed as an endorsement of the nomination of W. J. Bryan, I rise for the purpose of making this protest."

"I," proceeded Mr. Leake, "I adopted the example of Mr. Bryan, I would vehemently condemn him, as Le did the distinguished Democrat, the Hon. Grover Cleveland."

But he could, he said, content himself with admitting that Mr. Bryan was honest, consistent and sincere. He declared, however, that Mr. Bryan's faithfulness to the decalogue better qualified him for the pulpit than the presidency.

Republican laughter greeted this utterance, which immediately afterward was supplemented by Democratic hisses when Mr. Leake said of Mr. Bryan:

"He has taken the big stick from the president of the United States and used it to beat the heads of the American individuality and ambition on the cross of Socialism."

The president, thus being apprised of his big stick, declared, and resorted to the big slippers.

TO INTEREST PUBLIC IN SPORT OF BALLOONING.

New York, Feb. 11.—Plans for interesting the public in the sport of ballooning were discussed at a special meeting of the Aero club of America last evening. While serious discussion was given to the new sport, the club is in no position to assist them. The club does not own a balloon and one or two members are possessed of this principal requisite for aerial observation. It was proposed that the club might attempt getting the members sufficient to purchase one or two large balloons and hold them in readiness and take up any person or party willing to pay the actual cost of the ascension. No definite action was taken in the matter.

The selection of a balloon park also was discussed and it came to light that something like a half dozen aeroplanes and heavier-than-air machines are already constructed in this city and ready for trial as soon as a suitable place can be found for testing them. Probably one of the race tracks or a spot on Long Island will be selected.

Frank D. Lakin, foreign representative of the club, presented and told of the recent organization of a new aero club in Canton, Ohio.

"Seven years, probably five years from now," said he, "ballooning will be such a popular sport that it will not be necessary to encourage any one to engage in it, but just now the thing to do is to get the people to go up. Have as many conditions as possible, and getting the people into the air will dispel the foolish idea that ballooning is dangerous. I regard it as the safest and most delightful sport in the world."

It has been expected that the club would take up the question of the Chicago club's attempt to annex to the New York club's place as a member of the International Aeronautic federation, but the subject was only touched upon indirectly. Mr. Lakin assured those present that the new club in Ohio would be loyal to the Aero club of America, and he hoped all other clubs in the states would take the same position.
