

# TEWFIK PASHA FORMS CABINET

New Sultan, Clad in Kahki Uniform, Drives Through Streets Of Constantinople

ENTIRE LACK OF ANY POMP.

Appreciated by Subjects Who Regard It as Evidence of Beginning of More Lenient Rule.

Constantinople, April 29.—Tewfik Pasha finally succeeded in forming a new cabinet to preside over the Turkish empire, a task he undertook reluctantly.

**SULTAN IS DEMOCRATIC.**  
Mohammed V. drove through the streets in democratic fashion today on his way to the mosque to offer up the regular Friday prayers. The pomp that attended the function during the reign of Abdul Hamid was altogether lacking and the subjects of the new sultan seemed to appreciate this and accepted with pleasure the beginning of a more lenient rule.

Reports from Saloniki that Abdul Hamid would be court married was denied here.  
It is reported that the police have made numerous seizures of arms, ammunition and bombs which were to have been used in a fanatical outbreak, which Gen. Scherfetz's timely occupation of the city prevented. Searching parties are digging in the grounds of the Yildiz Kiosk for treasure supposed to have been buried by Abdul Hamid.

Mohammed V. the sultan of Turkey, clad in a khaki uniform and accompanied by a suite of a half dozen officials of his household, drove through Constantinople from the mosque of St. Sophia today, where the new sovereign prayed for nearly an hour. This simplicity is taken as an evidence of the democratic tendencies of the new ruler. His majesty entered St. Sophia through the sultan's door, which had not been opened in 26 years, the last occasion being when Abdul Hamid took Rudolf, the crown prince of Austria, to the mosque. The moment the sultan stepped out of his carriage on to the red carpet leading into the building a priest in a black robe cut the throats of two ravens, and the bird flew toward almost to the feet of the new ruler.

As Mohammed was leaving the palace today two brothers, Greeks, recognized themselves and tried to kiss the sultan's feet. Mohammed recognized them as his former jewelers, whom Abdul Hamid denounced as spies, and as being over-friendly to him. Abdul Hamid sentenced the two to seven years imprisonment in the fortress of Constanda and recently

they were released. Mohammed's face lit up with pleasure as he raised the sultan's feet and embraced them, saying, "You are my brothers."

Rev. W. W. Dr. Peet has received \$1,000 from the American Red Cross, \$1,100 from the American board of foreign missions and \$2,750 from the Society of Friends of Armenia, and says he needs from \$15,000 to \$20,000 more for his immediate requirements.

**DEAD AT ADANA.**

# "C. Q. D." MESSAGE SAVES STEAMER FROM ROCKS.

New York, May 1.—The flashing of the "C. Q. D." message late last night, prevented the steamer New Hampshire, bound for Stonington, Conn., from going on the rocks of Long Island sound. When the New Hampshire's propeller struck a log and broke off a blade, the vessel became helpless and there was considerable excitement among the 100 passengers.

By order of Capt. F. H. Avery, the wireless operator sent a "C. Q. D." message for quick help. The message was picked up at the Brooklyn navy-yard and from there the communication was sent to Oak Point, off which the New Hampshire reported itself as helpless. From there two transfer boats of the New Haven railroad were sent to the steamer's assistance. The two relief boats quickly picked up the New Hampshire and towed her into her pier at New York.

After the first shock of the accident, order was restored among the passengers, and when the New Hampshire reached its dock they retired to their staterooms, where they remained until after daylight, when they were transferred to another steamer for Stonington.

# FOR FREE IRON, OIL, COAL AND LUMBER

Senator McCumber, Protectionist And Republican, Says Should Be No Tariff on Them.

REVISION TO BE DOWNWARDS.

Asserts That is Universal Understanding of What it Means This Year.

Washington, April 30.—An extended speech by Senator McCumber favoring free lumber occupied several hours in the senate today. His remarks provoked an extended controversy among advocates of a tariff on lumber.

Mr. McCumber said, while he was a thorough protectionist, he would not agree to a tariff on products such as coal, iron ore, lumber and oil, that are being exhausted and cannot be replaced. Senator Aldrich reported from the committee of finance additional amendments to the bill and the senate adopted a motion made by him that until further notice the senate shall meet at 11 o'clock daily.

Favoring a tariff for revenue only, Senator Fletcher of Michigan today spoke in favor of retaining the tax on lumber now provided by the Dingley bill and on long staple cotton and other southern products.

**BRYAN CRITICIZED.**

Mr. Johnson of North Dakota made his maiden speech in reply to a statement during the campaign by W. J. Bryan, who, he said, had been "fooled" by the countering claims in the petroleum schedule by which petroleum brought into this country pays the duty levied on American oil imported into Russia.

Mr. Johnson severely criticized Mr. Bryan as having been largely responsible for such a clause remaining in the Wilson bill.

No resources of the country which, when once utilized, cannot be reproduced, and which are certain of exhaustion in a comparatively few years, have been protected against importation, declared Senator McCumber of North Dakota.

"No tariff," he added, "should be levied upon iron, coal, oil or timber."

Except for these, he said, he was as strong an advocate of American protection as any senator.

Mr. McCumber said that tariff revision this year is universally understood to mean revision downward. He asserted that lumber needed no protection and that no other industry had produced more millionaires for the amount invested than the lumber industry. He believed, however, that the bill "does, for the most part, meet the just demands of the people."

He remarked that the southern Democrats are making stronger appeals for protection than the Republicans of the old school, and Senator Tillman interrupted him to say:

"We are getting so badly mixed that it is hard to tell the sheep from the goats, and I am afraid that before we get through there won't be enough left for all the hogs to get their heads in."

Senator Tillman said some Republican members were making speeches in accordance with Democratic principles, while some Democratic members were delivering excellent Republican speeches. He argued that the United States can compete in the open market of the world for steel rails, other steel manufactures, "yell Carnegie and Schwab and Corey and Gary and that crowd have influence enough to have high rates of duty retained."

Mr. McCumber replied that he would be glad to vote with Mr. Tillman on any schedule, the rates of which Mr. Tillman could prove were higher than was necessary to protect the difference in labor cost in America and abroad.

**HOG FEEDING ILLUSTRATION.**  
"I deny that there is any one policy that can make one-half of the American people rich and the other half poor," said Mr. McCumber, suggesting that Mr. Tillman would agree that there is no way of feeding a pig so that one side would be lean and the other side fat.

The senator from South Carolina, he said, seemed to have an idea that no one could be honest with himself. Mr. Tillman took exception to this and asked:

"Does a hog ever get grown?"  
The senator from North Dakota refused to answer this question directly and provoked another colloquy in which Mr. McCumber referred to Mr. Tillman as a cornfield lawyer, to which the latter replied that the senator from North Dakota was not a cornfield lawyer, "but some other kind."

Mr. McCumber presented statistical estimates to show that the coal of the United States, at the present rate of consumption, would last 100 years, iron ore 50 years, lumber 30 years, and oil from 20 to 50 years, and other fuels, that the best way to conserve these supplies would be to permit importation of such products.
