Mrs. Hall bore no mark of the conflict. She was in a happy frame of mind and told everybody within hear-ing that she never felt better in her life. She told her story to a "News"

reporter as follows: "Dat man Henry Hail is my husband. But he's no good. Fo three months he aint done a thing an' I have months he aint done a thing an' I have had to do washin' and wo'k my han's off to keep him an' pay de rent. Dis mo'nin' I heard he was wid dis heah woman and I concludes to show dem dat I doan approve of dem actchions. I jest busted de doah in and lam-basted de life outen de pair. Ay, yo' oughter seen dat man of mine run. Oh he, he, he, he—it was de funniest thing I done ever saw. Well, I fired fo' shots at him an I done guess he am runnin' yit. Den I turn's on dis heah wench an' yo' see what she got." Then turning on Mrs. Shaffer, Mrs. Hall shrieked: "Tde jes like to be in a room alone with yo' fo' about three minutes.
