FORWARD PASS AFFECTS PLAY

Several Other Minor Changes Have
Been Made By Committee—Marked
Advance in Strategy.

While there will doubtless be during the coming football season a marked advance in the strategy of the game in the evolution of new plays, especially along the line of the forward pass and its variations, there is not likely to be a material change in the general character of the game. Last year, prior to the opening of the season, there was a wide spread uncertainty in the minds of the players and coaches as to how the complete overturning of the old rules would affect the play, while the general public had absolutely no conception of what the new game would be.

The most important of these changes that affect the play in the field are those which affect the forward pass. Heretofore, the forward pass was made by the player himself, and it was illegal for him to pass the ball to another player. The new rule, however, allows a player to pass the ball to another player, and this is a marked advance in strategy. 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COUNTS AS A DOWN

Rule 10—If such offense occurs before the third down, the ball is put in play 15 yards directly back of the spot where the foul was made, and the play is counted as a down. If, however, such offense occurs after the third down has been declared, the ball shall go to the opponent at the spot where the foul was made.

The other changes are mostly self-explanatory. One that has escaped general observation is the rule that a kicked ball, if it is a field goal or a kick-off, is counted as a down. This is a marked advance in strategy.

Another important change relates to the kicking of the ball. Formerly the ball was given to the other side on the 25-yard line for a kick-off. The new rule gives the ball to the kicking team on the 25-yard line for a kick-off.

PROTECTION TO CATCHER

Aside from these the other important changes affect the protection of the catcher on the fair catch, and the avoidance of fouls by the catcher. The new rule allows a catcher to catch the ball without being touched by a player, and this is a marked advance in strategy.

LOSS OF FIVE YARDS.

Catcher taking more than two lawful steps in making fair catch. Rule 16. If, after fair catch, opponents advance beyond restraining line before ball is put in play. Rule 16.

Players out of bounds second time in same scrimmage. Rule 17. At kick-off, if a player drops kick from fair catch, failure of opponents to stand at least 10 yards in front of ball until kicked. Rules 9 and 11. Signaling for fair catch and another taking ball. Rule 18.

Delay of game. Rule 19. Interference with snapper back or ball before ball is put in play. Rule 17. Snapper back offense second time in same down. Rule 18.

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LOSS OF BALL.

Ball kicked out of bounds twice at kick-off or touchback. Rules 9 and 10. Illegal or uncompleted forward passes on first or second down. Rule 15.

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DISQUALIFICATION.

Running into player kicking or receiving ball. Rule 24. Disqualification and loss of half the distance to the goal line. Rule 24.

Striking with the clenched fist or other weapon, kicking, meeting with the knee or striking with the locked hands by line men when they are breaking through the line. Rule 24.

**IMPORTED CARS
AGAIN WINNING**

Dragon Transcontinental Machine Making Good Progress Across Country.

New York City, Wednesday, Sept. 20.—A bulletin of the Importers' Automobile Salon calls attention to the fact that imported cars are again winning on American race tracks as well as in the foreign road competitions. The Salon notes that a Daimler car recently won the 50-mile derby at the Pittsburg meet track and the world's record for stock cars by making the 50 miles in 55 minutes, 40 2-5 seconds. The same car also won the two-mile event at the Pittsburg race. It was driven by Ernest D. Nevins. The recent winning of the 24-hour race at the Norris park track, New York, by the Renault car in charge of Paul La Croix and Maurice Bernin is another feather in the cap of the importers who, it is said, will go largely into track and road races in the near future. C. R. Labloy, member of the Salon says that many of the importers were much disappointed at the failure to secure Nassau county (Long Island) roads for the International stock car race this fall. A number of them had made preparations to enter, and it was believed that the foreign cars stood an excellent chance of winning the event.

An agency for the Atlas two-cylinder motor car has been established in New York and C. H. Martin for many years connected with the Knox company and later well known as the head of the firm of Martin Company consulting engineers on commercial vehicles, has taken charge of the agency and opened headquarters at 31 West Forty-second street. While the Atlas runabout has had considerable vogue in New England and particularly in the neighborhood of Springfield, Mass., where it is made by the Knox Motor Truck company, no attempt has heretofore been made to push the vehicle in other sections of the country. Mr. Martin believes that the little runabout will make an instantaneous hit where it is shown, on account of its simplicity and reliability. The Atlas has a 20-horse power vertical engine with two cylinders which operate on two-cylinder principle. Practically all the defects which have heretofore operated against the two-cylinder engine have been eliminated and an exceedingly satisfactory machine is the result. The engine has but five moving parts. It sells for \$1,400.

The Dragon Transcontinental car which left San Francisco at 4 o'clock on Sept. 14 has been making satisfactory progress across the continent in spite of a number of vexing accidents which have tended to delay it. On Sept. 12 it was ahead of all transcontinental records except the one made by a six-cylinder car some time ago. The Dragon is being driven by Charles A. D'Arcy and Theodore Hakenstein, and the party at the start were Benjamin Turner and Frank Sexton. The road followed was as closely as possible parallel to the tracks of the Great Western, the Oregon coast and Chicago and North Western railroads as far as Chicago and then by the Northern route through New York state to New York.

**LIPTON'S CHALLENGE
REACHES AMERICA.**

New York, Sept. 22.—Sir Thomas Lipton's challenge to the American cup reached here today on the steamer Empress and members of the New York Yacht club are awaiting the arrival of the challenge.

Members of the club feel that unless Sir Thomas has named challenging conditions, the acceptance of which would be out of the question, a refusal to defend the cup under the present governing rules would provoke a storm of protest from the public.

It is said by club members that Sir Thomas wants to compete for the cup with a steep 25-foot on the water-line and present racing rules of the club to govern. With a 75-foot water-line, the Irish challenger would spread something under one square foot of canvas.

That Sir Thomas has not challenged under the old racing rules under which the Reliance, Columbia and the Shamrock were built is certain, for William Fife, the English designer who has drawn plans for Sir Thomas' new challenger, informed the Associated Press while here on a recent visit that England would accept of the American cup under the old rules, whose conditions made impossible any chance of success for the challenger.
