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### HELLO BRIDE WHO SUES FOR DIVORCE.

The Tower romance has bothered to its fall, and Mrs. Mary Bogardus Tower, the telephone girl of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., who married Alphonse Edward Tower, the iron master who is seven times a millionaire, does not withdraw her application for legal separation from her husband, saying some of the quickly-reared love-structure will be parted from every other stone, and there will remain only ruins. Even if Mrs. Tower should withdraw the suit which she has entered in the supreme court of White Plains, N. Y., the romance of two lives, a romance which for more than a year has resembled the tower of Pisa in its attitude of strain and beauty.

Poughkeepsie society awoke one morning in April, 1902, to learn that the first Mrs. Tower had shot her 14-year-old son and herself during the night, leaving no explanation of the tragedy.

In August, 1902, the engagement of Miss Bogardus to Mr. Tower was announced, and in January, 1903, they were married. Miss Bogardus, with her sister, Grace, had been employed

for years in the telephone office, and a part of Mary's duty was to furnish the connections for Mr. Tower's private wire over which he talked many times a day with his New York brokers.

The millionaires took his bride to live in the Tower mansion, which had been altered and furnished to suit the tastes of his second wife.

In the summer of 1903 Mrs. Tower declares she found that she had been supplanted in her husband's affections by Mrs. Minnie Weiss, wife of Louis Weiss, a vine agent, who later sued Tower for \$100,000 damages for alienation of his wife's affections. Tower had frequently entertained Mrs. Weiss on his yacht, the Red King. This suit has never come to trial. Mrs. Weiss has, in turn, sued her husband for divorce and there were rumors that she was to marry a millionaire.

Mrs. Tower, however, believes that her husband is now interested in some other than Mrs. Weiss, but no other names have yet become public property.

Mrs. Tower wants a separation with suitable provision for her support, she refuses to sue for absolute divorce.
