**Held For Robbery.**—This morning Fred Hampton, a former saloon keeper of Ogden, was up before Justice Hampton on a charge of stealing a valuable watch and chain from Ambrose Greenwell, of that town. The two were in company on Saturday, and Hampton borrowed his companion's coat and vest, including his watch and chain. The two then took train ostensibly for Ogden, but Hampton left it at Woods Cross, and came back by the freight. Greenwell, finding he had been duped, also left the train at Kaysville and came to this city. Hampton was arrested, but, in the meantime he had borrowed \$25 from Mr. Gentsch, leaving the watch with that gentleman as security.

The accused was held in \$500 to answer to the grand jury. The property carried off by Hampton was valued at \$250.

**Shot in the Neck.**—Late on Saturday night, P. Young was shot in the neck, the ball passing forward and lodging under the left jaw, inflicting a painful, but not fatal wound. He lost a great deal of blood. After being taken to the City Hall, he was conveyed finally to St. Mark's Hospital.

Frank Humphries was arrested, and appeared before Justice Spiers, to answer to the charge of doing the shooting. He states that, on Saturday night, some person came to the window of the room where he and his wife were sleeping, and insisted on getting in. After warning the party off for the fourth time he fired a random shot out of the window, for the purpose of scaring the fellow away. He was surprised to find subsequently that the shot had taken effect.

It appears that Young was intoxicated, and was under the impression that he was getting into his own room.

Humphries waived an examination and was held to answer to the grand jury in \$500 bonds.

#### UTAH LEGISLATURE.

##### OPENING OF THE SESSION.

Jan. 9, 1882, 2 p.m.

##### COUNCIL.

Promptly at 2 p.m. of Monday, Jan. 9, 1882, several of the members elect of the Council were present in the Council Chamber, when Counselor Lorenzo Snow called the assemblage to order, and on motion of Counselor Joseph F. Smith, Counselor Lorenzo Snow was called to the chair.

On motion of Counselor John T. Caine, Mr. L. J. Nuttall was called to act as temporary clerk.

On Motion of Counselor Joseph F. Smith, Mr. J. Van Cott was called

to act as temporary sergeant-at-arms.

On Motion of Counselor Erastus Snow, the Chair appointed Erastus Snow, John T. Caine and A. O. Smoot to act as a committee to examine the credentials of the Counselors elect, who reported that the following gentlemen held proper credentials from their districts:

Hon. Erastus Snow, councillor from Kane, San Juan and Washington Counties.

Hon. John R. Murdoch, Councillor from Beaver, Iron, Millard and Piute Counties.

Hons. Joseph F. Smith, Daniel H. Wells, John T. Caine and Peter Barton, Councillors from Davis, Salt Lake and Tooele Counties.

Hon. Lorenzo Snow, Councillor from Box Elder and Weber Counties.

Hon. A. K. Thurber, Councillor from Emery, Sanpete and Sevier Counties.

Hons. A. O. Smoot and George Teasdale, Councillors from Utah and Juab Counties.

Hon. Moses Thatcher, Councillor from Cache and Rich Counties.

Hon. W. W. Cluff, Councillor from Morgan, Summit, Uintah and Wasatch Counties.

The gentlemen all being present, on motion of Counselor Thurber, the Secretary of the Territory was requested to administer the oath of office, and Hon. A. L. Thomas was so notified by the Sergeant-at-Arms, and he came to the Chamber and administered the iron-clad oath.

Councillor Erastus Snow nominated Joseph F. Smith for President of the Council, who was elected by unanimous vote.

Councillor Teasdale nominated L. J. Nuttall for Chief Clerk of the Council; elected.

Councillor Thatcher nominated Samuel Roskelly for enrolling and engrossing clerk; elected.

Councillor D. H. Wells nominated John Van Cott for Sergeant-at-arms and Doorkeeper; elected.

Councillor L. Snow nominated Lorenzo Farr for Messenger; elected.

Councillor A. K. Thurber nominated Charles W. Smith, watchman; elected.

Councillor Erastus Snow nominated Milo Andrus for Chaplain; elected.

Secretary Thomas then administered the oath of office to the gentlemen elected.

The House of Representatives notified the Council that that body had fully organized and was ready for business.

The Chaplain offered prayer asking divine blessing upon the officers of the country, the Territory, and the members of the Council, and for peace and good order in the Territory.

The House notified the Council that a concurrent resolution had been passed to appoint a minute clerk and usher, in which the Council concurred.

On motion of Counselor Caine, the President appointed Councillors Caine and Thurber a committee, to act with a like committee of the House, to wait upon the Governor and notify him of the organization of the Legislature.

On motion of Councillor L. Snow, the Sergeant-at-Arms was authorized to act with the Sergeant-at-Arms of the House, to hoist the stars and stripes during the sessions of the Legislature.

Councillor Wells nominated W. W. Taylor for Minute Clerk, who was elected.

Councillor Caine nominated Jeter Clinton for Usher, who was elected.

Councillor Caine, as a notary public, swore in the two last named gentlemen.

#### HOUSE.

On motion roll was called from Secretary's certified copy of members elect of the House.

Clerk announced a quorum was present.

On motion Mr. F. M. Lyman was selected as Speaker of the House.

Mr. James Sharp nominated as Chief Clerk, Mr. A. Stayner. So ordered.

Mr. Stout suggested that before any permanent organization was entered into, the Acting Governor swear in the members. Members so sworn.

A short discussion was had on recommending the election of House officers.

On motion, Mr. John Morgan was elected Chief Engrossing Clerk.

Mr. John Smith, on motion, was elected Sergeant-at-Arms.

Edward Griffin was nominated as Watchman of the House. Elected.

Levi Snow was elected Messenger.

Henry G. Boyle was elected Chaplain.

Junius F. Wells was nominated Minute Clerk of the House. Withdrawn for time being.

Officers of the House sworn in.

#### ADDRESS OF SPEAKER LYMAN:

Gentlemen—I thank you for the honor conferred and the confidence that you have manifested in me, in your choice of Speaker. I trust that during the session that is now upon us, our legislative business will be brought on readily without delay, and that all necessary legislative business may be placed in the hands of the Governor in good time, that he may have no excuse to say that he is crowded at the close of the session, so that important business has to be laid aside on that account.

I approach the duties of this office hesitatingly, having had no experience of the kind before. I shall have to crave your indulgence and charity. But I hope for your guidance as well as assistance and support.

It was decided that a minute clerk and usher be chosen whose compensation shall be four dollars per day, to be paid out of the Territorial treasury.

A resolution was adopted to provide for the election of a minute clerk for the house.

The Council, on motion was notified that the house had effected an organization.

A message from the Council announced that that body had also organized with the following officers:

President, Jos. F. Smith.  
Chief Clerk, L. John Nuttall.

Enrolling and Engrossing Clerk, Samuel Roskelly.

Sergeant-at-Arms, John Van Cott.

Messenger, Lorenzo Farr.  
Watchman, C. W. Smith.  
Chaplain, Milo Andrus.

On motion a committee was appointed to act with a like committee from the Council to wait upon the Governor and inform him both houses were ready to receive any message he may wish to give. Messrs. Preston, Hatch and Farr to be said committee.

Suggested that a committee be appointed to draft suitable rules of government for the House, but such appointment was objected to by Mr. Farr, on the grounds of immateriality and unnecessary restraint.

Mr. Dusenberry said if such rules were not adopted much dissatisfaction would ensue and new members not know how to act in accordance with generally prevailing rules. On motion a committee was appointed for that purpose.

A message from the Council announced that Messrs. Caine and Thurber act with the committee of the House to wait upon the Governor.

Messrs. Dusenberry, Penrose, Partridge, Johnson and Booth were appointed, etc., to draft rules.

Mr. Stout moved that the Sergeant-at-Arms in each house, Council concurred, be instructed to furnish members and officers of both houses with suitable newspapers, penknives and postage stamps.

Amended by Mr. Dusenberry that the members, and not officers, be thus provided.

Committee appointed to wait on the Governor, reported that that official was ready to present his message.

A message from the Council announced that the Council concurred with the House in the election of a Minute Clerk and Usher for the session.

Mr. Jaques and Mr. Stout were not in favor of the amendment to supply members only with stationery, etc.

Council message requested a joint session to receive the Governor's message.

Motion that resolution to provide stationery for members be laid on the table. Carried.

Motion that joint session be held immediately. So ordered.

#### JOINT SESSION.

Rolls called. Prayer by Chaplain. Acting Governor of Territory then proceeded to read first His Excellency's personal and official message, followed by that of E. H. Murray.

The following is

ACTING GOVERNOR THOMAS' MESSAGE:

Gentlemen of the Council and House of Representatives:

For the second time, during my service as Secretary, it becomes my

duty to welcome you, as the Acting Governor of the Territory.

As the representative branch of the law-making power, it is presumed you are familiar with the needs of the people. It is hardly necessary to remind you that the highest service you can render them will be to place the Territory in harmony, socially and politically with its sister commonwealths of the Union, and thus insure a continuance of the prosperity which now prevails.

The Congress of the United States having limited your session to sixty days, I recommend that you proceed at once to commence the work of the session.

The Territorial Auditor and Treasurer have made their biennial reports, which are submitted herewith for your consideration.

His Excellency Governor Murray, having received an official summons from a congressional committee, left for Washington a few days ago. Before his departure, I received the following communication:

To the Hon. Arthur L. Thomas, Secretary of Utah Territory:

Dear Sir.—Unexpectedly summoned to Washington on official business, I send to you my recommendations to the Honorable the Legislature of the Territory of Utah, which I request that you transmit.

Expecting and trusting to be allowed to return in time to join with them in the legislation demanded by the wants of the Territory, and with an assurance of my high regard,

ELI H. MURRAY, Governor.

In accordance with the wish expressed by Governor Murray, I take pleasure in reading to you his views as part of this Message, which I heartily endorse. In his name and my own I now welcome you to the discharge of the important functions imposed upon you by law, and assure you that so long as the duties of Acting-Governor are incumbent upon me, it will be my most earnest desire to cordially co-operate with you in furthering every measure which may promise to be of good to the people of this Territory.

#### BY TELEGRAPH.

#### FOREIGN.

LONDON, 6.—The United Irishman announces the publication purporting to come from America recommending assassination and the use of dynamite. The Lord Mayor's property defense fund amounts to £12,000.

PARIS, 6.—There is good reason to believe that an attempt to steal the bodies of Napoleon III. and the Prince Imperial, has just been discovered at Chiselhurst. Howard Vincent has sent down several special detectives from London to watch the imperial mortuary chapel and hopes are entertained that the person who has planned the attempt will shortly be apprehended. It is believed that the person in question is a woman, a personal enemy of the Empress, but nothing certain is yet known on this point. The affair has been carefully kept quiet, lest the criminal or criminals concerned should take alarm and escape.

DUBLIN, Jan. 6.—A process server named Hudder, and his nephew disappeared from near Ballinrobe, county Mayo, and it is thought they have been murdered and the bodies hidden in a bog.

LONDON, 7.—Intelligence from Accra confirms the report from Cape Coast Castle, of November last of the massacre of 200 young girls, by order of the King of Ashante. The girls were purposely captured for the massacre in raids on neighboring tribes.

In view of the warning received the mausoleum at Chiselhurst will be connected with the priest's house by electric wire.

The revenue received from direct and indirect taxes in France in 1881, exceeds the estimate by 217,000,000 francs.

The Marquis of Lorne sails for Canada on Monday.

CITY OF MEXICO, 7.—Romero refused the mission to Washington, but will soon go to the United States on private business.

LONDON, 7.—The British Board of Trade returns for December show an increase in the value of imports of £18,408, increase value of exports, £1,957,262 compared with the corresponding month last year.

A violent gale, accompanied by rain, throughout the United Kingdom, did considerable damage, especially in Scotland.

The cabinet council to-day was unanimous in considering that the state of Ireland necessitated additional precautions being taken in order to bring to justice persons engaged in supplying arms to the people.

Forster, Chief Secretary for Ireland, will have an audience with the Queen at Osborne on Sunday and submit important documents relating to Irish affairs.

ST. PETERSBURG, 7.—Many arrests are made at night since the beginning of January. It is thought the Nihilists are preparing for fresh violence, as they are re-assembling in the capital, and have renewed the circulation of their proclamations.

BERLIN, Jan. 7.—There is much disappointment among the Clericals at the decision of the government to introduce no more comprehensive measure than the July bill. The Clericals and leaders in the Diet are preparing a series of amendments which, if adopted, will practically have the effect of repealing many laws. The Conservatives regard the forthcoming ecclesiastical bill as purely temporary to be followed by a revision of the Falk laws as soon as negotiations with the Vatican is concluded. It is only on this assumption the Conservatives have agreed to support the bill.
