

The British Mission.—The following is from the *Millennial Star* of Nov. 3—

Elder Peter Sinclair, under date Oct. 21st, writes from Dundee.—“My health is good, and my spirit calm. I know that God lives, and that the Gospel is true as restored through the Prophet Joseph Smith. I have seen the power of God wonderfully displayed since I have been here, many of the Saints have had testimonies. I saw the power of God made manifest when I was on my former mission, and I have seen it as clearly and powerfully displayed in Salt Lake City, and if I live a little longer I will see it more powerful than ever.” October 26th.—“I had the pleasure of baptizing eight persons yesterday, which makes nineteen in eleven days, with quite a spirit of anxious inquiry. It is cheering to see our hall filled each meeting with Saints and inquirers. We have very lively meetings, the Saints and some strangers are rejoicing under the influence. Cheering accounts come in from many quarters. I am kept busy, but rejoice in my labors.”

Elder D. McKenzie writes from Glasgow, Oct. 23rd.—“Brother Fife and I had a good time when last at Dundee. The local Elders had invited quite a number of strangers to meeting. I called myself after our visit to Dundee—many strangers were present again. Brother Sinclair and myself spoke with great freedom, both in public and in conversation afterwards, and it appears that the Lord has been operating upon some of their minds, as some ten persons have been baptized. There is no doubt but a good work can be done there, and anywhere else; that good impressions are formed on the minds of the people, if they can only be followed up by diligent ministrations.”

Elder B. H. Watts writes under date Oct. 26th, from Plymouth, Devon.—“I set out on the 10th of this month to travel and preach, and find that the Gospel is like everything else, the more energetic and close we attend to our labor, the greater the success. Since my arrival in my present field of labor, I have visited most of the Saints the third time—have baptized four and re-baptized one—and it is plain that the Gospel is taking deep root in the hearts of quite a number. I rejoice in my labors in preaching. My health is good.”

Elder John Wheaden, jun., writes that “much good is being accomplished in the Crewkerne and Broadwindsor Branches; the meetings are well attended by Saints and strangers; tracts are being distributed, and a spirit of inquiry manifest.”

Elder Jos. H. Parry writes from Leeds, Oct. 28th.—“I am enjoying excellent health and buoyant spirits, getting along better than I expected. The Saints are generally well up in the performance of their duties, and feeling well in the work. Since my arrival I have been agreeably employed in visiting among the Saints, exhorting, teaching and preaching.”

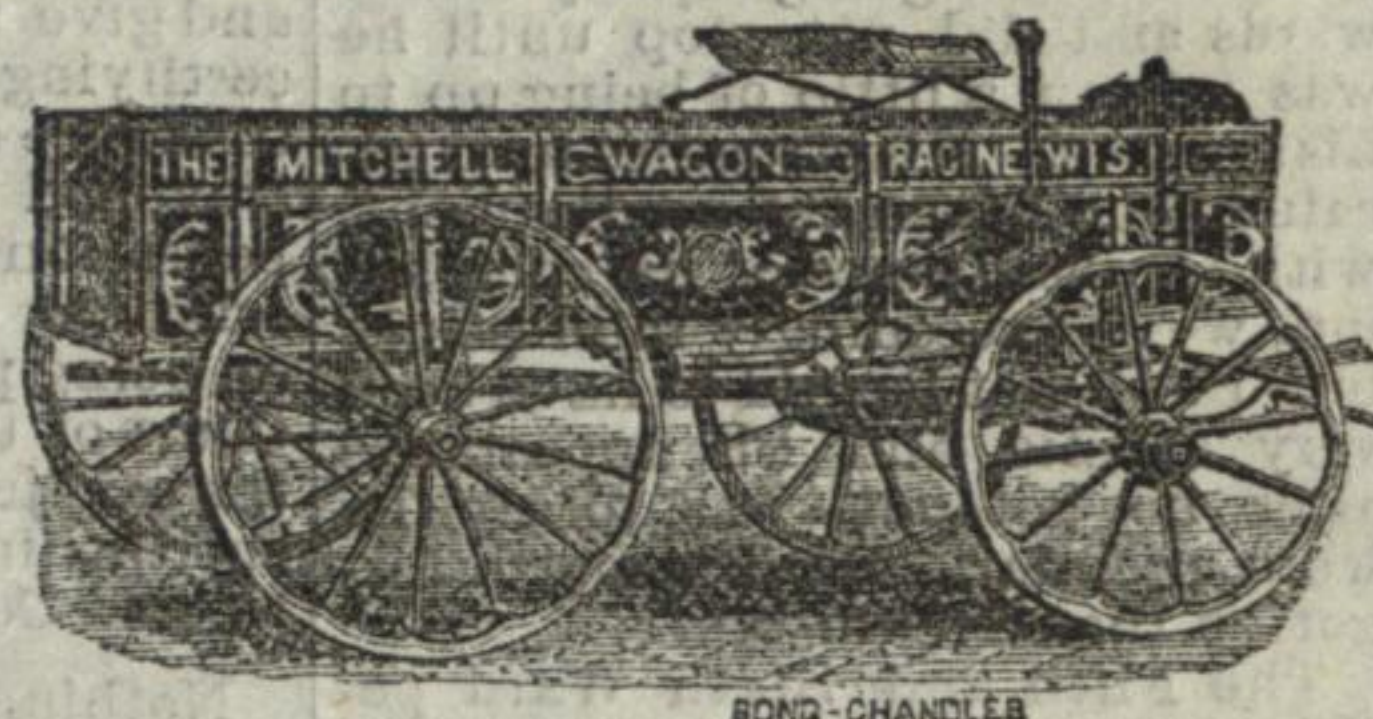
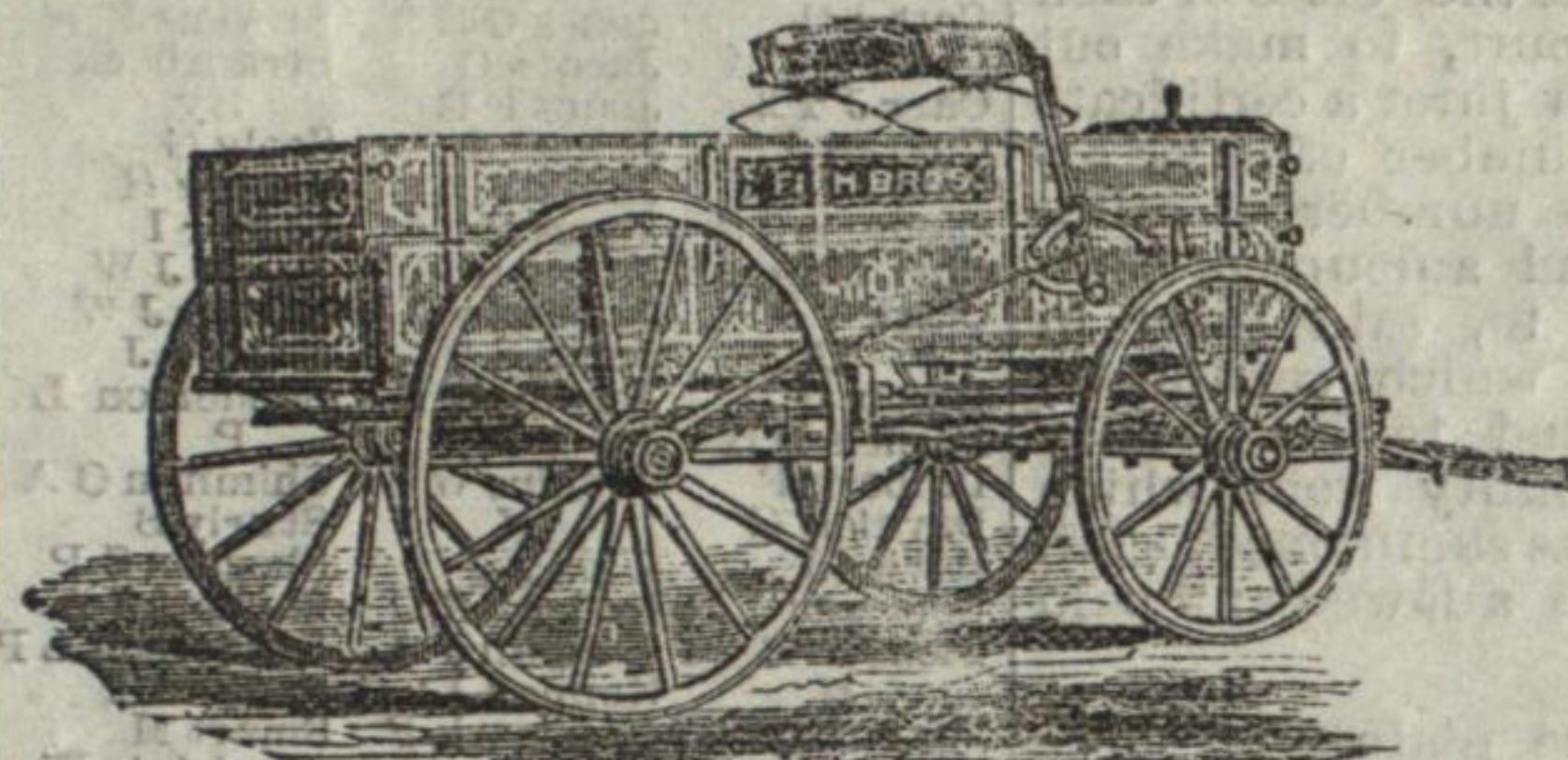
