THE CITY'S HEALTH. Report Shows the Same Favorable Conditions as a Week Ago.

The report of the board of health for he week ending July 11 shows the same favorable conditions recorded a week ago. The deaths reported for the week were fewer by one than for the previous week and one in excess of the same week of 1902. The births reported were six more than for the preceding week and one less than for the same week of last year. Twelve deaths were reported, five males and seven females, five of the aggregate being adults over 65 years of age and three of the number being nfants under two years dying of chol-era infantum. Of the births reported, 14 were males and 11 of the female gen-

At the close of last report there were eight cases of scarlet fever in quaran-tine; two new cases developed during the week and six having been dis-charged, left four cases in quarantine as against 21 for the same week of last year. Three new cases of diphtheria were reported during the week and the ame number discharged, leaving eigh cases in detention as compared with the same number for the previous week and two for the corresponding week of last year. At the close of last report there were 21 cases of smallpox under quaran ine restrictions; during the period covered by this report there were five case sported and 12 released, leaving 14 case ases for the same week of last year.
