INDIAN CHIEF WHO WILL BE A UNITED STATES SENATOR.

When Oklahoma and Indian territory are made into one state it will be represented in Congress by an American Indian, a Creek chief, as a lawmaker. In his natural element the Indian'is a pure example of the communist. He does not want individual ownership, and says that God never designed the earth to be parcelled out to the children of men.

By an act of Congress the tribal distinction will cease to exist on the fourth of next March, and the Indians will become voters under the flag. They will for the first time be privileged to pay taxes, something they have never done before. For the first time in the history of the nation an Indian may stand in Congress, elected to represent his people.

There will be two ends to the new state and a senator from each end. The one figure for United States senator from the Indian territory end of the new state is Gen. Pleasant Porter, chief of the Creek nation. Gen. Porter is a Democrat, and the new state will be Democratic. Gen. Porter is 65 years old and served in the Confederate army du ring the civil war.

SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.

Ornamental designs in infinite variety are now drawn by the electric spark upon photographic plates. In an ex-cellent process described by a French writer, a thin sheet of lead is fastened to a piece of cork by eight plats ar-ranged in a circle, the pins are set upon a sensitized plate, sprinkled with starch powder, and a metal sheet un-der the photographic plate is connected to the external armature of the Leyden far of a Wimshurst machine, the sheet of lead being similarly connected to an of lead being similarly connected to an other jar. Passage of the spark and development of the plate complete the operation. In another method, an insulating powder like starch or sulphur is sprinkled upon the sensitive plate
