The gentleman was attacked by apoplexy, as stated, early yesterday morning, and though everything that could be done for him, all help proved unavailing, and he expired last evening, between five and six o'clock. His sudden demise will be regretted by many friends whom he has made during his sojourn in this Territory. He arrived in Utah early in April, 1878, with Marshal Shannahan, and at the time the latter assumed the duties of United States Marshal, Mr. Butler became warden. He has been a faithful officer, and though of a gruff manner, had a kind heart, and knew, what many men seem to forget in this world, that to be strict

The Wrong Bottle.—The Milford Sentinel of the 2nd inst. has the following account of a painful accident:—

On Sunday evening, Gus Puleo, after complaining of a severe cough, went to bed, and, to prepare him a cough syrup, also procured a bottle of ammonia of the same physician. On rising in the evening he placed the two bottles on a table, and, not reading the labels, he took the ammonia for the cough syrup, and, after drinking a glassful, he found it so strong that he immediately called the doctor. The doctor, on being informed of the mistake, called and found him suffering with a severe case of diphtheria, and, after a few days' treatment, he died. The mistake was a costly one, and the doctor's bill was \$100.

Case of Assault.—On the 2nd inst. an assault was committed at West Jordan, by a man named Leek, upon a woman named Curtis. The circumstances, according to evidence adduced before the police magistrate this afternoon, when the case came up for trial, happened as follows: Messrs. Curtis and Leek were doing some surveying for a Mr. Erickson, along the line of fence dividing the latter's property and the land owned by Mr. Curtis, the husband of the plaintiff. While they were at work the Curtis woman came out of her house and, as Leek alleges, called him a thief and other hard names, whereupon he kicked her and told her to get into the house. She says he raised a hatchet, with which he had been driving pins over her head, but the defendant denies. He confessed to having kicked the woman, and said he was sorry for it. He was fined \$10 and costs. Leek is represented as a quiet, peaceable man ordinarily, and the Curtis woman as a good deal of a virago.

Diphtheria in the North.—Advice from Brother S. P. Richards, of Montpelier, Idaho, state that diphtheria is still prevalent in that locality, though as yet not so malignant a type as has been. One death occurred on the 28th of December, 1890, and another on the 21st ult. (see notices elsewhere) and some eight cases are known at the present time. Brother G. C. Hillier has six of his family down; all improving except the youngest, an infant. After the large number of deaths, heretofore reported, the disease began to abate, and schools and meetings were resumed. Whether they will be continued under present circumstances, is a question. People feel dubious of the propriety of moving around much, yet the afflicted find ready sympathizers.
