Albert Nielsen Says Murdered Man Promised to Deed Property to Him

CARED FOR HIM IN SICKNESS.

Will Bequeathes Property to Three Heirs and No Mention is Made Of Bequest to Plaintiff.

In an effort to break the will of Jacob C. Sorensen, who was murdered by burghars in his house at Union, on the night of Feb. 17, 1900, Albert W. Nielson, who lived with the aged man for II years, filed suit in the Third district court foday to secure posses tion of the deceased's farm which is mproved with a house and barn and valued at \$5,000. While Nielson, who in 22 years old, lived with Sorenson, he did the chores, nursed him through several sicknesses and carried on the ultivation of his farm. In return, he

ereived his board and clothing.

received his board and clothing. Nielson became unextanced with his pay and went to live with his parents in Sandy, about October, 1903. After he had been away for two months Sorensen came to him and awked him to reform. He stated that he did not like to stay home alone at night. When Sorensen asked him to reform, it is alleged that the aged man promised to convey to bim his farm if he would cuntinue to cultivate it and take care of him in his fold age. With the will there were some stocks and some shares in different irriga-tion companies and about \$200 The will was found in the street the day after the murder at Fourth Sout] and State street, near the city and county building. The stock, the money and the tin bax have not been found

On the night of the murder, Nielson was visiting his elster in Sandy and when he returned - home about 11 o'clock found the aged man uncon-scions on the floor. Nielson notified the sheriff and took Nielson to the hospital where he died the next day. His skull was fractured from a blow on the head with a dull instrument. Storenson was 77 years old when he was murdered. He was a bachelor and had lived in Union for Twenty years.
