Order Revoked Compelling Express Co's, to Carry Them C. O. D.

Kansas City, Mo., July 5 .-- Judge John C. Pollock in the United States district court here today revoked his mandatory order compelling express ompanies to carry C. O. D. liquor packages and denied a temporary in function against the Wells-Fargo Express company and the Pacific Express ompany, asked by the Harvest King

company, asked by the Harvest King Distilling company, forcing the express companies to accept its shipments. Judge Pollock held that there is no common law duty resting upon the ex-press companies to engage in a C. O. D. liquor business. May 15 several express companies announced they would no longer carry C. O. D. liquor shipments into Kansas, giving as their reasons that public sentiment was opposed to such traffic in face of the Kansas prohibition law. The distilling company urged that the express companies had no legal right to refuse such business. Judge Pollock issued a mandatory order June 1, compelling the express

companies to carry the C. O. D. ship-ments until the question at issue might be presented to the court in proper form. This order he has revoked,
