A Terrible Fight with a Maniac on the Roof of a Hotel.

THE DANGERS OF TRAVELING.

Secretary Carlisle, Mrs. Russell B. Harrison's Narrow Escape. —Disastrous Alaska.

CHICAGO, March 31.—Today George Doyle of this city and Robert Geaney of Philadelphia went to the top of the Great Northern Hotel, a sixteen-story building, looking over the city. They stood for some time looking about, and then Geaney gave a sudden leap and grabbed Doyle and began to pull him about as if the end had been exhilarated to playfulness. Then he said: "Hold my hands, I want to look down." Doyle did so, and after Mr. Geaney recovered himself, he approached Doyle with a sudden light in his eyes and a strange earnestness in his voice, contrasting unpleasantly with his recent playfulness, and said: "You've got to jump off this roof, or I will throw you off." With fearful reality it came to Doyle's memory that Geaney several years ago was treated for a mild form of insanity.

"Will you jump?" he roared at Geaney, and, without waiting for a reply, he seized Doyle and began to drag him toward the edge. Doyle fought with despair, and the men staggered to and fro over the roof.

Robert Geaney, who has an office in the upper story of the hotel, saw the men struggling, and watched them. He soon saw that it was a struggle for life and death, and rushed to the hotel and informed Edson, the proprietor. Accompanied by a porter and three men, they started for the roof. On the stairs leading to the turret they encountered Doyle, bareheaded, with his clothes torn from his back. He was very weak, excited and in a fainting condition.

Geaney was walking calmly around the roof, and when the men came out of the scuffle pleasantly invited that gentleman to come out and see the city. But Edson, alarmed, and finally succeeded in getting Geaney to come down for the purpose of taking a drink. He was put into a room, locked up, and his father telegraphed for him.

When Doyle was able to talk he gave a graphic account of his fearful fight for life, and it was learned that he only escaped by strategy. After the struggle had progressed some time, feeling that his strength was almost gone, he suddenly called to Geaney to stop and he would make a bargain. He said, however, that he must have a few moments for prayer. He stepped back and knelt down, and Geaney, who had been through the fight, suddenly darted for the scullery and went through it like a wild man, as if he was a woman's rescuer.

WASHINGTON ITEMS.

Secretary Carlisle Makes Changes in the Treasury Department.

WASHINGTON, March 31.—Secretary Carlisle was busy today making official changes in the treasury department. He recalled the resignation of H. C. Brown, chief clerk of the architect's office, and in his place appointed Charles F. Kemper of Staunton, Va. The resignation of Frederick C. Smith, chief of division in the architect's office, was tendered and accepted. General Daniel McCallister, late appointment chief of the treasury department, was appointed chief clerk of the immigration bureau, vice Hall, resigned. Two Democrats were discharged and two Democrats appointed in their place.
