Recently ousted by the Supreme Court obtain other City offices.

ARMSTRONG IS NOW A POLICEMAN.

Noble Elected a Member of the Board of Public Works—Quarterly Reports—Miscellaneous Business.

An adjourned session of the City Council was held last night, Mayor Scott presiding. The members present were: Spafford, Karrick, Heath, Pendleton, Faibisoff, Hyde, Hardy, Tidmarsh, Young, Anderson and Lyon.

were read and referred, as mentioned below:

J. V. Smith asked for cancellation of special sprinkling tax. Committee on sprinkling.

J. H. Price asked for permission to pile building material in front of 355 south Second East Street for three months. Granted.

William Shurtliff asked to be appointed to a position on the police force. Referred to the mayor.

Seymour B. Young asked for a corrected deed. Referred to the city attorney.

The same gentleman asked that the collection of a sprinkling tax on certain property be temporarily deferred. Committee on sprinkling.

A. G. Patrick asked that \$54.82 due him from Dutches & Williams, contractors on the Parley's canyon conduit, be paid him at once.

John Sullivan asked permission to transfer the unexpired portion of his liquor license to E. Norton. Committee on license.

James Clegg, administrator, asked for removal of special sidewalk tax. Board of public works.

The Salt Lake Dramatic Association and many other persons owning property in the city have signed a petition protesting against the proposed grade for that street being established. Committee on streets.

W. H. Smith and others asked that the grade on Second South Street, between Fourth and Fifth West, be lowered a foot. Committee on streets.

The Papperton, Plaza and Fort Douglas buildings be condemned for a franchise for a single or double line street railway on Fourth street from the military reservation to Sixth street and thence south to the Plaza. Also, the Second South street from Papperton Place to T street, thence south along T street to First Street. Committee on streets.

John Clegg asked that a wagon and foot bridge be erected over the canal on Sixth South street, between Seventeen and Eight West streets. Committee on streets.

F. D. Allred asked for a position on the police force. Referred to the mayor.

H. F. Cunningham was asked for appointment to a position on the police force. Referred to the mayor.

The communication of twenty-five members of the police force concerning the proposed training by Captain Parley and Sergeant Gibson was read and referred to the committee on police.

Henry Anderson asked that a certain amount of his dues inures from Hobart & Wilkeson be withheld. Board of public works.

F. D. Allred asked to be allowed to make private contract for the construction of a bridge across the canal on his previous Board of public works.

Spencer Clawson asked to purchase a piece of property known as a continuation of State street. Committee on public grounds.

Major Scott reported that he had appointed S. P. Armstrong, one of the ousted bogus councilmen, to a position on the police force in place of D. Adelst. resigned. Confirmed.

TESTIMONY IN RESISTANCE.

M. R. Bowes tendered his resignation as a member of the Board of Public Works. The resignation was accepted.

Councilman Anderson moved that W. P. Noble, the bogus councilman who was recently ousted by the committee on streets, be appointed to succeed Mr. Bowes.

Councilman Young placed in nomination the name of ex-Major Armstrong. The vote was Armstrong 5, Noble 4. The latter was declared elected.

CITY COUNCILMAN RESIGNS.

City Engineer Denehy reported that he had examined and determined for right of way through certain land owned by Joseph Duder, for Parley's canyon conduit, at a cost of \$100 and asked for an appropriation of the amount mentioned. Adopted.

The same officer represented that the work of paving sidewalks was now under way but that no payment had yet been made to him. He also reported that action be taken on the matter forthwith. Committee on streets.

TO AVOID A DISPUTE.

Councilman Holland offered the following resolution:

Whereas it appears that the residents of City Park, especially those residing in French West Street, have great objection to the numerous details of valuation being made upon their property, for some time past the Utah Electrical and Cable Co. have occupied their West Street building, and whereas the said company will not leave the premises until the valuation is completed, therefore be it resolved, that the City of Salt Lake do its best to accommodate them.

Resolved, That the city marshal be instructed to order the removal of said car or other material, in said French West

Street, and that the railroad company be instructed to get it off between tracks so as to reduce stress on a good building otherwise, as required by agreement, giving sufficient time to make arrangements.

Resolved, That the committee on streets be instructed to advise the Parley's canyon committee, Adopted.
